Hoermann hands reins over to Willey; region incumbents remain in director spots

Past ISSA President Mery Hoermann hopped on a plane hopped hopped on a plane bound for Denver the third Monday in November, having just completed his second two-year term as association leader and craving a muchneeded break over the Thanksgiving Day holiday.

Hoermann departed knowing organization he was leaving behind was

in the capable of hands successor, former vice-president Chris Willey. The pair had passed the gavel during

ceremonies two nights earlier at the 43rd Annual ISSA Convention.

"I just want to say that our organization is strong and growing," Hoermann said at the Saturday evening banquet. "I wish Chris and the board success here in the next two years, and I feel confident they will get the job done. I'll still be around and will hopefully get to ride more now and get to some new areas around the state."

Hoermann leaves office as the first ISSA president to hold that title twice in two separate terms. He last led the association from 2007-08. He received a clock and a plaque recognizing his years of service and shared the honor with those snowmobilers in attendance.

"It takes more than one individual to do what we do. It takes everyone in this room," he acknowledged. "I want to thank the board for supporting me over the past two years. We had a lot of challenges and were able to work through them to keep our organization strong.

"We may not always agree at meetings, but when we leave, we remain friends. There are no strangers here; just friends we have not yet met," Hoermann continued.

"Be sure to invite new people to get out and ride. Take them out; show them what we got. Be proud of what we have."

Held at the Five Sullivan Brothers Convention Center in Waterloo, the 2016 affair, held Nov. 18-20, drew approximately 140 members to Region 4. A snow show featuring late model sleds, grooming equipment, apparel and snowmobile club displays shared the floor with the general assembly.

"I thought the convention went over well, and we have received a lot of positive feedback on the weekend overall," reported Region 4 Director Scott Nauman, chair of the 2016 ISSA Convention Planning Committee.

As an even-numbered year, elections

Sue Paulus agreed to stay on as secretary. The association is currently looking for a new treasurer as Kim Herman announced in August she would be stepping down after convention.

Through various speakers and seminars, members in attendance heard updates from the ISSA's lobbyist, the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA), the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and on new programs being rolled out by the ISSA. Annual award winners were recognized Saturday evening as well.

Iowa snowmobile clubs also broke out their wallets that weekend, donating \$6,876 to the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa, \$4,076 to the Club Challenge, \$600 to the ISSA's Communications Committee and \$400 to the ISSA's Education and Scholarship Foundation.

Another \$1,500 was raised for the scholarship program through a Camso track raffle and Sally Carmichael quilt raffle. The ISSA's Promotional Committee also sold \$405 in ISSA apparel at the event.

The ISSA's new youth program received a financial kickstart with close to \$300 raised at convention, half of which came from Hoermann having to buy back his issues of the *Iowa Snowmobiler* magazine. As the convention shifts to the eastern third of the state, the 2017 convention moves to Cedar Rapids next November and will be hosted by clubs in Region 9.

Eastern Iowa Siedheads Move up to Region 9

Tust a month after being assigned to the **J** newly-created Region 10, the Eastern Iowa Sledheads petitioned the ISSA Board of Directors in November to move up to Region 9.

Club President Mindy Scott made the request at the Sunday morning board meeting, Nov. 20, and cited her members' proximity to the desired region and to neighboring clubs which are already in that area.

"The region split between Regions 9 and 10 is Highway 22," Scott explained. "More than half of our trail system is above Highway 22. Also, our club, the Cedar County Winter Warriors and the Snowdrifters all have members in either two of the three clubs or all three clubs, like ourselves. To us, it made more sense to continue to be in the same region as the other two clubs."

The decision to place the Sledheads in Region 10 initially was to leverage the club's experience for new director Aaron Dorothy. The club's departure now leaves just three clubs in Region 10 and increases the count in Region 9 to nine. Both region directors agreed to the change, and the board approved the request.

Earlier that weekend, the ISSA General Membership ratified the board's creation of an enlarged Region 10 and the elimination of Regions 11 and 12 during the Saturday morning assembly at the 2016 ISSA Annual Convention. Members overwhelmingly approved the change in the relevant sections of the by-laws, which referenced the reduction of 12 regions down to 10.

Schnoebelen explains changes to state snowmobile program at convention

SSA officials are uncomfortable with the Iowa Department of ⚠ Natural Resources' (IDNR) plan to carry over approximately 10 percent of the annual revenue from snowmobile registrations and trail pass sales to the following season.



Based on a budget of \$750,000, the IDNR wants to reserve a little more than \$80,000 each year to either serve as a "cushion" for the current season or act as seed money for the next season. The ISSA, on the other hand, wants all available money allocated to clubs for snowmobile

trail maintenance and improvements.

For more than a decade, the ISSA, in step with previous management, has worked with the state snowmobile program to obligate as much of the funds as possible to avoid a repeat of May of 2002, when the Iowa Legislature swept nearly \$1 million from the program's coffers.

Now, as reported by new program head Randy Schnoebelen at the 2016 ISSA Convention in Waterloo last month, the budget handed down from the IDNR director's staff mandates the buffer, which means those funds will now sit unprotected during the offseason.

"That makes me more than a little nervous," said newly-elected ISSA President Chris Willey. "Who knows how much will actually be in there when the snow melts based on the revenue coming in this fall with registrations and with trail passes this winter."

Willey said the ISSA is committed to keeping a close eye on the till and promises to remain in communication with Schnoebelen as the season progresses. He has assembled a team of ISSA board members to assist him in the cause, many of whom already serve on the ISSA's Emergency Funding Committee (EFC) created in the wake of the money grab 14 years ago.

"We are all running scared if we are going to carry money over to next year," said Past ISSA President Dennis Nauman, who served from 2001-02 and is a charter member of the EFC.

"We want to make sure we are prudent with snowmobile registration dollars and trail pass money," added Past ISSA President Jim Willey, another member of the team. "We all want it to go back to the program and nobody is saying that it doesn't. We know we have to reset here, but carrying over \$80,000 that could have helped the clubs with their expenses this year should not be a goal."

Afternoon Seminar Cites Overspending

Many of the concerns and comments were voiced during the

IDNR's Saturday afternoon seminar at convention. At times contested, the session was slated to last an hour and a half but ran nearly 45 minutes long due to the concerns with the IDNR's new administration of the state snowmobile program.

Gone now is David Downing, who led the program since 2004 and worked hand-in-hand with the ISSA to update the state's aging groomer fleet over the past decade. Previously, Downing managed the department's finances based on revenue projections, which led to overspending, according to the IDNR.

In 2014 and 2015, program expenditures exceeded revenue by an average of \$450,000, and for three months last season, "there was absolutely no money in the program," according to Rhonda Fowler, snowmobile education coordinator for the IDNR who is helping to bridge the transition from Downing to Schnoebelen.

Now, the department is managing the program's funds with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), and money can no longer be obligated until it is on deposit. Schnoebelen, a 30-year IDNR veteran and current conservation officer supervisor in Clear Lake, has been charged with policing the program. He assumed control in July.

"What I saw right away was an opportunity to make this program more fiscally sound," Schnoebelen said. "We need to try to get a better understanding of the budget so both sides know how much is there and so we don't overspend. In the past, they were spending revenue that was perceived to be coming in. All of sudden when that doesn't pan out, we overspend."

For 2016-17, groomer purchases are currently on hold as the program works to buy out four existing groomer leases in the state. Trail grant awards to snowmobile clubs were reduced by

\$80,000, and the IDNR grant to the ISSA to cover expenses related to groomer training, education and in-state travel was capped at \$19,580.

"When they told me to take over this program, upper management said to make it fiscally responsible," Schnoebelen said. "By June 30 next year, we want to make sure it shows in the black because the state does not like to run in the red. We are trying to get through these issues so we can build the fund back up again. It's going to take a couple of lean years."

"That is how this budget is being created and that's how it's going to be managed going forward," added Fowler. "There is a lot more involvement in this program from the director's office on down. We did not follow GAAP procedures before. We don't have a choice any more. We don't get to choose the carry-over amount. The director's office and his budget staff does that. They are creating a system that's going to create sustainability. I know it's going to hurt right now."

Fool Me Once...

The pain will increase if history repeats itself and the fund is swept again. While the depleted snowmobile dollars were eventually returned in 2008, ISSA officials are still spooked by the possibility of the move happening again. Schnoebelen feels legislators have learned their lesson. ISSA Lobbyist Mike Heller said it's a valid concern from snowmobilers.

"Everything we are hearing for this upcoming session is money is tighter," Heller told ISSA members during the Saturday morning brunch at convention. "The mood is to not increase government spending in any way, so if there is money left over in your fund, that would be a legitimate concern, and we should be worried about it. That's why we need to make a case to legislators that the money is there for a purpose. It's there for trails, maintenance and education.





Despite airing their differences at the IDNR seminar Nov. 19, Randy Schnoebeln and Past ISSA President Jim Willey were able to talk through most of their issues after the meeting.

"It would be naïve to say they are not looking at every source of funding. There's going to be a lot of pressure to cut back on government," Heller continued.

"I understand that fear," Schnoebelen admitted. "I was there when it happened in 2002, and I did not approve of it. You have to have the confidence in your association and your lobbyist. There were other agencies that had their money swept too, but you guys were the only ones who were able to lobby the legislators and get those funds back into your program.

"Legislators learn from their mistakes," he continued. "If they try to do that again, I trust your association and your lobbyist will remind them of what happened in the past and they will learn from their mistakes."

Schnoebelen said continuing to make decisions based on the past is what led to the program's ultimate downfall earlier this year. He is looking to wipe the slate clean, improve communication with the snowmobilers in the state and move forward.

"We are going to start from here and have better communication on what goes on," Schnoebelen said. "The mentality of 'We work for you or you work for us' is not going to get us anywhere. We need to come up with a better way of communicating so we can work together. We need to bring it together and improve on the program so we can all achieve the same goal, which is to have a good, renewable activity that we can be proud of and enjoy doing and bring new people into the sport."

"We all want this program to survive and thrive," Jim Willey responded. "We have a long history of cooperation with the IDNR. We want to continue that, but jamming a new way of doing things down our throat is not the way to do it. We need to work together and provide more input into both sides of the budget. We can get by for a couple of years without buying groomers, but not long term.

'We need to have a plan that makes sense because we have clubs which still need groomers," Willey continued. "Our fleet is much better off now than 10 years ago, and we need to continue that progress."

"Within the constraints of administrative rules, we want to work with you as much as possible," Fowler said. "We can't go outside those rules, but if there's anything we can do and that is eligible and can work with you on, we have an obligation to do so."

Club Challenge Renewed

Heller talks election impact, importance of relationships during convention update

For the 12th year in a row, Iowa snowmobile clubs reaffirmed their belief in the ISSA's lobbying efforts by donating generously to the ISSA's Legislative Action Fund—otherwise known as the Club Challenge—at the 43rd Annual ISSA Convention in Waterloo last

Already exceeding half of the \$7,827 total collected in 2016, the

2017 fundraising campaign kicked off with \$4,076 in donations from 13 clubs. Their checks were accepted during the Saturday morning, Nov. 19, General Membership Assembly at the Five Sullivan Brothers Convention Center.

"The Club Challenge is the most important thing we do to support our lobbying efforts," Past ISSA President Jim Willey said. "Just to put everything in perspective: If you are sick, you need a doctor; if you get in trouble with the law, you need a lawyer; if you need help with a legislative issue in Des Moines, you need a lobbyist. And we have one of the best teams."

Des Moines area lawyers Mike Heller and Paula Feltner were retained by the association in November of 2002 following the Iowa Legislature's de-appropriation of nearly \$1 million in snowmobile program coffers in May of that year. Their dedicated efforts and tireless work has not stopped since, and Heller said he is proud of their accomplishments over the years.

"You guys are an interesting group," Heller said during his annual convention address at the late Saturday morning brunch. "We found that out several years ago when you retained us. We learned very early on how much passion snowmobilers have for their sport, how much you care about it, how much it means to you and how much it should mean to legislators in Des Moines."

Not Letting Off the Gas

Starting out at \$17,500, the lobbyists' annual fee now stands at \$23,500, and the ISSA treasury depends greatly on the Club Challenge to meet that financial obligation. The balance of the contract must be covered by the general fund as any grant money received from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) cannot be spent on legislative issues.

Willey said the ISSA's lobbying effort ranks high on the organization's list of priorities. When Heller and Feltner were first hired, their only task was to recover the funds from the legislative sweep. Along with the grassroots efforts of snowmobilers across Iowa and the dedication of the ISSA's Emergency Funding Committee, they were able to convince state legislators to restore the money in 2008.

But the work didn't stop there. Up next was the ISSA's push to move from a biennial registration system to an annual renewal period and to implement a snowmobile trail pass to increase available funding to update the state's aging groomer fleet. Beginning in earnest at the 2010 ISSA convention, that effort came to fruition during the 2013-14 snowmobile season.

Along the way, Heller and Feltner have kept a close eye on the snowmobile program in Des Moines and have helped to

further other ISSA initiatives at the Statehouse. Not all have been successful—such as recovering a portion of the state fuel taxes paid by off-road snowmobilers or getting a kickback on the state sales tax paid on snowmobiles—but several minor issues have paid off.

For example, last year, the Iowa Legislature quietly approved a specialty snowmobile license plate where a portion of the sales will benefit a charity of the ISSA's choosing. Officials are still working on this new offering, and more details will be released as they become available.

"It seems like some groups go a year or two without having an issue," Heller noted. "I looked back 10 years, and you guys have had an issue just about every year."

One Sticker, Please

Looking ahead to the upcoming legislative session, the ISSA's lobbyists will be asked to keep tabs on the snowmobile fund as the IDNR transitions to a new program head and new accounting procedures. Other potential pursuits include incoming ISSA President Chis Willey's desire to move to a single registration

"One of the biggest challenges we are facing now is to get back to one sticker," Chris Willey said. "Leave the trail pass system in place for out-of-state riders, but Iowa residents should only need

As most organized snowmobilers will recall, the trail pass became a consolation prize to the ISSA's push to double the snowmobile registration fee to \$30. Most legislators were not in favor of a fee

increase, so the trail permit system was proposed and approved to generate the much-needed revenue for trail maintenance and improvements.

What resulted from that action was the need for two stickers on a snowmobile windshield: one for the registration and the other for a trail permit. The pass is not required for private land use but is needed on public snowmobile trails, frozen bodies of water and Iowa right-of-ways. Since it is perceived by some as voluntary, permit purchases lag behind registration numbers by approximately 6,000 stickers annually.

'Just think if we could just capture those riders who choose not to buy a trail pass," Chris Willey said.

Building Relationships

The Iowa Legislature convenes in January with Republicans controlling both the House (59-41) and Senate (29-20-1). Heller urged snowmobilers to get acquainted with their new or reelected legislators as he said the snowmobile community lost key supporters due to incumbents choosing not to run last month.

"We are going to have to start over building relationships," Heller noted. "Make sure you invite your local legislators to your club meetings and get them to understand you care about responsible snowmobiling, and you want to do it in a way that is beneficial to tourism. It's a message that we are going to have work on."

Linda Upmeyer, R-Clear Lake, remains Speaker of the House and, according to Heller, "has a very good relationship with snowmobilers." On the other hand, Dick Dearden, D-Des Moines, has retired, and Josh Byrnes, R-Osage, decided to not seek reelection. Heller considered both of those state legislators friends of snowmobiling.

"It's going to be important to participate in any opportunity you have to meet with your elected officials and discuss the issues you have," Heller said.

"There's been a changing of the guard, and people are looking at this election as being about less government, less spending, less fees," he continued. "I think both parties are going to understand that message. I think we are fortunate to have had the legislation passed in the past."

Family Tradition

Three sons of past ISSA presidents poised for future of organized snowmobiling in lowar

Proving the apple does not fall far from the tree, three sons of past ISSA presidents assumed leadership roles within the organization following elections last month at the 2016 ISSA Annual Convention in Waterloo.

Chris Willey, son of Jim Willey (2013-14), continued his ascension up the ladder and began his two-year term as president during the Sunday morning ISSA Board of Directors meeting. He and his father hold the distinction of being the first father-son tandem to hold that title within

the ISSA.

2016 ISSA Convention Review Moving up from his role as an assistant director, Brian Carmichael, son of the late David Carmichael (1995-96), agreed to serve as vice president under Willey; and Scott Nauman, son of Dennis Nauman (2001-02) was re-elected to a second term as Region 4 director.

Joined by a few select past ISSA presidents, all three will volunteer on a special hand-picked team formed by the junior Willey to keep an eye on the state snowmobile program as the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) transitions to a new manager and new accounting practices.

"We need to maintain a working relationship with the IDNR, but we need to make sure it is in the snowmobiler's favor," Willey explained following Saturday morning's election. "We want to make sure they are getting the funding back to the clubs and not getting lost in the red tape. We want to make it as easy as possible for members to apply for the funding, maintain their groomers and buy fuel.

"It all takes paperwork and we need to track it, but it shouldn't be the long, drawn-out process that it has evolved into," he continued. "It needs to be simpler. You should not need a degree to apply for trail grant funding."

Not Pressured to Serve

As legacies within the ISSA, Willey, Carmichael and Nauman take their new responsibilities seriously; and while they all credit their fathers for their involvement in organized snowmobiling in Iowa, they feel a greater dedication to the snowmobile community to ensure the program and sport can flourish in the future. Resoundingly, they said they did not feel pressured to serve on the board.

"Snowmobiling is a family sport, and the ISSA is a family tradition," Willey said. "I don't think any of our dads said we had to do this. They have left that up to us to decide on our own. We are doing this because we feel obligated to look out for snowmobilers as there are some things which have fallen by the wayside that need to be brought back in."

"This wasn't part of the plan originally when I first joined the board," Carmichael added. "I know these are big shoes to fill, and I want to do the best I can with the people around me. I plan to listen to people and help out where I can. I feel we can bring a younger perspective to the board as we are always talking about getting younger people involved."


"You get to a point in snowmobiling when there's a time to step up as new blood coming in. We want to continue on with what needs to be taken care of," Nauman said. "The ISSA has been part of my life since I was baby.

This is just the next step. Organized snowmobiling without the ISSA does not just happen. It

Each sharing stories of their early introduction to the sport and the ISSA—either attending conventions or meetings as a kid or riding on snowmobiles with their parents around the backyard—the trio said they are proud to further the work started by their fathers, but they also have plans of their own.

"They are our dads, and of course, they have been influential. We are going to honor some of their traditions, but we are going to make some adjustments to keep the ISSA popular with the next generation," Willey said. "The thought-process with snowmobilers has completely changed because of today's environment."

In their new roles, they said they want to make the ISSA relevant to a younger generation of riders as the demographic continues to evolve through social media and new snowmobile technology. The impact of both the weather and the economy will also play a role in this effort, and they don't want to discriminate







against any rider out there.

They acknowledged that snowmobilers in Iowa are willing to travel out of state to either find snow or because their taste in riding has changed. Whether it's high-markers or flat-landers, the threesome said they need to "capture those riders" because they still call Iowa home. As an organization, the ISSA should consider all aspects of the sport within the state.

"There are still plenty of people who want to ride in Iowa, and that's not lost on any of us," Willey said. "But I'm not going to pigeon-hole us to one set group or generation. We are all snowmobilers, and we all need to work together. Younger riders need to look at the sport from the older perspective and the older generation needs to look at it from the younger generation.

"This dialogue is important," he continued. "If we don't get the younger ones involved, we're not going to have an organization in the future. And if the younger ones don't know how to do it, we're not gaining anything either."

To that end, the ISSA revived its youth program at convention, and continuing the family tradition, Willey's 14year-old daughter, Isabelle, has been tasked with coming up with new ideas to attract her generation to the sport. Following the recommendation of Region 7 Director John Kahler, they are calling the program KISS, Kids Intentionally Supporting Snowmobiling.

"We're looking for more ideas to expand the youth program," Chris Willey explained. "Weather permitting, we are looking to have a youth ride somewhere in the state this winter. Izzy is still learning the ropes, and she wants to promote the youth initiative around the state and fashion it after a similar program in Wisconsin."

Diekhuis Follows Parents' Footsteps

As the family patriarch, Jim Willey said he is proud of the roles the members of his family have assumed within the ISSA. He



hopes he has been able to inspire them in one way or another.

"We've all enjoyed being in the sport, and as a family, we support organized snowmobiling," he said. "I have worked very hard for the ISSA, and I know Chris will too. I'm excited to see some of the younger leadership we have available. We have a lot of second-generation members on the board, and I think that's great."

In addition to his son, Carmichael and Nauman, Willey was also referring to current Region 3 Assistant Director Ben Diekhuis, whose mother Jeanine served as ISSA Secretary from 1991-96 and whose father Jim was the director for Region 3 during the late 1980s.

Like the other board members his age, Diekhuis easily recalls his early invitation to the sport of snowmobiling and his attendance at conventions and other club functions as a kid. Watching his mother type up the board minutes on a typewriter in their kitchen, he said he is uniquely aware of the commitment it takes to run this organization.

"Growing up in that environment, I learned it takes a lot of work to make this all happen," Diekhuis said. "You just can't go out and ride. There are people working in the background to make it all possible."

With the infusion of younger board members, the elder Willey said the ISSA is well positioned for the future. As vice chair of the Midwest Chapter of the American Council of Snowmobile Associations. he said the ISSA is well respected in the national snowmobile community, and he


