Getting the youth more involved is a great start. We have clubs at the forefront of this. The Saylorville Dam Snowmobile took the initiative to find a way to have younger snowmobilers be able to race at their grass drags. This brought in a lot of interest and has helped their event grow.

#### **Advent of Snow Bikes**

The possible addition of snowbikes could bring in a lot of new members to clubs. Just this past week, I taught a groomer class and we had a couple of guys there that have snow bikes. They said that they felt that they needed to join their local club, get involved and help out if they were going to have a possibility of riding the trails.

I know that there are some people and even whole clubs that are against the idea of adding snow bikes. When I ask, 'Why are you against them?', the answer I have gotten is, 'They won't stay on the trail,' or 'They are going to tear up the trail.' Don't we have that problem already?

I don't think it's a problem with the machine. A snow bike works on the same concepts as a snowmobile. Without snow, the machine will be damaged. To assume that a snow bike rider will do a preconceived act is no different than the people who say snowmobiles can't be allowed on a bike trail because they will tear it up.

The machine sare not the problem. We have 200-plus horsepower sleds from the factory that can do way more damage to the trail than a snow bike with 60 horsepower.

I agree we need to find better ways to keep people on the trails. I think education and a little peer pressure would go a long way. If you see someone cutting corners or riding off trail in an area that it's not allowed, say something. Explain the problems it causes for your club. Set some goals and see what you can do to make snowmobiling better.

been a great success. Clubs, groups, and associations across North America have held military rides, political rides and often just have fun holding snowmobile rides with friends and family alike. Winter is starting strong, and there is still a good bit of winter to come this year. Be sure to Take a Friend Snowmobiling during our dedicated week of Feb. 11-20.

During this time of year, we are seeing a little bit more daylight and the temperatures are a little warmer, so the improved temperatures and additional daylight improves our opportunity and riding comfort.

The Go Snowmobiling campaign that I have personally participated in highlighted for me the "wow-factor" and the pure enjoyment that people have when they first ride a snowmobile. I have ridden a number of times with first-time snowmobilers, and they couldn't quit talking about how much fun it was and how they couldn't wait to do it again. Thankfully, I was well prepared for the ride and made sure that my guests were well dressed and comfortable as well.

I have been fortunate enough to also snowmobile with many individuals who have much more experience than myself. I have learned that with a little prior planning and thought, we can shape our friends' experience in snowmobiling with us which helps determine if snowmobiling wins over another convert.

When you take a friend snowmobiling, remember that your friend may not be experienced. Keep the ride slow, short and simple. Chances are that your normal ride would seem like a marathon to an uninitiated friend. Don't show off or push the envelope or challenge your friends to ride beyond their capabilities or their comfort zone. Remember, you are the one that snowmobiles a lot and understands your machine. Let your friends enjoy that first day of snowmobiling. Again, go slow,

make it short, make it simple and remember that it is always a good idea to feed them well.

The Go Snowmobiling campaign is also ioined with the Safe Riders! Campaign. Remember that we have a 22-minute safety video that can be found on our websites at www.snowmobile.org or www.gosnowmobiling.org. The video is a great tool when introducing a friend to snowmobiling and will help make the ride more enjoyable for everyone.

You should also visit and "Like" our Facebook page before participating in a Go Snowmobiling campaign. Our www.facebook. Facebook page is com/GoSnowmobiling. When looking at the page, you will notice that many snowmobilers are posting pictures and their experiences on the page. We now have close to 10,000 friends who visit regularly, and it is common for snowmobilers to send out informative posts that are forwarded to hundreds and thousands of snowmobile enthusiasts worldwide. There is also a short, general survey on our Facebook page, so when you visit the page, consider answering a few simple survey questions. We are constantly surveying snowmobile customers to see how we can better serve you and how we can help you enjoy your snowmobiling activity.

When you consider putting together a Go Snowmobiling ride, just remember that individuals who don't own a snowmobile based on recent research—shows that on a scale of 1 to 10, they rate their level of interest as a 9. People who you know, who don't snowmobile, want to snowmobile. Remember, they also want to enjoy snowmobiling for the same reasons you do: To enjoy the scenery. To get outdoors to have fun with family and friends. To go to unique places they can't reach any other way to see amazing sights. To have fun in the winter outdoors and be able to go home tired and be ready for a good night's sleep.

# February Issue of Iowa Snowmobiler Released Digitally; March to be Printed

Due to declining advertising revenue and rising production costs, the ISSA Communications Committee has announced the February issue of the *Iowa Snowmobiler* magazine will be released in digital form only.

As reported in September, the magazine lost significant ad support from the snowmobile manufacturers this year; and as a result, the committee began identifying other means to keep the magazine viable and increase the number of printed issues.

Current publisher Cameron Hanson fulfilled his contract of producing five printed issues and two digital issues this season. The ISSA worked to keep the remaining two editions in print as well but came up with just enough funding for one additional printed issue.

"All of our magazines are released digitally on the ISSA's website (www.

iowasnowmobiler.com) but only February will not be printed and distributed to our membership this year," committee chair Jim Willey explained.

To help offset costs, the communications committee partnered with Minneapolis-based publishing firm Midwest Sports Publishing Network to increase ad revenue, and Willey initiated the Magazine Maker fundraising mechanism to solicit donations from Iowa snowmobile clubs.

"We would like to thank all of our clubs which contributed to that program," Willey said. "Because of that effort, we will be able to print a sixth issue this season in March for the first time in at least the last seven years."

The committee continues to look at options for the next season and beyond for the magazine. Please contact Willey at (563) 920-0911 to share any suggestions.

## egislative Padkage

EFC members crisscross lowa, soliciting support for proposals, changes to state snowmobile program

Equipped with a Power Point presentation and informative brochures, the ISSA's Emergency Funding and Legislation Committee (EFC) spent the month of January crisscrossing the state of Iowa, stumping for support of its 2017 legislative package.

In addition to the merger of the trail user permit into the annual snowmobile registration fee and the inclusion of snow bikes on public trails previously profiled last month in this publication, the committee's proposal is also looking to improve transparency in the state snowmobile program and even assume administration of several of its key components.

At a meeting in Cedar Falls the first week of January, the committee informed officials with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) of the ISSA's desire to control the groomer program and the allocation of trail funding to Iowa snowmobile clubs. The ISSA already manages the groomer operator training portion. Controlling the purchase and placement of the equipment is the next logical step.


"The ISSA is willing to take those programs over," ISSA President Chris Willey said. "We have looked at a lot of different scenarios on that and we need to run some numbers to see how it could work. but it does present some opportunities for us. The DNR has seemed favorable to that in the past."

According to the committee's brochure, "the DNR has indicated that they would like to transfer administration of the groomer inventory to the ISSA to ensure as much of the registration dollars as possible is used at the local level."

To that end, the ISSA is proposing that 80 percent of the registration and trail pass receipts are earmarked for the local trail side. Current language allows the IDNR to spend up to 50 percent of the total revenue for the state side for program administration, salaries, law enforcement, etc. This proposal corrects the intent of the user permit when it was passed four years ago.

"Funding generated by the trail pass was supposed to go 100 percent to the clubs and supporting the program," explained Past ISSA President and EFC member Jim Willey. "As you know, when it got passed into law, the money was thrown into the general fund and the DNR can spend up to 50 percent of that money. That's not

what we intended, and that's not what the lawmakers believed we were going to do with that increased revenue."

Even though the proposal reduces the percentage to the IDNR, the impact should be minimal and should result in a net-zero loss in total dollars for the IDNR-as long as the proposal to merge the \$15 user permit with the \$15 registration fee is approved by the Iowa Legislature. Currently, approximately 6,000 registered snowmobilers in Iowa do not purchase the optional trail pass. Not giving them an option next year would increase revenue by at least \$90,000.

"The receipts are going to be larger if the trail pass merger goes through, so even at 20 percent, the DNR will still have the same amount of dollars available to them," Jim Willey said as he outlined the legislative package to the ISSA Board of Directors at its Jan. 15 meeting in Huxley.

Members of the EFC are also looking to improve transparency in the state snowmobile program. Each June, the ISSA and the IDNR meet as a Review and Selection Committee to determine how the trail grant money will turn to page 19

he threat of an icestorm migrating from the south and the absence of snow may have hurt attendance, but Iowa snowmobilers and the families they support from the Spina Bifida Assoication of Iowa (SBAI) were still able to gather socially Jan. 15 for the ISSA's 11th Annual Winter Kids Day for charity.

An estimated 60 people attended the event in the central Iowa community of Huxley. In lieu of a snowmobile ride on the nearby Heart of Iowa Trail, the youngsters were treated to a policeescorted utility vehicle parade through the streets of downtown. Meanwhile, inside the city's Safe Room, games, crafts and a meal were served.

The Winter Kids Day program began in 2007. By design, the event is intended to give kids rides on snowmobiles so they can experience what ISSA members love about the winter, but when Mother Nature doesn't cooperate, organizers can easily adapt with either UTV rides more recently or even a few hay rides over the years.

"This is a fun opportunity to get together and meet with everyone," explained ISSA President Chris Willey. "One of these years, we will actually be able to do it on a snowmobile. But regardless of that, it's important for snowmobilers to see what spina bifida is like for these families and see what our donations do for them. It puts a face to the donation."

As its official charity, the ISSA has been supporting the SBAI since 1982. Money raised by Iowa snowmobile clubs over the past three decades has exceeded \$250,000, and the Spina Bifida association earmarks those funds for travel expenses, equipment purchases and educational programs aimed at assisting families living with the condition.

#### **Making Connections**

Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini serves as the ISSA's liaison on the SBAI board of directors and, with help from his home club, the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club of Region 7, has organized the event since its inception. He said it is important for snowmobilers to get to know the people they help out. Carlyn Crowe, SBAI director, agrees.

"It's great for us to be able to connect with the members of the ISSA because you have been such great supporters for us," she said. "What we hope you see by interacting with us today is how the funds are being put to use. Kids and adults both benefit from your donations."

In 2015, ISSA-member clubs donated \$10,000 to the SBAI, and last year, close to \$8,000 was raised. So far for this winter, \$6,876 was turned in at the 2016 ISSA Annual Convention in Waterloo, with \$4,600 donated by two clubs alone. The SBAI was not able to be at the convention last fall but sent the following thank you to the ISSA.

"On behalf of the (SBAI), please know that we are continually blessed for our partnership with all of you," reads the letter penned by Crowe and Dan Biller, SBAI board chair. "Because of your help, fundraising and continued support, we have been able to support our families with more opportunities for networking, education and financial support."

While continuing to provide services for families with young

children, Crowe said her organization has shifted some of its focus to adults living with the disease. She said they are looking to connect with others who can relate to their situation and need support for things like companionship, hand controls for automobiles, educational scholarships and physical therapy not covered by insurance.

"We have been concentrating for the last few years to connect with more adults who have spina bifida," Crowe said. "We need them to know that we are ready, willing and able to help them as well. We have been working on programs to connect, support and educate the adult population. Their needs are much different from those to which we have been accustomed with younger families."

While most of the families attending the Winter Kids Day were from the SBAI, the event is also open to other special needs children. James Shoemaker of Dexter brought his 14-year-old daughter Suzanne, who suffers from cerebral palsy, to Huxley, and she was treated to a UTV ride early Sunday afternoon. Her dad said he wants to expose his daughter to as many activities as possible.

"We just crash all of their events, and they say it's no problem," Shoemaker said of hanging out with the SBAI crowd. "As a parent, I want my daughter to find what she likes and be able to do it any time she can. With cerebral palsy, her trunk control isn't great, and she doesn't have hardly any coordination, but she still gets to do anything she wants."

#### **Social Interaction**

Similarly, children with spina bifida have limited sensation in their lower body, and as a result, mobility and incontinence are major obstacles for the families to overcome. But the condition is not a death sentence. Like Shoemaker, youths with spina bifida have shown they can participate in sports, go out hunting, and yes, ride snowmobiles and UTVs.

Although snow would have been a nice way to cap off the afternoon, it wasn't the end of the world for the two organizations last month. Willey said it's more important for the families and members to interact socially.

"We need to have our presence here and show our support for these families," he said. "Snowmobilers as a whole give back to the community on many levels and in many ways. It's part of our make-up. It's important to give back."

Crowe said she appreciates that reputation and called ISSA members "rock stars in our eyes" in their letter to the convention. She said the SBAI used to be known nationally as "the little chapter that could." Now, that no longer applies, thanks to the generosity of Iowa snowmobilers.

"We have been working to create awareness of spina bifida in the state of Iowa and grow our membership to help more families supporting a member with this disability," the SBAI letter reads. "Due in large part to your support, we have grown from a small organization to one of the most successful and sustainable chapters of the Spina Bifida Association in the country."

# Gresco's Snowfest Provides Winter's First Chance to Roll Out ISSA's Snowmobile lowar Promotion

rea hotels were booked solid, sleds stacked up at the gas pumps and snowmobile trailers lined the Howard County Fairgrounds as snowmobilers converged on Cresco the last weekend in January for the Driftrunners' 46th Annual SnowFest.

Riders from as far north as Minneapolis and as far south as Mount Pleasant participated in the four-day weekend, and a timely snowstorm during the week leading up to the event provided excellent riding conditions on the club's 220-mile trail system.

"We've been doing SnowFest for nearly 50 years now, and events like this bring a lot of business to the area," reported Driftrunners President Jeff Zak. "It always nice to get snowmobilers together in Iowa for organized rides. You can bring a lot of attention and recognition to what your club is doing."

The weekend also launched the ISSA's 'Snowmobile Iowa' promotion, a spin-off of the Snowmobile Iowa club displays at convention. Spearheaded by Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini, the program is designed to provide an opportunity for Iowans to explore different areas of the state by sled.

"The idea here is to educate Iowa riders about existing trails in Iowa for those who are not acquainted with what we have to offer here in our state," Andreini said. "By doing this, we have an opportunity to keep more of our tourism dollars in Iowa, thus benefiting many of our smaller communities."

Seven ISSA-member clubs signed up to host a ride on each Saturday of January and February at the 2016 ISSA Annual Convention in Waterloo. Poor snow conditions cancelled the first two events near Ankeny and Solon, but conditions were ideal for the third attempt at Cresco.

#### Won't Get Bored in Iowa

On Saturday afternoon of SnowFest, a handful of riders were led by club member Cody Bergen through the rolling hills, open fields and wooded bluff country of northeast Iowa. ISSA Region 10 Director Aaron Dorothy caught up with the group near the Minnesota border at Florenceville.

Dorothy maintains the Snowmobile Iowa Facebook page and was among 18 riders from the Southeast Iowa Ridge-Blasters in

Region 10 who traveled just three short hours from home to take advantage of the Driftrunners ample trails and snowcover.

"I think this is a great program," Dorothy said. "I wish more people could partake in it, and I wish there was more snow elsewhere in the state to do this. The idea is to get around and see other clubs. I enjoy riding other club trails, meeting new people and getting to know the different clubs. It's a neat experience."


Dorothy is also president of the Ridge-Blasters, and their club was scheduled to host a Snowmobile Iowa event Feb. 4, but the absence of snow thwarted those efforts. Instead, club members were going to use the time set aside for that weekend to make trail improvements.

"Is there snow anywhere south of I-80? It cannot NOT snow down here two years in a row? It's just been a terrible year for us," he lamented.

#### Why Travel Far?

The lack of snow in his home area highlights the need to find opportunities to ride as close to home as possible. Normally, his group would travel seven to 10 hours north to find snow and areas to ride. Now, their sights are set on areas within their home state.

"Why drive seven hours and pay for an out-of-state trail pass

when you can ride a different trail system in Iowa every weekend and not get bored," Dorothy said.

"With this promotion, we should be traveling shorter distances to our rider destinations, which should translate into more miles of riding snowmobiles each season because of the time element gained by not traveling to other states," Andreini noted.

The next opportunity to participate in a Snowmobile Iowa event is Feb. 11 at Clarksville. The ride begins at 10 a.m. and will follow the Shell Rock River bottom from Clarksville to Rockford in Region 4. The event is co-hosted by the Butler County Snow Snoops and the Floyd County Groomers.

Andreini said he was thrilled when different clubs around the state volunteered to host an event. Although three of the first four rides had to be cancelled due to poor snowcover, he hopes to finish the second month strong.

"We keep thinking that we have to go to Minnesota, Wisconsin or wherever to ride," he said. "We need to change that. We want to keep this event going on the weekends within a reasonable travel distance of home and being able to go back to work Monday

morning."

Event details are posted on the Snowmobile Iowa Facebook page, and after Clarksville, the rides move to Tama Feb. 18 and Maynard Feb. 25. The last two events are hosted by the Central Iowa Snowmobilers and the Trail Blaz-zers Inc., respectively.

#### **Getting the Word Out**

Social media has been a great tool to promote the rides and "to help get the word out," Dorothy said. Matt Miner, a Driftrunners club member and Region 5 director for the ISSA, said the positive feedback on Facebook following SnowFest weekend was simply overwhelming.

"This new program has some merit," he said. "We like showing what our trails are like. We had Facebook comments with people saying they love our trails, and that's what the program is intended to promote. Why drive 10 hours to ride when you can drive two hours and get the same conditions as Wisconsin."

"If you can get more people out riding and seeing what it takes to keep the trails in the shape they are, you get more people to spend their money locally and help support organized snowmobiling here," Zak added.

The ISSA Education and Scholarship Foundation (ISSAESF) awarded three \$1,000 scholarships to qualifying students of ISSA families in 2016, bringing the total number of students aided to 43 over the past 18 years.

The ISSA's scholarship program was created with the seed money left over from the ISSA's hosting of the International Snowmobile Congress in Cedar Rapids in 1995. The amount awarded each year is determined by the proceeds of its investments as well as the success of its fundraising efforts.

The first scholarship was awarded in 1998. Recipients have been as few as one and awards as little as \$200. Since 2007, the foundation has attempted to maintain scholarship levels at \$1,000 per student.

Recipients for 2016 included Kelsey Delperdang of the Dickinson County SnowHawks of Region 1, Tori Henninges of the Trail Blaz-zers, Inc., of Region 5, and River Kelly of Lake Park in Region 1.

The deadline for applying each year is April 15, and application materials can be found on the ISSA's website at www. iowasnowmobiler.com/issa/scholarship. The top applicant is then forwarded on to the international C.J. Ramstad Memorial Scholarship competition.

To qualify, the student or his/her family must be in good standing with the ISSA. The scholarship is based in part on need, and since 2012, each applicant is expected to acquire an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) rating number from the Iowa College Access Network at www.icansucceed.org.

To get this number, the student will be required to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. After filling out the FAFSA, the applicant will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) and be issued the required EFC number.

"This number is now required to be attached to the scholarship foundation application, replacing the requirement to furnish their parents' 1040 tax form with their application in the past," Andreini explained.

According to Andreini, many of the foundation's guidelines also follow those established by the International Snowmobile Media Council (ISMC) for its Ramstad scholarship, including judging applications for neatness, completeness, accurate spelling, correct grammar and school and community involvement.

"Keep all of this in mind when filling out your application;

every required detail is important," Andreini said. "Take your time and follow the instructions as closely as possible; it will pay good dividends if you do. Carefully read the instructions listed on the application information. They are very important items of instruction to follow for the Iowa program as well as for the international snowmobile scholarship."

The number of applications the ISMC receives in a yearly cycle is quite similar to what is received by ISSAESF, making the odds of our qualifying students receiving another \$1,000 scholarship "very good," Andreini said.

Student applicants are also asked to write an essay on 'What Snowmobiling Means to Me.' Last year's submissions appear on pages 14 and 15 of this month's issue.

Entries are judged anonymously, and all decisions of the scholarship committee are turn to page 15

from page 8 be dispersed to local snowmobile clubs for the upcoming season. Usually within a month, a spreadsheet is sent out to clubs, itemizing what each one was awarded for the winter.

The ISSA would now like to see a similar breakdown on how the state side of the registration dollars are being spent. This ongoing request is now in its fourth year, and by including it in its legislative package, EFC members hope to gain some traction with it. Jim Willey has been championing this effort and met with IDNR officials in Des Moines Jan. 24 to hopefully get some more answers.

"As you know, we have been trying to get accurate numbers on the state side of the program, and we're getting close, but we still don't know how all of the funds have been spent over the past several years," he said. "We want the DNR to give us full disclosure. We know where the club dollars go, but we don't know how they spend the state-side dollars.

"I am not an accountant, and this is not an audit," Willey continued. "We want to know what they are spending on law enforcement, equipment, etc. and then have some say on how they spend it. We're not trying to do anything that they don't know about. We are proposing what we feel is the right thing to do for the program."

"We have in our legislative package that they have to provide documentation on where the money is going," Past ISSA President and EFC member Terry Durby said.

A week after Willey's visit with the IDNR, members of the EFC were back in Des Moines for the Travel Federation of Iowa's Legislative Showcase at the Iowa State Fairgrounds. In addition to Durby and

both Willeys, Past ISSA Presidents Gary McVicker and Merv Hoermann were also on hand to drum up support for the ISSA's

"We had a very productive evening I felt with our legislators," McVicker reported.

So far, committee members said feedback has been fairly supportive toward the proposed changes. Chris Willey said ISSA Lobbyists Mike Heller and Paula Feltner have been pitching it around the Capitol and "are really positive about all of this."

On Jan. 11, Durby and ISSA Region 7 Director John Kahler attended a Team Iowa Snowmobilers club meeting to discuss the ISSA's legislative priorities. According to Durby, "there was a large turnout of enthusiastic snowmobilers, and our legislative package was met with great support."

The only pushback so far has been coming from southern and western Iowa regarding the merger of the trail pass and user permit. Snowmobilers located in those areas typically own mountain sleds and said they do not ride their machines in Iowa. They therefore feel they should not have to pay for the extra \$15 if the registration and trail pass fees are rolled into one \$30 decal.

Chris Willey has been fielding those concerns directly and is open to discuss the ISSA's proposals with any concerned stakeholder in the state. He can be reached by cell phone at (563) 020-9010 or by email at kioti79@gmail.com.

"If clubs have questions or concerns, they can reach out to us," he said.

"If you snowmobile and if you live in Iowa, then you need to support snowmobiling in Iowa, regardless of where you ride," Kahler said.
