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





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## Vice President's Message

# Trail Sign Order Delayed by **Budget Constraints at IDNR**

Well, as I write this, it's raining outside. Not the way I wanted to end the month of November. Last week, we had the ISSA Annual Convention in Storm Lake. It was a long six-hour drive to get there in the first big winter storm of the year. But it was worth it to meet with snowmobilers across the state.

Every year, we get together to discuss issues and celebrate this great group during the two and a half days of convention. This year was no different. For those who weren't there, I will hit the highlights.

Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) Snowmobile Program Director David Downing discussed the current budget for snowmobiling. In short, the budget is tight going into the coming season. Since last year, five new groomers and three drags were bought. This combined with changes in the way we are allowed to spend National Recreation Trails (NRT) grants and new people within the IDNR has led to the delay in a few things.

The trail signs are ordered and being made by Iowa Prison Industries. Everyone should see the signs in early December. I know this is a lot later than originally promised. We are doing the best we can to work with the budget and make sure we start building it back up. I assure you we are able to fund the program and all groomers will run as much as possible once Mother Nature decides to let us keep

C torm Lake lived up to its name the third weekend in November as storm system Bella moved through western and central Iowa, dumping up to a foot snow in some parts. While creating a great kick-off to the 2015-16 snowmobile season, the winter weather did cause some travel concerns for ISSA members attending the 42nd Annual Convention there.

According to event organizers, 120 members did survive the icy trek to King's Pointe Resort for three days of seminars, presentations and banquet festivities; but the turnout was roughly half of last year's convention, and 2015 Convention Committee Chair Merv Hoermann did acknowledge the inclement weather

Representing an organization which should not complain about getting too much snow, however—especially after last winter— Hoermann, who also serves as president of the ISSA, said he was still pleased with how many dedicated members showed up and how the weekend shaped up.

"We're glad many of you made it over to Storm Lake safely, and we hope you enjoyed everything we had in store for you,' said Hoermann, who entered the second half of his two-year term convention weekend. "As a group, the committee felt all of the seminars went over really well, and I thought our presenters were also very good."

While the Friday night entertainment lineup had to be scrapped due to the treacherous travel conditions, the Saturday afternoon seminars went off without a hitch, and the keynote speaker later that night also captivated the audience. As planned, each session was held consecutively to one another in the resort's main ballroom so attendees did not have to choose between events.

"The whole idea was to keep everyone together so people didn't have to scramble between rooms and seminars," Hoermann explained. "Our presenters knew exactly how much time they had on stage as well. As a committee, we were trying to think outside

Earlier in the day, the general membership meeting saw very few leadership moves with only Region 3 reporting a change in directorship. Assistant Matt Trunkhill now replaces Ben Diekhius there.

As always, ISSA members stepped forward with several financial contributions throughout the weekend. At the top of the list, nine clubs donated \$3,200 toward the Club Challenge to support the ISSA's lobbying efforts. Coming close to that total were the donations to the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa, and another \$2,600 was raised for the scholarship program through various raffles and auction items.

# Gas Tax, Sales Tax, Timbersleds

SSA Lobbyist Mike Heller ran for office Lsome 35 years ago and still remembers which voters let him put up campaign signs in their yards. It's that kind of relationship he encouraged snowmobilers at Storm Lake last month to build with the candidates for the Iowa Legislature during next year's election season.

Appearing at the 42nd Annual ISSA



Convention at King's Pointe Resort Nov. 21, Heller reported all seats are up for at re-election the Statehouse in Des Moines next fall. Republicans currently

control the House, 57-43, while Democrats hold a slim margin in the Senate, 26-24.

"The key point I want to make today is grassroots contacts," Heller said. "You should take the opportunity to invite these candidates to one of your club meetings. Try to get to know them. It doesn't matter if they are a Democrat or Republican. Our issues are pretty bipartisan.

"If they get to know you, these politicians can be crucial to our efforts...if not in the upcoming session but for future sessions for sure," Heller continued. "You would be amazed at the little things they remember.

Let them put a yard sign up. It shows that you are interested in them and care about their campaign, which is what really motivates politicians."

## **Advocates Since 2003**

Along with Paula Feltner, Heller has been representing the ISSA at the state capitol since the winter of 2003. The Des Moines-based lawyers were retained in response to the Iowa Legislature's deappropriation of \$1 million from the state snowmobile program coffers. Thanks to their lobbying efforts and snowmobilers' grassroots contacts, the money was eventually reimbursed.

That hard-fought victory kicked off a string of positive legislation for the state snowmobile program. Among the many achievements since then have been the annual registration period and fee increase, the introduction of a snowmobile trail user permit three years ago and last session's preservation of snowmobile access across primary and divided highways.

"That last bill (S.F. 218) passed with broad bipartisan support," Heller noted. "The legislation was important because you had one creative individual who read the law literally and the attorney general agreed with him that existing law didn't allow snowmobiles to cross primary highways."

Most notable among the defeats, however, has been the lack of a refund program for the fuel taxes paid by snowmobilers in their off-road machines. The ISSA has been stumping for this reimbursement for the past 15 years, and with the passage of the 10cent gas tax hike last session, many leaders

in the organized snowmobile community felt 2015 was their best chance at earmarking money.

"But when we brought up the fuel tax to legislators last year and presented the idea of dedicating a portion of it to the

snowmobile fund, it was just not something they really wanted to do because if they did it for us, they would have to take every group's amendment," Heller said.

The proposal was an uphill battle from the beginning, he noted.

"Let's be honest," Heller began. "Last session's gas tax bill was drafted in a way that we couldn't even get an amendment on it. The reimbursement proposal was considered non-germane and procedurally out of order. It was unfortunate that it happened that way because the gas-tax hike was the only realistic chance we had at getting the taxes on the fuel used in your snowmobiles back and dedicated to our fund."

#### **Turning Attention to Sales Tax**

As Past ISSA President Jim Willey pointed out, many legislators who were contacted by ISSA members to support the gas-tax reimbursement "indicated they would support us on something else." That opportunity now appears to be moving toward recouping the sales taxes snowmobilers pay on their sleds, apparel and accessories.

"If you buy a snowmobile, it only makes sense that the sales tax goes to the snowmobile fund. Sales tax on cars goes to the road use tax fund," Heller said. "That becomes food for thought. It's money you are already paying for. We can make a good argument, and it would be a recurring source of revenue for the program."

"It will take the snowmobilers in this room and across Iowa to make this happen though," Willey said.

At this point, the ISSA's Emergency

Funding and Legislation Committee has not made any recommendations to the ISSA Board of Directors for this upcoming legislative session, which begins Jan. 11. If board members do decide to pursue the sales tax reimbursement, Heller indicated a number of legislators would step forward to introduce a bill for it.

Chief among them is Sen. Dick Dearden from Des Moines, who has sponsored legislation in the past for the ISSA. Heller also noted Sen. Mary Jo Wilhelm from Decorah has also been sympathetic to snowmobile issues in Des Moines. Another friend of the ISSA has been Rep. Linda Upmeyer of Garner, but her recent selection as House Speaker makes it doubtful if she will introduce any legislation, Heller said.

"(Upmeyer) was helpful with the registration fee increase, and she's very in tune with the importance of snowmobiling in the district she represents," Heller said. "She is now in a very unique position to be helpful to us."

Heller acknowledged the Statehouse in Des Moines is in the midst of a "changing budget environment" and admitted that "not much was done last session after the gas tax hike was passed." Besides the sales tax proposal, another ISSA push which remains alive is the license plate initiative. This bill, which would allow for a special ISSA license plate, has already passed one chamber "so hopefully we can get it passed this year," Heller said.

While missing its best opportunity to recover the fuel taxes paid by snowmobilers earlier this year, the ISSA did enjoy its sixth consecutive session of positive legislative change. "Very few groups can say that," Heller said. "You have incredibly strong advocates, but we need to keep it up."

"We want to thank you for what you and Paula do for us in Des Moines," Willey said. "Retaining a lobbyist is one of the most important things we do as an association. We need to make sure we stay on top of legislation which is contrary to snowmobiling and proactively work on issues in our favor. The success we have seen the last few years is due to the support we have from Mike and Paula."

"It has been our privilege to serve you," Heller said.

Beginning at a rate in 2003 of \$17,000, the lobbyist team's contract now costs the association \$23,000. This bill is a direct

expense against the ISSA's General Fund, and to offset that highticket item, the organization has relied on its Club Challenge, to which ISSA member-clubs are encouraged to make donations. In 2015, \$6,500 was raised through this fund-raising mechanism. At this year's convention, \$3,200 was collected from clubs for next year's expense.

## Legislative Issues on the Horizon

Besides the license plate request and potential sales tax reimbursement initiative, the only other item on the legislative horizon discussed at convention for the ISSA came from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. During his presentation to the group, IDNR Snowmobile Program Coordinator David Downing indicated his department will address a relatively new player in the snow recreation market.

Similar to a tracked ATV, Timbersled, which was acquired by Polaris in April of 2015, offers a snow bike conversion kit which can turn a dirt bike into a snow machine. Most of the promotional material being distributed on this kit shows it in use in the backcountry, but Downing and others are concerned its application will migrate to a groomed snowmobile trail.

"I have no problem collecting the registration dollars for these machines, but the unknown is what impact they will have on a groomed snowmobile trail," Downing said. "Just like for the tracked UTV, we can allow for the registration and titling of those units, but we also need to define where they can be used and where they cannot."

Presently in Iowa, an ATV or UTV equipped with a tracked conversion kit is not considered a snowmobile and therefore banned from trails. Downing did note studies have shown that tracked ATVs have no adverse impact on a groomed trail, but his concern stems from when the snow melts and those ATVs continue to ride on private land.

"The problem is you don't have Mother Nature as an enforcement tool so when the snow melts on your trail system, you are going to stop riding your snowmobile, but a tracked ATV is probably not going to stop," he explained. "That requires one of my officers to go out and try to deal with that issue, and there's simply not enough of us to do that.

"The consequence is landowners are going to start taking away our trails," he continued. "We have in our definition that a modified ATV is not considered a snowmobile so now you have this new piece of equipment come along and it looks like fun but I also don't want to do something that gets us kicked off the trail systems we're on. These Timbersleds look fun in powder, but what do they do to a groomed snowmobile trail? It's a pretty narrow track.

"Something is going to happen with them legislatively this year," Downing said. "We want to make sure we are leading the bus and not under it."

espite a lukewarm reception at the 2015 ISSA Annual Convention last month in Storm Lake, the ISSA is planning to move forward with a proposal to expand its Snowmobile Iowa program to include weekly snowmobile rides this winter.

Spearheading the effort are ISSA President Merv Hoermann and Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini. Both participated in the ISSA's snowmobile retreat to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan

last March and now want to discover what their own state has to offer.

"With this idea, we want to explore your area of Iowa and get on some trails we haven't been on before and see some new points of interest," Hoermann explained during a Saturday afternoon seminar Nov. 21 to drum up support for the expansion. "Sometimes

you don't have to travel out of state to have a good time.

"What I've learned over the years is you can do that right here in Iowa," he continued. "For some of us, we don't even get out of our own area to ride. There are some really good trails here in Iowa, and you get to see a lot of variety, whether it is the ditches out west or cross-country trails the farther east you get."

"I've been at this game a day or two—longer than most in this room—and I do not know all the trails in Iowa and all the good secrets you have in your areas that I would like to ride," added Andreini, a 45-year veteran of the sport. "That's why we came up with a plan to showcase these trails in Iowa through our clubs."

Critical to the program expansion, local clubs are being invited to sign up to host rides each weekend in January and February. They would be asked to designate a starting area or trailhead with room for trailer parking, line up a few guides to lead the tour, provide trail maps and then offer suggestions for overnight lodging.

"This is a good way to promote your community and impact your area financially," Andreini said. "Snowmobilers spend a lot of money. They spend a lot of money in hotels, gas stations and restaurants and buy other related items while traveling."

## **Original Platform Dates Back to 2004**

According to organizers, the rides are designed to expand on the Snowmobile Iowa concept which began 11 years ago at the 2004 ISSA Annual Convention in West Lake Okoboji. Here, clubs are invited to set up booths at convention to showcase what their area has to offer and to display their maps, scrapbooks and activities.

Then Region 1 Director, Hoermann is credited with creating the Snowmobile Iowa program and now wants to bring it to life by having clubs hosts snowmobile rides in their areas of the state. When a ride is scheduled, email blasts will be sent out to the membership, and given the fickle nature of winter in Iowa, Hoerman realizes they may be last-minute decisions.

"If there's no snow or conditions aren't good enough to ride when your weekend comes up, then we'll just cancel it. We won't try to postpone it or re-schedule it," he said, emphasizing the flexibility of the program. "We know how our winters can be in Iowa. And if by chance two clubs sign up for the same weekend, then you have a choice of where you want to ride."

The intent of the rides is to share what each area of the state has to offer and to keep riders from looking to neighboring states as destinations. As a three-time participant of the *Iowa Snowmobiler* magazine's Ride Across Iowa in the late 2000s, Hoermann knows firsthand what gems exist out there. He now wants others in the ISSA to experience them as well.

"I've ridden across Iowa three times, once along Highway 9, then Highway 18 and lastly across Highway 3, and I've learned a lot from those trips," he said. "We crossed a lot of different trail systems and ended up taking more scenic routes. We weren't just looking for a straight line. If we came to a trail that dogs off and there's something to go see, we followed it. We were in no hurry and didn't have a deadline to meet."

On the Highway 9 trip, for example, riders unfamiliar with the area ended up riding through the Hogsback Wildlife Area near Lake Mills and later on through the Pinicon Alders Wildlife Area near McIntire, thanks to guided tours by club members in their respective areas. Andreini feels more of these "secrets" can be discovered by others through expanding the Snowmobile Iowa program.

"I want to know what's in my own state," Andreini said. "I plan to make it a mission this winter to ride as much of Iowa as I can. I want to know what's here. I know other state trails better than I know my own, and that's sad. I think we have hidden secrets here, and we need to discover them. We need to have them pointed out to us. I know my area real well, and I know where to take people when they come and visit me. All of you have these same areas."

#### **Need to Start Somewhere**

Sign-up sheets were available to club members convention weekend, but many felt they should take it back to their clubs for a vote before committing to host a ride. Some pointed out the slate of activities already planned this winter in Iowa that would compete with the rides, including the Jack Race, Snow Fest and Okoboji Winter Games in January and the David Carmichael Memorial Ride in February.

Despite the hushed reluctance and perceived scheduling conflicts, the seminar did receive some modest support from the convention crowd. Both Andreini and Hoermann admitted it might be too late to get many rides organized this winter, but they felt they should start somewhere, just like the original Snowmobile Iowa concept needed a jumping-off point in 2004.

"We realize this may be getting late in the season to do this, but if we are going to promote it for January, we need to get on top of it right now and spread the word in order for participants to attend," Andreini said.

"I think it's a very interesting idea, but I'm not positive on how to get it off the ground," shared retired Region 7 Director Steve Klinkefus, a member of the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club. "Most people in here may have never ridden in northeast Iowa, and maybe the members in northeast Iowa haven't ridden in central Iowa. We all don't know where the good spots are so maybe we should give this idea a shot."

"The intent of this is to make a stronger ISSA out of it," Andreini said. "Just look at the 14 people who went on the ISSA trip last winter. Everyone had a good time and forged relationships that would not have happened otherwise. Staying in Iowa this year will allow people in our own group to get to know each other, and we certainly need that in the ISSA and throughout the snowmobile community."

Andreini said the organized ISSA rides would be an opportunity to invite non-ISSA members to come along as well and "see what we are about." "Take this to your clubs, send us a contact person and let's get moving on this," Andreini said.



## **Groomer Cards Arrive** After Two-Year Wait

The state's Groomer Operator Certification program is making I up for a two-year delay in its card-issuing process by extending the expiration date for current operators to Jan. 1, 2018. The announcement came at the 2015 ISSA Annual Convention in Storm Lake Nov. 21.

The extension means operators who renewed at the ISSA convention at Altoona in November of 2013 will basically earn a



five-year card; it also falls in line with a proposal to extend the recertification period to five years. The renewal period currently stands at three years, and all existing operators had to be recertified by July 1, 2014.

Causing agitation for several clubs and frustration for many within the ISSA, the

well-publicized snafu in issuing the operator cards in a timely manner has been blamed on a number of factors, including distribution errors by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), inaccurate information on training registration forms and incomplete paperwork at the club level.

"We have had some guys waiting since Altoona to receive their cards, and we sincerely apologize for that," explained ISSA Vice President Chris Willey, who jointly coordinates the groomer operator training program for the ISSA and IDNR. "The date you now have on that card is the date you will need to recertify by. Everybody gets a little extra time now."

For more than 10 years, the IDNR has required groomer operator training. Across Iowa, approximately 600 club members are certified to operate grooming equipment. That number is down about half since the IDNR called for recertification every three years. Willey took some time at convention to explain the logic behind the mandate.

"We are the only user group in Iowa which provides volunteers to operate state-owned equipment," he explained. "State lawyers are very nervous about that. They get complaints all the time by motorists who get rock chips in the windshield from debris kicked up by snow plows driven by state employees. Now, they have volunteers running state-owned groomers.

"One thing that makes them feel better about it is we have a certification and recertification program for our operators," Willey continued. "If we didn't have this program, we would have to have IDOT or IDNR employees running our groomers. How often do you think our trails would get groomed? They wouldn't. Due to the environment in which we live in, we have to go Turn to page 18

he last time Michigan native Bill Bradfield visited Iowa, he and 53 other dedicated snowmobilers had just completed a 4,200-mile trip across four time zones to Alaska. Not one to rest on his laurels, he returned to the Hawkeye State last month to share his tales of their most recent adventure across six countries to St. Petersburg, Russia.

First appearing at the 2010 International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) in Coralville, Bradfield was invited back to Iowa for the 2015 ISSA Annual Convention in Storm Lake to raise awareness for his organization's cause. A Type 2 diabetic, Bradfield is the

president and founder of MichCanSka, an international snowmobile club which raises money for diabetes research.

"I chose diabetes because I am a Vietnam veteran who was exposed to Agent Orange when I served my country in 1967-68," Bradfield told the ISSA members assembled for his Nov. 21 seminar at King's Pointe

Resort. "They later found out that chemical defoliant was a cause of diabetes, and thousands and thousands of veterans like me are now suffering from it.

"But I'm also standing here before you today to say that I am still as patriotic as anyone can get," he affirmed, causing the Saturday afternoon crowd of snowmobilers to erupt in cheers. "My country made a mistake, but I know they didn't do it on purpose. We all make mistakes. The key is to get back up, dust yourself off and keep moving ahead, and that's how we make things happen."

Bradfield's message last month mirrored his club's slogan of "Dream It, Plan It, Do It." Each year, members have raised funds and awareness for diabetes research with well-publicized events and snowmobile rides to extreme destinations. His organization's name stems from its inaugural ride in 2010 from Mich(igan) to Can(ada) to (Ala)Ska, and their most ambitious trip to date was earlier this year to Russia.

Billed as the 2015 World Snowmobile Tour, MichCanSka's adventure to St. Petersburg actually began three years ago when Bradfield and others started recruiting hosts and participants at the ISC in Green Bay, Wis. With Bradfield taking care of the U.S. portion of the trip, ambassadors stepped forward to coordinate the group's passage through Canada, Scandinavia and Russia.

Seven riders completed all three segments of the World Tour, while another 55 riders participated in varying legs of the journey. The trip began Feb. 7 in Cadillac, Mich., and ended 22 days later in St. Petersburg. Along the way, riders crossed into Canada, flew to Norway and rode across Sweden and Finland.

Equipped with satellite tracking devices, the entourage was then escorted to the Russian border and began a four-day ride to the city of Murmansk. There, they boarded a flight to St. Petersburg for the grand finale and banquet. Collectively, the group racked up 54,660 miles on their sleds with another 50,000 miles in the

"The Russians treated us more special than anybody did," Bradfield said. "I knew the people who were helping coordinate the trip over there, and I knew I could count on them. They went overboard for us."

Also providing inspiration for the trip was fellow Michigan snowmobiler David Low. Now 88, Low has participated in every MichCanSka event since the beginning, and he became "an icon in Russia" on this latest trip.

"When we rode into Russia, he was right there by my side," Bradfield noted.

Hailed as Michigan's "Supreme Senior Citizen," Low joined Bradfield on his visit to the ISSA convention last month and shared a few of his thoughts on the World Tour. "I got a little tired, but I enjoyed every minute of it," he said, smiling.

## Fundraising Exceeds \$200,000

While Alaska and Russia have grabbed most of the headlines, MichCanSka has also completed shorter group rides since its inception in 2009. That first trip to Tot, Alaska, however, has been the most successful, raising more than \$100,000. To date, the club has contributed more than \$200,000 to diabetes research through pledges and donations. Not too bad for a club in only its sixth year of existence.

"I have a passion in my heart for what I do, and I'm proud of what this group has done, but I didn't do this Turn to page 19

# Exploring Minnesota's North Shore



2015 Extended Weekend Trip to

the Arrowhead Serves as Reunion Ride to First Snowmobile Destination

Flatlanders looking to escape the brown landscape of Iowa last season while staying within a reasonable driving distance of home basically had two options available to them to justify their ownership of a snowmobile: the Upper Peninsula of Michigan and the Arrowhead region of Minnesota.

Faced with the prospects of not getting any riding around home, I made extended weekend treks to both areas last winter. The first outing sent us north of Duluth Feb. 8-10, while the second trip occurred a month later March 2-5 as part of the ISSA's late season retreat to the U.P.

Loosely organized, the first trip was a spontaneous reunion to the Finland, Minn., area, a destination we had experienced early on in our snowmobiling careers 14 years ago. Back then, the rides were old, and our gear didn't match, but the snowmobiling, hospitality and storytelling were memorable.

Hoping to recreate that nostalgia, we departed Iowa early Saturday evening, Feb. 7 and stayed with some high school friends on the south side of the Twin Cities that night. The following morning, we crossed over to the top side of the metro area to pick up a college buddy and continued north.

Call it risky, but we had decided to wait on making any lodging arrangements until we arrived in the Arrowhead later that afternoon. Naturally suspicious of the online trail reports, we didn't want to make any commitments and get locked into an area that had marginal snow before we touched down.

Judging by the amount of two- and four-

place trailers heading south on the way up, we felt somewhat reassured the area should have good riding conditions and the hotels should have plenty of vacancies.

For most of the way up to Duluth, the scenery hadn't changed much from the dismal brown we had left behind in Iowa. Our outlook began to change when we reached Two Harbors and the snow cover began to look a little more consistent.

After fueling up the tow vehicle, we stopped at a nearby trailhead to gauge the snow depth and to determine if we should stay there or press further north. After a 2-1 vote, we jumped back into the truck.

We eventually landed at the Americinn at Silver Bay. The parking lot at the hotel was void of any snowmobile trailers, but according to the front desk clerk, the weekend had been busy with like-minded individuals. They had plenty of vacancies so we took advantage of their stay-andsnowmobile package and unloaded for our three-day trip.

## **Heading to Wildhurst**

On the trail by 4 p.m., we decided to ride up to the Wildhurst Lodge past Finland. This rustic venue had been our base camp the last time we were in the area, and we felt it was good ride to get reacquainted with the area and Wildhurst owner, LeRoy Teschendorf.

By now, the snow which had been predicted for this area along Lake Superior, was starting to fall. The trails were pretty thin along the shore and through town, but once we ventured further into the woods, the base thickened up and the fresh snow made it an easy 30-mile push to LeRoy's place.

Except for a few laps around the house

with my boys, this jaunt through the Finland State Forest was my first ride of the 2014-15 season. Reinvigorating, it easily cooled the sting of my tune-up bill from the preseason, and now more than halfway through winter, it was finally nice to get back in the saddle and squeeze the throttle.

We arrived at Wildhurst shortly after supper. LeRoy was open and was actually surprised to get some snowmobilers through there. The lackluster season—like everywhere else—had hurt tourism, he said, in the north woods, but the fresh snow and the next morning's plan to groom were sure to draw more people to the area the following weekend, he hoped.

From what we could see in the dark, the lodge and campground were just as we remembered. We shared our stories with its owner from the last time we were there and then bid farewell with a promise to return later in the week.

Saving our energy for the next day, we doubled back to Finland for supper at Our Place and then *planned* to return to the hotel. But after satisfying our hunger, we pulled out the map and decided to save some time by cutting down the Lax Lake Trail. It seemed like a good idea at the time.

We did make it to the lake but had a difficult time finding our way to the other side as the lake wasn't staked. We followed some of the plow roads to the ice fishing shacks but never found the south side trail connection. Tooling around an unmarked lake in the middle of the night hadn't been one of our brightest decisions ever so we retreated back to the Hawk Hollow Trail intersection.

In hindsight, we should have known better. The Lax Lake Trail hadn't been ridden too much, and we later learned the local club had stopped maintaining it because the groomer kept getting stuck in

the swampy areas.

From the Hawk Hollow trail, we turned south on the Blue Jay Vista Trail and wound our way back toward Silver Bay, ending with 52 miles for the night. The next day, eager to put on some miles, we decided to push on up to Grand Marais on the shore of Lake Superior.

## C.J. Ramstad Trail

As it would every morning, the first segment of the ride on Monday was the main trail from Silver Bay to Minnesota Corridor 60, otherwise known as the North Shore Trail. This 146-mile corridor trail stretches from Duluth on the south and ends at the intersection with the Gunflint Trail at Grand Marais.

Since 2009, this trail has also been called the C.J. Ramstad Memorial Trail as a tribute to the late pioneering snowmobile journalist. In addition to writing four books, Ramstad founded Snow Week magazine and contributed to several other industry publications. A charter member of the International Snowmobile Hall of Fame (ISHOF), he died in an automobile accident in 2007.

Sad to say as a fellow snowmobile writer,

I was unaware of the name change until we reached the shelter at the intersection of the North Shore Trail and the local corridor trail. I had met C.J. at a few International Snowmobile Congress and ISHOF events and am familiar with his work, including his racing photography.

In a promotional piece for Explore Minnesota, Ramstad once called this trail a "treasure" for the Arrowhead region. I won't disagree. The corridor is fairly wide and has generous curves to make for a nice ride. The path is lined with snow-capped trees, and the early morning frost made for a postcard scene around every corner.

The trail is also known for its dramatic elevation changes, and from the vistas, we could easily tell how close we were getting to Lake Superior and our turnaround point at My Sister's Place in Grand Marais. After dinner there, we doubled back to the hotel, ending the day's run at roughly 180 miles.

As Sunday had been, Tuesday was going to be a travel day so our riding was fairly abbreviated. By early afternoon, we were loading back up for Iowa. We ended the three-day ride at 370 miles but left refreshed, remembering why we own snowmobiles in the first place.

down the certification route."

According to program officials, recertification also helps to keep the list of operators current with the IDNR's records. Willey said when he took over the groomer training program four years ago, state records were still showing operators who, for example, had moved to Florida or who were deceased.

In an effort to clean up the card-issuing process, Willey and IDNR Snowmobile Education Coordinator Rhonda Fowler handed out packets to club members at convention. In those expanded files were operator cards for those who have successfully completed the process as well as spreadsheets showing which operators required additional information.

By a show of hands and as listed on the enclosed paperwork, several operators in Iowa still need to complete the groomer operator checklist in order to receive their cards. Requiring an in-cab ride-along and a signature from a club official vouching for his or her performance, the checklist verifies that he or she can efficiently and effectively run the groomer.

"We need a checklist from every operator to have on file," Willey said. "Once the IDNR gets that checklist back, they will mail the card to that person. If someone took the class but didn't have enough snow last season to run the groomer and complete the checklist, they can still finish it this season and get their card."

Operators who have mailed in a completed checklist but have yet to receive their cards can still operate a groomer this winter. If a conservation officer asks for their cards while they are out grooming, they will be able to contact Willey to verify their eligibility. Willey said he keeps the spreadsheet on his mobile phone so it's available at any time.

"You can run the equipment as long as the club has signed off on it," he said.

If a club was not at convention to receive its operator packet, the materials were to be sent home with their respective region director for distribution.

"If you get a card in your packet and the operator is not a member of your club, please let us know and get that card back to us so we can get it to the proper person," Willey encouraged. "Let us know if we have wrong information on there so we can get it corrected as well."

In addition to the groomer workshop Saturday afternoon, an operator course was held at convention Sunday morning. Three others are currently scheduled throughout the state this month: Dec. 2 at Rudd, Dec. 3 at Mount Pleasant and Dec. 12 at Stratford.

While all new operators will always be required to attend a class in person, Willey indicated the state snowmobile program is presently identifying ways to simplify the recertification process. This shift may include offering courses electronically, as adopted by other states.

"Over the next two years, we are going to develop some sort of online recertification process or offer a video with a checklist," Willey said. "We don't know what that is going to look like yet, but we do know other states are doing this. Hopefully, we will have something to roll out by next year's convention."

alone," Bradfield said. "387 million people are suffering from diabetes worldwide. Someone is diagnosed with the disease every 17 seconds. We need to raise funds to get that thing cured."

Bradfield likened his organization's mission to what the ISSA does and has done for its official charity, the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa. He said many children of Vietnam veterans suffer from this condition due to exposure to Agent Orange as well, and while admiring what the ISSA has done for spina bifida, he also asked the association to support MichCanSka's goals as well.

"We would like to encourage you to keep doing the things you are doing with your charity now in Iowa, but we would also like to invite you join in our cause if you can," Bradfield said. "I would love to help set up a program in your state and invite you on some of our rides in the future."

Up next for MichCanSka is a pair of abbreviated trips this winter. The first is from the Upper Peninsula of Michigan to International Falls, Minn. Later on, Bradfield will lead a group of snowmobilers from Yellowstone National Park to the Black Hills of South Dakota. After that, the next major event will take place in 2017 when members plan to ride from Maine to Alaska. Bradfield described that proposed trip as "the granddaddy of them all."

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
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
