Guest Column

Effective Engagement with Members of Congress

For the past 15 years, I have felt it necessary to make regular trips to Washington, D.C., to promote snowmobile enthusiasts' access to public lands. These trips, initially prompted by the Clinton Administration's proposed ban on snowmobiles in all national parks, have given me a healthy perspective on the challenges facing those who petition Congress on behalf of "special interests."

For snowmobile enthusiasts, the media's assignment of a negative image to our "special interest" of maintaining public access to public lands complicates our mission. Specifically, Members of Congress from areas outside the snowbelt have been led to believe that our use of public lands is a net detriment to those lands. To counter this, most of my time in Washington, D.C. is spent undertaking non-partisan educational outreach to Senators and Members of Congress from states where it rarely, if ever, snows.

Because every vote counts, every newlyelected Congressman or Senator receives a full briefing on our issues. From the most conservative district in Texas to the most liberal in California, members and staff in each office are educated on the tremendous improvement in environmental performance from our sleds and the significant economic benefits generated by enthusiasts using a trail system painstakingly built and maintained by the dedicated volunteers who form the heart of every local snowmobile club.

As important as it is for me to educate the members, it is even more important that you effectively engage your own member of Congress or Senator to ensure that they are an advocate for your interests. While

that may sound as attractive as a root canal to many of you, it is important that you use your constitutional right to petition your elected officials. To assist you in this effort, following are suggestions on

> how to be effective when interacting with offices.

Research Topic Before Requesting a Meeting

Prior to making a call, developathorough understanding of the issue you wish to raise and the Member's (if position anv) on that issue. On emerging issues, your

chances of securing a favorable outcome are enhanced if you contact the office before the Member has formed a policy position. If it is a settled issue, understand that Members rarely change a prior position.

2. Be Realistic in Your Expectations


A demand that Congress balance the budget in 2016 is unrealistic. Requesting a Member to embrace the tough policy choices required to generate a balanced budget by 2025 is realistic. And so it is with our issues: Demanding unfettered access to wilderness areas is unrealistic, while requesting reasonable access to nonwilderness areas is realistic.

3. Be Concise, Polite, and Positive in Your Discussion

There are slightly less than 800,000 constituents in each Congressional District. While 30 minutes of face time with your Congressman/staff does not seem like much to ask after an arduous trip to D.C. (or his/her district office,) if each constituent demanded 30 minutes of time with their member they would have a hard time doing the job we elected them for (whatever that is these days!) So:

- Craft a 10-minute script for your meeting and leave some time for dialogue with the person you are meeting with.
- Do not become agitated if the Member is neutral or disagrees with your position, as it never leads to positive outcomes. Offending a Member or staffer could change their attitude from a neutral opponent to a dedicated opponent.
- · Seek out areas where a positive discussion is possible and then ease into areas of potential disagreement. Keep your Turn to page 5 radar up, and if

the feedback is negative, pull back and find something else positive to discuss.

4. Be Patient—Don't Expect Overnight Results or Miracles

Most Members—even the Speaker of the House—are very limited in what they can do. A determined opponent can be a formidable obstacle to the change you are seeking, so give Members a chance to advance your proposal. Call the office from time to time to make sure that the Member is up to speed on the latest developments on your issue. Offer to engage allies in other states to help generate support from other Members of Congress. And, make sure that your friends and neighbors are made aware of the effort being put forth by your Member of Congress.

5. Invite Them to a Community Event During the 100 or so annual office visits

I was at the Spina Bifida ride in Huxley in January. It was a balmy sub-zero day. But everything went as planned thanks to the careful and attentive planning of Past President Bruno Andreini. We didn't have

Seeing truly is believing, so invite your Member of Congress for a ride with your club. The Congressional gift ban prevents them from accepting anything of value, so keep the trip simple and maximize the face time the Member has with the local club and businesses. Invite a staff member as well. They may have the time available and will pass on the good word.

6. Thank Them for Making Time for You Never underestimate the power of a "Thank You." A kind word of thanks will pay dividends for you and your fellow club members.

regative temperatures and poor trail conditions didn't keep snowmobilers from across Iowa from converging on Huxley Jan. 10 for the 10th Anniversary Winter Kids Ride with the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa (SBAI), the ISSA's official charity.

The weather did cut attendance down to about half over previous years, but families and members from both organizations were able to spend the afternoon in fellowship over a meal, crafts and games and even a wheelchair basketball game at the Huxley Safe Room complex.

Highlighting the afternoon, as it has each year since 2007, was a trail ride through town for kids with spina bifida. Due to low snowcover, this year's ride once again featured utility vehicles (UTVs) parading their way through town in a police escort.

By design, the event is intended to give kids rides on snowmobiles so they can experience what ISSA members love about the winter, but when Mother Nature doesn't cooperate, organizers can easily adapt, including hosting a few hay rides in the absence of snow as well over the years.

While the ride brings everyone together, event organizer and Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini explained the real intent of the afternoon is for snowmobilers to get acquainted with the people and organization their donations support.

"We want to have kids do something that they wouldn't normally have a chance to do with their condition," said Andreini who serves as a liaison on the SBAI board. "But more importantly, we want to become acquainted with these families on a first-name basis and build a relationship with them, which will in turn give us extra incentive to do more for them."

The ISSA began supporting the SBAI in 1982. Dan Biller, chair of the SBAI Board of Directors, estimates snowmobilers have donated more than \$250,000 to his organization over the past three decades. Snowmobile clubs annually raise around \$8,000 for the SBAI and contributions are recognized at the annual ISSA convention. Some years raise more than others.

In 2015, more than \$10,000 was raised for spina bifida with the North Iowa Sno-Jammers earning top fundraising honors at the 2015 convention in Storm Lake. That Region 3 club alone contributed \$3,000 to the organization. SBAI Treasurer Dave Siebrecht of nearby Spencer presented the award to the club and shared his thoughts on the relationship between his group and the ISSA.

"I wanted to take this opportunity to thank you for your support," Siebrecht told snowmobilers at the Saturday evening awards banquet Nov. 21. "The ISSA is a great support of our organization and makes a lot of things possible. You have almost been there for us from the beginning, and we truly value your support."

ISSA President Merv Hoermann first met Siebrecht at the Winter Kids Ride five years ago and has developed a relationship with

him, his wife Jodi and their 15-year-old daughter Keri, who was born with the spinal cord defect. Despite both living in northwest Iowa, Hoermann admits they may have never met had it not been for the ride.

"We have gotten to know a lot of you people over the past years, and we really enjoy seeing you all come back again," he said. "By having this event, we have come to learn a lot more about you as a group and on a personal level. This event has been great over the past 10 years, and we have to give Bruno a lot of credit for that and all of the volunteers who show up to work at it."

Over the years, the Winter Kids Ride, officially hosted by the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club of Region 7, has been held at various venues around the Huxley community but landed a permanent home at the Safe Room three years ago. Andreini said the community truly opens its doors for the charity event and awarded plaques of appreciation to city officials at the event.

"We have such a good relationship with the city to help do all of this. The city is just tremendous," said Andreini, a Saylorville Dam club member. "I started working with the city when we were doing trail work here on the Heart of Iowa Nature Trail, and I have never once heard the words 'no' come out of their mouths."

Before the kids ride, Andreini said the interaction was limited

between the SBAI and ISSA to awards presentations at convention each fall. The ISSA used to host charity rides during SnowFest weekend in Cresco, but according to Andreini, "that event was tilted toward snowmobilers. We would go out for rides and then turn in our donations later that night and that was about it."

"The concept of what we're doing today is so much different than it was then. We're not here to raise money today, we are here to build relationships," Andreini said. "Once you build those relationships, the money comes afterwards. I think we've accomplished everything we've set out to do and I'm glad we are able to do this for the kids."

Carlyn Crowe, who replaced Leslie Garman as SBAI executive director last summer, said that relationship-building is invaluable. The feedback she receives from her board and from the families who attend the Winter Kids Ride is positive. She said the kids are able to do something they wouldn't normally be able to do and called the event "a great opportunity for everyone."

"Building relationships is so special for non-profits," Crowe continued. "To have an organization which adopts your mission and supporting it year after year is special. I'm new to this organization, but I have worked with non-profits for a very long time, and what we have here you don't always see that a lot with other organizations. That makes it very special."

"On behalf of the SBAI, we want to thank you so much," Biller said. "We truly appreciate what you guys do for us. We know that you support us not just during this time of year but also year-round, and we truly appreciate that. This is the 10-year anniversary for the snowmobile ride but we know that our relationship goes back much further than that."

In October, ISSA members participated in the SBAI's Walk-

N-Roll, a fundraising event at Principal Park in Des Moines, and throughout the year, ISSA-member clubs raise funds for spina bifida through various events across Iowa, including grass drags, raffle drawings, sponsor donations and auctions at convention.

The SBAI earmarks that funding for education and outreach programs, and its member families also rely on that generosity to offset travel, lodging and other expenses related to the care of their children. Because spina bifida children have limited sensation in their lower body, mobility and incontinence are major obstacles for the families to overcome.

But the condition is not a death sentence. Keri Siebrecht is just one of the many success stories SBAI members can share with their benefactors. Last summer, she participated in RAGBRAI and is a member of her high school track team. She also plays wheelchair basketball and has gone skiing, both on water and on snow.

"Keri does a lot of things now that we had no idea she would be able to do when she was born," her proud father said. "We visited with a surgeon at the time who said she won't be able to do anything and will always be stuck in a wheelchair. We know now that is not true. She has always been able to overcome her challenges, and it's amazing all the things she gets and wants to do."

Keri Siebrecht was among several spina bifida kids who were able to go on the UTV rides. ISSA members countered the chilly temperatures by providing helmets and gear and wrapped the riders in heavy quilted blankets. From the safe room, the 15-minute ride headed south toward the fire department and back north toward the high school. Three laps ensured everyone had a chance to participate.

"I can see the cold weather doesn't keep the snowmobilers away," Biller said. "We thank you for coming out today and celebrating what we do. In addition to getting together for some fun recreation, this event also allows Turn to page 20

The Iowa State University Clean Snowmobile Challenge team is returning to the Keweenaw Research Center in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan the second week of March and is looking to improve upon the momentum gained there last winter.

"The biggest thing we are working on this year is testing and validation," explained team president and ISU senior Cameron Pomeroy. "At the end of the day, this is an engineering competition so a lot of what you are graded on are, 'How well do you support your ideas?' and 'What data do you have to back it up?'. Those are our big plans this year."

2015 marked the first season a college from Iowa had fielded a team in the 16-year history of the Clean Snowmobile Challenge (CSC). Taking home eighth place, the Iowa State group finished ahead of 12 other colleges and also garnered Rookie of the Year honors. Pomeroy, who succeeded Dan Clemens as team lead, described last season as a "testing year" for the engineering students.

"We basically started the club as a bunch of buddies getting together to do something. Let's have some fun and see what we

can do with it," he said during a presentation at the 2015 ISSA Annual Convention in Storm Lake Nov. 21. "Then reality set in. You really can't get a free sled and then all those donations and not try and accomplish something with it."

Sponsored by the Society of Automotive Engineers, the sixday competition is hosted on the grounds of Michigan Tech University north of Hancock-Houghton and is designed to promote ingenuity, improve snowmobile technology and reduce the sport's environmental footprint. On campus in Ames, Pomeroy said their project is a conversation starter at many events.

"We tell people we are making an environmentally-friendly snowmobile," he said. "To many, that sounds slow and not fun so we really strive to keep everything upbeat and fast. With that comes a ton of testing. You don't know how your sled is going to do until you put it on snow. We are doing this because we want to push this industry and get new people involved in the sport."

To recruit new members to the team and keep their interest in the project high, Pomeroy said they allow the younger members to actually test the sled on the field next to their shop. That strategy as well as the success of last season have appeared to pay off. Pomeroy estimates 15 students participated in last season's project, whereas this year, close to 40 students are actively engaged in the effort.

"You'd be surprised," said Pomeroy, who grew up riding Arctic Cat snowmobiles. "We have a very good mix of members. There are a lot of guys this year who live, eat and breathe sleds, and about half of the members who have never even sat on a snowmobile. What we really try to do is get these younger guys involved so they can follow in our footsteps."

Donations Sought

Donated by Polaris Industries, the ISU team is modifying the same chassis and engine as last season. Subsidized by the university, the team also purchased a dyno machine last year, and this year, the team is expecting to spend close to \$3,000 on testing and tuning in preparation for the event. That will eat up close to a quarter of their \$12,000 overall budget.

"This year, we are trying to push the limits and bring more innovation to the sport," Pomeroy explained. "We are working on making our own oil injection system and running with a catalytic converter, which will make everything very interesting. Two strokes don't tend to like catalytic converters so we will see how that goes. We have a lot of guys who are putting a lot of time into this."

Defined as a student organization, the Cy-Clean team is an arm of the ISU Engineering Department. Their project is not graded, but according to Pomeroy, the work is a "great resume-builder" for the

student participants. The team meets every other Thursday during the school year and spends most of their weekends wrenching on the project.

"In my job interviews and my job offers, I spend more time talking about CSC than I do about my year of industry experience through an internship," Pomeroy said. "This project is something that people are genuinely interested in and gives companies and employers a good look at a student's work ethic. The fact that this competition is not graded helps us get more creative with our project."

Besides equipment purchases, the rest of the team's budget is made up of travel and lodging to the actual competition. Last season, nine students made the nine-hour trip to the U.P., and more are expected to attend next month. Other expenses include outreach programs, registration fees and truck and trailer rental. Pomeroy said the team relies heavily on donations to meets its financial obligations.

Last year, the ISSA kicked in \$1,000 toward their effort, and three Iowa snowmobile clubs also made significant contributions. Any and all donations are appreciated, Pomeroy said at convention last fall.

"I tell everyone we come into contact with that ISSA has been the biggest proprietor of our success in our first year," Pomeroy said. "We don't get much money for what we do, and we all volunteer our time. We are all students, and snowmobiling is an expensive sport. You all know that. Your support has been an absolute groundbreaker for getting our club up off the ground."

Hoermann Instrumental to Success

Pomeroy singled out ISSA President Merv Hoermann for his mentoring of the team over the past year and a half. Hoermann

has been volunteering at the CSC for nearly a decade and helped prepare the college students for what they may expect when they reached the competition. Part of the learning curve was following the competition's 60-page rule book.

"We spent a lot of time last year looking at the previous year's tech papers, presentations and learning from what other teams did," Pomeroy said. "There is a ton of industry relevance coming out of this competition. It's great that everyone is spreading the word because this is something that we want to have a good connotation behind.'


Another piece of advice Hoermann shared with the students was to arrive in the U.P. with their project finished and assembled for the competition. He said he wanted to see the first-time team prepared for the event and showing up "to compete and not complete," as CSC organizer and research center director Jay Meldrum would often put it.

"I told them to promise me one thing that when they get to the U.P.: Make sure the machine is finished and ready to run," Hoermann said. "Don't pull the sled off the trailer and then start wrenching on it. It doesn't look good because it tells the judges that you weren't prepared for the competition."

Hoermann said the ISU team represented Iowa well and heeded his advice. The machine passed inspection on its first attempt, and "there are not very many teams who can say that. I tip my hat to them."

Taking Advantage of Polaris Traff Map App During Five Into Minnesota

y Android smartphone has quickly become a snowmobile writer's best friend. The built-in camera with its enhanced resolution produces magazine-quality photographs, and the voice recorder app makes trailside interviews a breeze.

More than a communication device, the handheld gadget enables surfing for overnight lodging on extended trips; and when the trail signs don't seem to be pointing in the right direction, you can always verify your location by viewing an online trail map.

Two years ago, my trip planning was enhanced even further when I learned of the new Polaris Rider X trail map app. The mobile software was unveiled that November at the ISSA Annual Convention, and I was able to download it to my smarthphone for a backpack trip three months later into Minnesota.

> Being the old-school rider that I am, I still carried with me a pocketful of outdated trail maps from previous trips across the border, but admittedly, the new app rendered those cumbersome papers useless. Pinpointing our exact location on the trail, the app became a security blanket for our five-day excursion.

No Destination in Mind

Leaving Iowa on Saturday, Feb. 8, we learned quickly the app zapped a lot of battery life from my phone; so after my first 60 miles, I decided to cease recording my trip and rely only on the program for map checks at trail intersections.

Accompanied by my high school buddy, Matt Wilde of Ankeny, we departed my place near Floyd in the morning; and as a sign of the good trails to come, we met the Mitchell County E-Z Riders groomer manicuring the trails five miles

north of town.

A fresh snow had just fallen, and the excitement created by the ancitipation of the ride ahead was high. From Floyd County, we charted a course due north into Minnesota, and as is the case with most of my backpacking trips, we really didn't set an overall destination. I try to ride where the snow is best.

Following the wooded trails south of Waseca

Let's face it. Setting a destination just leads to disappointment when you don't plan enough time to get there. Sure, I would have liked to ride all the way to International Falls, but five days is not near long enough time for that sort of run.

Plus, we definitely lack the discipline to get the job done. Knowing our limitations, the loosely-organized trip basically

became a loop ride up one side of Interstate 35 and down the other.

Easy Riding First Leg

By noon, we had reached the Minnesota state line and picked up Corridor Trail 79 north of Stacyville. This part of ride was very familiar to me as we had taken this route on previous backpacking adventures to Willmar, Minn., and Hayward, Wis.

In fact, the terrain here was not much different than what we had left behind in Iowa. The trails followed fields and square miles, and visible water towers made for easy navigation that first day.

In what would become a quick ride, we followed Corridor 79 up through Dodge Center and Dennison before merging onto some local trails for our first overnight stop in Northfield. The first day ended with 150 miles on the odometer.

The next morning, Sunday, we began

working our way to the west side of I-35. From Northfield, we continued through the adjacent community of Dundas; and after crossing the busy thoroughfare, we picked up Corridor 37, a north-south trail that eventually leads up to Brainerd and Bemidji and ends in International Falls.

We followed trail 37 off and on that morning, taking local spur trails as the spirit moved us. We eventually managed to make it to the Ridges At Sand Creek golf course near Jordan and spent our first break of the day sharing brunch with the church crowd. Let's just say we were not dressed for the occasion.

From the country club, we cut back to 37 and crossed the Minnesota River at Belle Plaine. We continued on this wooded trail until the intersection with Norwood-Young America. Here, Corridor 13 would take us to the west edge of the Twin Cities metro area.

By now, the terrain, while still crossing farmland, was becoming a little more scenic. At one point, we came across some vintage pickup trucks buried in the snowdrifts along the trail, and the contrast against my latemodel snowmobile was irresistible so I reached for my smartphone to capture the image.

After turning north on trail 13, we began making plans for our second overnight stop. A quick surf on the Android recommended the Super 8 at Buffalo in the northwest suburbs of Minneapolis. This prompted a call to friends and family who lived in the area to meet us at the local watering hole after hitting the kill switch for the night.

Sunday was a little shorter than our first day, as we made regular app checks to ensure we would not end up where we didn't belong. It

was still close to 130 miles for the second day, and as the following day would serve as hump day, we knew we would have to start heading back home to Iowa around noon.

Cold Weather Hurts Riding

Subzero temperatures greeted us Monday morning, but we suited up for the weather anyway and headed northwest from the cities. Departing neighboring Monticello around 10 a.m., we crossed Interstate 94 and followed an apparent railbed towards St. Cloud.

Roughly a third of the way there, our gas tanks and the clock told us it was time to turn south so we crossed back over I-94, fueled up at the truck stop and headed down toward Maple Lake for lunch at the local bar and grill.

The noon lunch crowd seemed impressed we had ridden up there from Iowa so our break was stretched a little longer than necessary. But that was alright. The noon sun hadn't warmed us up much, and the extended stop helped bring feeling back to our extremities.

After spinning a few stories and fearing we might overstay our welcome, we hopped back on the sleds and continued south toward Waverly. From there, Trail 32 took us west to Cokato for another fuel stop and a reunion with Corridor 37. A short 10 miles later. we abandoned 37 for Trail 28 and reached our third overnight destination at the Americinn in Hutchinson.

Monday's temperatures kept the ride short at just over 100 miles.

Indicating just how early we shut it down on this third day, we made it to the hotel during the daylight, a feat we normally don't achieve. Nestled warmly into our room, we tuned into the Weather Channel to see what tomorrow's thermometer was going to bring

After sleeping in, the morning brought slightly warmer conditions, and we set our course for Waseca, again staying on the west side of I-35 for our loop back home. From Hutchinson, we followed local trails down to Gaylord and picked up Trail 13 just east of there. We followed 13 south for a short stint and hung a left on Trail 16 into St. Peter. Local trails directed us south of out of town, and we ended up at Lake Elysian for an early dinner.

After fueling our tanks and our bellies, the Polaris trail app came in handy once again as darkness had fallen, and some of the local trail intersections were not marked as well as we had experienced earlier in the trip. Verified by the flashing blue arrow on my phone, it was two more left turns before picking up Corridor 12 leading into Waseca.

Journey Home

The trip from Hutchinson to Waseca racked up 135 miles, and we faced about the same distance home the following day. After a pit stop to replace some thinning carbides, we darted south from Waseca around 10 a.m. Trail 17 led us through a nice wooded area before straightening out towards Albert Lea. Before reaching town, we turned east and crossed back over I-35.

At this point, we were back in familiar surroundings, and the need for the phone and trail maps soon dwindled. Our path basically shadowed Interstate 90 before cutting over at Hayward and angling down through Myrtle and Lyle. Here, my smartphone made one last appearance, capturing our last groomer sighting of the trip as well as a unique club carving at London.

After Lyle, it was south to Carpenter and St. Ansgar—our hometown—before one last stop at Osage. From there, it was a quick jaunt south back to Floyd, ending the day at 130 miles and close to 640 miles for the five-day journey.

While the trip seemed a little aimless at times with no real destination in mind, we did get in some good riding, saw some new scenery and gained a new appreciation for my smartphone. While I may never experience its full potential (I don't do social media), it definitely suits my needs quite nicely.


