

Legislative Update

Start Making Calls to Support Gas Tax Reimbursement

The time has come to once again make your presence felt in Des Moines. Please email your legislators today to support the allocation of the portion of the fuel tax on fuel used in snowmobiles going back to the snowmobile program as a part of the legislation when the fuel tax legislation is passed. It cannot be done as separate legislation

Iowa has done the allocation for boat fuel for many years. All the snowmobilers are asking is to have the same done for the snowmobile program as is already done for the boaters. Every other snowmobile state but Iowa already does this, and it is only fair to use the tax for fuel used in snowmobiles to provide snowmobile trails just as fuel used in highway vehicles go towards highways. Farm use fuel is also being exempted from highway fuel tax.

Thank you to the Iowa snowmobilers who have contacted their Iowa legislators to ask them to support the Iowa snowmobile program by receiving the gas tax we already pay when we put fuel into our sleds. We must have many more snowmobilers contact their legislators to let them know this is important to you!

If allocated, the funds from the Iowa gas tax will be enough to pay for one more new groomer every year. We need this to keep updating the old grooming equipment we still have out there. You are paying the tax on the fuel anyway; it is just not coming back to the snowmobile program.

Please take the time today to contact your legislators by phone, email or letter. Ask them to support Iowa snowmobiling by allocating the gas tax from fuel used in

As our lobbyist, Mike Heller, stated in his January update, "It is critical for ISSA members to contact their legislators and ask them to support putting fuel tax funds used off road in snowmobiles by snowmobilers into the Trail Fund. Legislators will not do it unless they hear from their constituents about the unfairness of the taxing snowmo-

bilers for roads when we are not using them on our snowmobiles."

The only way we will be successful in fighting the big lobbyists working against us on this is if your legislators know that getting the gas tax from snowmobiles back to the snowmobile program is important to you and to the thousands

of other voting snowmobilers in Iowa.

They need to hear from everyone. Please do not think someone else will take care of this. It will only be successful if you do your part. Iowa snowmobilers have motivated legislators to help us in the past; we can do it again if you act now.

We need every snowmobiler to do this. Every husband, wife and voting-age kid all need to send a message of support, and we need it now. If the language is not in the proposed legislation this year, we may not have the opportunity again for many years. The last time this came up was 1985. There is no way to know when the opportunity would be possible again. We need to get these snowmobile dollars back to snowmobiling now.

Please do your part, and send this message to every snowmobiler your know and ask them to do their part. Together, we will make a difference. With this success, we can turn our attention to getting it to snow, but that comes from a much higher authority than Des Moines.

ACSA Update

Important Face-to-Face Contact with Decision-Makers

The holidays are behind us, and credit L card bills are arriving. We all begin to focus on taxes and how to get out of paying more than we feel we should. Snowmobile trails are signed and (in some areas) groomed and are being ridden. And for those of us who snowmobile, we are in the middle of our favorite season. I hope you are all enjoying it and have been blessed with adequate snow.

I happen to live in an area that hasn't been so lucky yet, but I'm certainly not giving up hope. Depending on where you live, many are used to having to trailer to find good snow conditions on an annual basis. Others have the luxury of getting early snow, plenty of new snow and have riding conditions all winter long that many of us can only dream about. I envy those

Snowmobiling is truly an addiction in my opinion. It is a sport that consumes us year round. For the thousands of volunteers who assist at all different levels, it is a year-round commitment. Many belong to and serve at the local club level. Others get involved at the state, national and even international level

To all those volunteers everywhere, I'd like to say Thank You. Without all of you, snowmobiling as we know it today wouldn't exist. It's all of you that make the trails happen, the rules and legislation necessary for our protection and safety possible and the constant awareness of threats to our sport that become front and center to those who don't get involved.

I have the pleasure to serve all of you as the President of the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA). Chances are, if you're reading this, you are involved at some level in snowmobiling. You most likely belong to your local club, and in most cases as a result, also belong to your state association. You then, in turn, become affiliated with ACSA.

We are the umbrella organization that monitors and watches out for your snowmobiling interests at a variety of levels. We serve as watchdogs regarding continuous and ongoing threats to our sport and where we ride. Over the years, ACSA has built and nurtured relationships with decision-makers at the national level in various areas of government. These relationships have proven to be invaluable when "knowing the right people" has been a critical part of favorable outcomes

regarding potential closures to some of our favorite areas to ride.

ACSA currently has one full-time executive director and one part-time office person. The governance of ACSA is the responsibility of volunteers who serve, for no other reason except, for the fact that they love the sport of snowmobiling.

The ACSA Board of Directors is made

up of delegates from each of our member Associations. ACSA works closely with each state Association and the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association to stay on top of issues that arise and policies that could have a negative impact on our sport. In addition, ACSA has a close working relationship with the Canadian Council

of Snowmobile Organizations, our sister entity in Canada.

As many of you know, each June, snowmobilers get together at the Snowmobile International Congress (ISC) to network and, together, work on snowmobile-related issues. Many other snowmobile-related organizations are also represented at Congress, making it one of the most critical annual snowmobile events. In June of 2015, we will gather in Niagara, N.Y., for the 2015 ISC. Chances are, your state delegate will attend and participate in this.

I feel the most critical function of ACSA is organizing the annual DC Fly-In. Each spring, delegates travel to Washington, D.C., to get the latest updates from those in the know regarding snowmobiling. Each chapter of ACSA holds meetings, we meet as the full ACSA Board, and for one full day of the trip, each delegate visits their Congressional delegates as a result of prearranged time slots by our ACSA staff. This puts us face-to-face with the decision makers or their staff to explain how critical our sport is to their state's economy and to provide them with valuable up-to-date snowmobile information.

Another critical function of ACSA is to provide financial support to defend ongoing and Continued on page 8



Forest Service Releases Final Snowmobile Rule

The U.S. Forest Service in late January **I** published a final rule that will regulate when and where over-snow vehicles (OSV, i.e. snowmobiles) can be used on national forest lands.

The final rule, which will take effect in about a month, will "provide a wide range of motorized and non-motorized recreational opportunities," explained U.S. Forest Service Chief Tom Tidwell. "This policy maintains community input and local decision-making so that those with knowledge of local areas can decide how to best balance natural resource issues with legitimate recreational uses of national forest land."

Established in 2005, the Travel Management Rule adopted a system in which local forest managers designated trails, routes and areas in which off-highway vehicle use was allowed or prohibited. Because snowmobile tracks melt with the snow, whether to use this specific regulatory system to manage over-snow vehicles was at the discretion of the land manager. In March of 2013, an Idaho federal judge ruled in favor of a lawsuit filed by the Winter Wildlands Alliance filed in November of 2011, requiring the Forest Service to conduct more analysis.

The American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) and the Idaho State Snowmobile Association—with substantial support from the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) appealed the decision against the Forest Service. This appeal is currently ongoing. Blue Ribbon Coalition is also listed as a participant in the appeal.

The proposed rule was published on June 18, 2014, and the Forest Service received and analyzed thousands of comments that were received during the comment period. Along with ACSA, ISMA and the other participants in the appeal filed detailed public comments. Based on its findings, the Forest Service issued the final rule.

The final rule will now require that each Forest Service unit and/or ranger district

which has adequate snowfall to support OSV use, develop an OSV plan that decides which routes, trails and areas should be open to snowmobiling, unless the unit already has such a plan in place.

This rule will provide consistency in how over-snow vehicle use is allowed by requiring the publication of maps designating trails, routes and areas where snowmobiles are allowed. Those forests that have already

made decisions on OSV use—with public involvement-will not be required to go through that process again and current use may continue, unless unit chooses to reopen its prior decision. Thus, a substantial number of forests will not be required to go through

this process again.

For those forests that must conduct proceedings to designate trails, routes and areas as open or closed to snowmobile use, current use is protected on an interim basis while the unit conducts the proceeding. The Final Rule explains it this way:

"Until designation for a unit or district are complete and an OSV-use map indentifying those designations is published, existing **OSV** travel management policies, restrictions and orders remain in effect. Use of NFS roads. NFS trails and areas on NFS lands consistent with current OSV travel management decisions and management objectives may continue."

The rule provides for the creation of OSVuse maps. It also modifies the definition for an "area" to encompass over-snow vehicle use over a broader landscape. The Forest Service explains that this recognizes that cross-country snowmobile use may be appropriate in areas in which cross-country use by wheeled off-highway vehicles would not be Continued on page 8

Look Before You Pump Campaign

The International Snowmobile ■ Manufacturers Association consumer protection program.

The campaign reminds consumers to always use fuels containing no greater than 10 percent ethanol when powering their outdoor power equipment or other non-road product, such as boats, snowmobiles and motorcycles, not designed for higher ethanol fuel blends.

The 'Look Before You Pump' campaign is most known by its emblematic prominent, red warning hand symbol indicating 'OK' for 10 percent ethanol and 'No' for mid-level ethanol blends (such as E15, E30, E85). The campaign was launched in October of 2013 in response to higher ethanol blended fuels being made available in the marketplace for 'flex-fuel' automobiles, and to warn consumers not to inadvertently mis-fuel their engine products not designed to handle these higher ethanol fuel blends.

The level of support for 'Look Before You Pump' continues to grow. No one wants to damage or destroy their equipment. But

(ISMA) has partnered with the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute (OPEI) and the National Marine Manufacturers Association (NMMA) in the 'Look Before You Pump' campaign, an ethanol education and

the changing fuel marketplace demands education, as evidenced by retailers, dealers and manufacturers—and now major industry organizations—being more proactive in telling American consumers and business owners to be more mindful when selecting the right fuel for their products.

According to ISMA President Ed Klim, "it is important our customers know their fuel selection is important."

The National Marine Manufacturers Association also joined forces last summer in spreading the campaign messaging, and major retail outlets including Lowe's, Walmart and True Value, as well as independent dealers, began using the 'Look Before You Pump' message in their stores and in customer circulars and catalogs this past year.

A summer 2013 interactive study shows the vast majority of Americans (71 percent) are "not at all sure" if it is illegal or legal to put high level ethanol gas (i.e., anything greater than 10 percent ethanol) into engines such as those in boats, mowers, chainsaws, snowmobiles, generators and other engine products. According to Klim, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is on record stating that snowmobiles should NOT use fuel with more than 10 percent ethanol (E-10).

appropriate.

"Snowmobilers have participated in Forest Service planning for decades. Unfortunately it seems every time a Forest Service Plan is updated, snowmobilers lose trails and access," said ACSA President Duane Sutton. "With this new rule, snowmobilers must maintain their diligence in attending these meetings and participating in the planning process. Our participation is more important now than ever."

ACSA is very appreciative of the input and financial support from individual snowmobilers, snowmobile clubs, state associations and businesses throughout this process. ACSA looks forward to working with all of those individuals and organizations in the implementation of this rule.



ISU Team to Enter SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge in March

For the first time in the 12-year history of the SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge, a team from Iowa will be participating in the competition at the Keweenaw Research Center in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan next month.

Advised by Dr. Emmanuel Agba, 10 engineering students from Iowa State University will enter a 2014 Polaris Indy 800 snowmobile into the March 2-7 contest, hosted by the Department of Mechanical Engineering at Michigan Tech.

The ISSA has signed on as a Level 5 Sponsor of the Cy-Clean Racing team, and ISSA President Mery Hoermann has lent his expertise to the project. For the past 10 years, Hoermann has volunteered at the competition in the U.P.

"This is exciting to finally have a team from Iowa participating in this prestigious event," Hoermann said.

The Clean Snowmobile Challenge (CSC) started in 2003 in an effort to help snowmobile manufacturers meet the increased requirements from the Environmental Protection Agency for cleaner-burning, quieter and fuel-efficient snowmobiles.


According to its mission statement, the purpose of the ISU team is to expand upon classroom education in various fields through the design, modification and fabrication of a stock snowmobile as well as the management of a student-led competition team.

"Our CSC organization is an enthusiastic group of ISU students preparing to compete against other collegiate teams and represent snowmobiling in Iowa with high honor," explained team president Dan Clemens.

The first-year team continues to look for sponsors. Polaris Industries has already stepped up big with the donation of their

snowmobile. In addition to the ISSA, the North Iowa Sno-Jammers of Region 3 have kicked a Level 3 donation as well.

"As a first-year competitor, our needs for support are very high," Clemens said. "A great deal of equipment and supplies are necessary to operate the shop and past members have done a great job getting us equipped to become a top tier team. Any and all support is greatly appreciated!"

All donations are tax-deductible through the ISU Foundation. The team welcomes many forms of sponsorship, including material and service donations and general funding. Supporting the team also gives the donor recognition of supporting higher education.

"We have a great group of young college students who are willing to get involved with snowmobile research and development,' Clemens said. "We know that snowmobilers in Iowa are known across the country for their strong efforts in organization, volunteerism and charitable fundraising.'

According to Clemens, the \$1,000 donation from the ISSA will help offset a portion of the team's travel-related expenses. ISU has also furnished shop and office space, but the team has identified many other expenses which still need to be covered.

"We have many tools and equipment yet to purchase at this time and we are looking to the clubs, businesses and snowmobilers of Iowa to help meet our goals of being a very competitive team," Clemens said.

Educating the Future of Snowmobiling in Iowa

The ISSA Education and Scholarship Foundation (ISSAESF) awarded three \$1,000 scholarships to qualifying students of ISSA families in 2014, bringing the total number of students aided to 36 over the past 16 years.

The ISSA's scholarship program was created with the seed money left over from the ISSA's hosting of the International Snowmobile Congress in Cedar Rapids in 1995. The amount awarded each year is determined by the proceeds of its investments as well as the success of its fundraising efforts.

The first scholarship was awarded in 1998. Recipients have been as few as one and awards as little as \$200. Since 2007, the foundation has maintained scholarship levels at \$1,000 per student.

Recipients for 2014 included Hunter Thome of St. Ansgar, Mitchell County E-Z Riders, Region 4; Kara Denner of New Hampton, Chickasaw Sno-Riders of Region 4; and Ty Lauritsen of Exira, Raccoon Valley Snow Chasers.

The deadline for applying each year is April 15, and application materials can be found on the ISSA's website at www. iowasnowmobiler.com/issa/scholarship. The top applicant is then forwarded on to the international C.J. Ramstad Memorial Scholarship competition.

To qualify, the student or his/her family must be in good standing with the ISSA. The scholarship is based in part on need, and since 2012, each applicant is expected to acquire an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) rating number from the Iowa College Access Network at www.icansucceed.org.

To get this number, the student will be required to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. After filling out the FAFSA, the applicant will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) and be issued the required EFC number.

"This number is now required to be attached to the scholarship foundation application, replacing the requirement to furnish their parents' 1040 tax form with their application in the past," Andreini explained.

According to Andreini, many of the foundation's guidelines also follow those established by the International Snowmobile Media Council (ISMC) for its Ramstad scholarship, including judging applications for neatness, completeness, accurate spelling, correct grammar and school and community involvement.

"Keep all of this in mind when filling out your application; every required detail is important," Andreini said. "Take your time and follow the instructions as closely as possible; it will pay good dividends if you do. Carefully read the instructions listed

on the application information. They are very important items of instruction to follow for the Iowa program as well as for the international snowmobile scholarship."

The number of applications the ISMC receives in a yearly cycle is quite similar to what is received by ISSAESF, making the odds of our qualifying students receiving another \$1,000 scholarship very good," Andreini said.

Student applicants are also asked to write an essay on 'What Snowmobiling Means to Me.' Last year's submissions appear on pages 14-15 of this month's issue.

All decisions of the scholarship committee are final. Scholarship funds will be awarded when the school of choice confirms enrollment.

Andreini thanked everyone for their support of the program over the past 15 years. Since the scholarship program's inception, Iowa snowmobilers have contributed **Continued on page 16**

Camoplast donated a snowmobile track, which ISSA member Tyler Willey raffled off for \$1,000, while Carmichael's quilt raffle netted another \$775 through the drawing and subsequent auction.

Last fall, the Cedar Falls Sno Hawks raised more than \$660 for the scholarship foundation by selling coupon booklets at Younkers at College Square in Cedar Falls. Donations from clubs across Iowa were also recognized at convention and brought in another \$550.

"That is what it takes to make this program go," Andreini said. "We need to have that cooperation so please continue to support us, and we will continue to hand out scholarships. This is so important to support our kids with the cost of tuition going so high. Winning a scholarship makes a big difference to a lot of people."


