efines Process for Groomer

The Iowa Department of Natural Re-L sources (IDNR) announced in December a couple of procedures in the state snowmobile program for major groomer repairs and amendments to snowmobile club trail grant awards.

According to Rhonda Fowler, snowmobile education coordinator for the IDNR, a process has been developed to assist clubs with knowing what to do if they encounter a mid-season equipment failure, needed fix or complete breakdown of their groomer.

If a club experiences an issue with its grooming equipment, operators need to report the problem immediately to ISSA President Chris Willey, groomer training coordinator for the ISSA, and to Past ISSA President Terry Durby, a permanent member of the ISSA/IDNR Review and Selection Committee.

Willey can be reached at (563) 920-9010, and Durby's contact number is (641) 590-7007. Fowler recommends that clubs post these numbers in the cabs of their groomers.

Once notified of a breakdown, Willey and Durby will share the information with Randy Schnoebelen, snowmobile program manager for the IDNR. They will discuss the need, cost and feasibility of completing the repair in enough time to make the groomer operational for the balance of the snowmobile season.

"A decision to make the repair or to not make the repair will be determined," Fowler said. "If the repair is approved, the club will work with me to determine if an amendment to the grant is needed and to route the information through the Review and Selection Committee and the director's office, if needed."

Fowler said if the problem is a breakdown on the trail, a determination of towing the equipment for health and safety reasons will be the first consideration. "It is imperative that Chris or Terry receive a call as soon as this situation is identified," she said.

Clubs are reminded to not make any repairs until this process is completed. "We do not want any of the clubs to incur an expense which may not be reimbursable," Fowler said.

The IDNR also released information on how and when to amend a club's snowmobile trail grant award and how it relates to the cooperative agreement issued by the department.

When a club submits a grant to the state snowmobile program in May, the Review and Selection Committee asks for dollar amounts for fuel, maintenance, pre-season repairs and any other item the club needs for maintenance and operations. Each of these dollar amounts is reviewed by the committee, and an amount is awarded.

The awards fall into three categories: maintenance and operations, trail development and new trail development. According to the IDNR, a club cannot move money from one category to another without amending its grant. Without an amendment, for example, the club cannot use extra maintenance money to pay for trail work, and you cannot use trail money to purchase additional fuel, etc.

"The entire amount of the category is what you need to consider," Fowler explained. "If you do not have the money available to cover it from the amount awarded, then you would need to ask for a grant amendment. You will only need to request a grant amendment if you need to add money to your award.

"Because your cooperative agreement has one amount, it gives you flexibility to move some of the award around," Fowler continued. "For instance, you have a repair need that comes up mid-season. If you have enough in your maintenance and operation category to cover it, you do not need to ask for an amendment.'

ISSA Looking to Reduce **Number of Decals on Sleds**

ooks are everything. A dozen years ago, ISSA officials successfully lobbied for the removal of registration numbers from the hoods of snowmobiles. Now they are looking to clean up the windshields by eliminating one of the two stickers currently required to ride in Iowa.

During its Dec. 18 online meeting, the ISSA Board of Directors approved a legislative initiative designed at removing the four-year-old in-state user permit requirement, transferring that \$15 charge to the registration fee and calling for a single registration decal.

"We would like to eliminate the twosticker situation and go with one registration sticker which would eliminate that section of the code for the user permits for in-state residents," explained Past ISSA President Terry Durby, chair of the ISSA's Emergency Funding and Legislation Committee. "We would then transfer that \$15 fee in the code and add it to the registration fee."

To currently ride on public trails, rightof-ways and frozen bodies of water in Iowa, a snowmobiler must pay a \$15 registration fee and then purchase a \$15 user permit trail pass. Each comes with a \$1.75 writing fee for a total of \$33.50 plus other costs. Under the ISSA's proposal, the rider would still pay the \$30 but only have one writing fee.

"You would be saving some money on the fees for not having to buy two stickers so we could consider this a cost savings for our stakeholders," Durby said. "This would definitely simplify the process. I think law enforcement would also appreciate it so they don't have to worry about looking for

two stickers during a trail stop."

The trail pass would still be required for out-of-state riders in Iowa, and the additional \$15 would no longer be an option for in-state residents. Some Iowans claim they only ride their machines out of state and therefore don't always purchase the trail pass. Over the past two seasons, sales of user permits have lagged behind registrations by approximately 6,500 units in Iowa, which translates to \$97,500 in missed revenue for the state snowmobile program.

"There are a lot of sleds which are ridden in Iowa that don't buy a trail pass," ISSA President Chris Willey said. "We need to capture those riders. I don't know of many guys who own sleds in Iowa that don't ride in Iowa at some point. No matter where you snowmobile, if you're from Iowa, you should support snowmobiling in Iowa."

"This would pretty much force everybody into buying one and generate a lot

Accidental Death, Dismemberment Policy Dropped from Membership Benefits

merican Income Life notified the ISSA in writing two months ago that it will A merican income Life housing the 1997 in pricing the lateral death and dismemberment policy effective last month.

This \$3,500 benefit was provided at no cost to ISSA members and their qualifying dependents. In 2016, two benefit awards were paid by American Income Life to ISSA members. Claims submitted after Dec. 14 will not be honored.

According to the letter, the decision to terminate its contract with the ISSA was due to the lack of additional policies purchased by ISSA members from the insurance company's voluntary offerings.

"There has not been enough participation from the individual members for us to continue to provide no-cost benefits," the communication reads. "We regret this has not turned out favorably."

"The bottom line is they have terminated our contract, and we are no longer able to offer that beneift to our membership," explained Past ISSA President Jim Willey, the letter's recipient.

Watch Mailing Label for Membership Status Updates

ighteen hundred ISSA members were notified on the mailing label on the front of their magazine last month that the December issue would be their last magazine until their membership dues were paid.

The ISSA's Membership Committee will continue to place membership status reminders on the front of the *lowa Snowmobiler* until the 90-day grace period has expired and the member will stop receiving his or her magazine.

Per ISSA policy, this cushion allows for members who join through their local club for their membership dues to be paid by the club treasurer, which is not always as prompt as the organization would like.

As of Dec. 18, only 1,053 members had joined or renewed with the ISSA. In 2016, the association finished with 2,389 members, which represents a steady five-year decline from a high of 2,963 members in 2011.

more income for the program," noted Region 6 Director Gene Gerdes, who was in favor of the change.

"That's a pretty good chunk of money that we're not currently getting into the program," Willey said. "We're going to have some pushback on it, but the majority of people are going to be okay with it because they simply don't like two stickers."

The trail pass requirement served as a consolation prize to the ISSA's push to double the snowmobile registration fee to \$30 four years ago. Most legislators were not in favor of a fee increase back then, so the trail permit system was proposed and approved to generate the much-needed revenue for trail maintenance and improvements.

ISSA Lobbyist Mike Heller said the atmosphere in Des Moines has not changed much since that time, and as a result, the ISSA will once again be facing an uphill battle to move to a one-decal system.

"It's going to be important that we have grassroots support on this effort," Heller said. "It's going to be important where it's not sold as a fee increase. The makeup in the legislature right now is not really conducive to that. It's going to take a lot of work to get done, but you guys have shown us in the past the ability to do that."

Board members shared their feedback from their constituents across the state on this proposal.

"The majority of the club members I have talked to are in favor of this change," reported Region 1 Director Dan Delperdang.

"Everybody is in favor of just one sticker where I'm at as well," added Region 7 Director John Kahler.

"I've had a couple of questions by email with some concerns from those who own sleds in Iowa but don't ride them in Iowa," Willey said. "I don't see the big deal with purchasing the extra \$15 for that sled if it means more dollars generated for the program and going back to the clubs to keep improving the trail system that we have here."

"We will still be one of the lowest cost registrations across the Snow Belt," noted Past ISSA President Jim Willey, who serves as vice chair for the Midwest Chapter of the American Council of Snowmobile Associations.

Heller said any proposed legislation will need to be introduced by the Natural Resources Committee and then approved by the Ways and Means Committee before reaching the floor for a vote this session. He and partner Paula Feltner said they will visit with each committee chair to find a sponsor for the bill.

Jim Willey pointed out this effort will impact vintage registrations positively as they will no longer be required to purchase trail passes to participate in vintage rides and special events. A lifetime fee of \$25 is all that is needed to register a snowmobile which is at least 30 years old in Iowa.

Durby said the ISSA will also be looking at ways legislatively to shift how the snowmobile registration money is divided by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. Current language allows up to 50 percent of the revenue to be earmarked for the administrative side of the program. Durby said he would like to see more funding available for the local trail grant side.

"We thought we were going to be able to get more of those dollars when they approved the user permits last time, but we really never did," he said. "We would like to see that split get addressed. We don't know what that percentage will be, but we want to work with the IDNR on that and see what we can do."

he ISSA is joining the International ■ Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) in observance of Jan. 21-29 as International Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week. A safety proclamation has been requested from Iowa Gov. Terry Branstad, and club-related activities and safety classes are being encouraged at the local level.

"The purpose of International Snowmobile Safety Week is to expose people to safe snowmobiling practices and to demonstrate how operating safely can prevent mishaps," explained ISMA President Ed Klim. "Snowmobiling is a fun and exciting family activity enjoyed by over four million people across the United States and Canada. The sport is a safe and enjoyable form of recreation if done properly and with respect."

In Iowa, snowmobiles are operated by men, women and children of all ages. Depending on weather conditions, approximately 8,800 miles of snow-covered trails are maintained and groomed by snowmobile club volunteers across the state and enjoyed by a variety of winter recreationists.

Activities and events held during Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week will promote responsible attitudes and actions that will foster the safe, family image of snow-

"Safe Snowmobiling means riding within your own capabilities, operating at safe and appropriate speeds for the terrain and never drinking alcoholic beverages before or while driving," explained ISSA President Chris Willey. "Always wear a helmet and adequate clothing, stay within designated riding areas and always snowmobile with another person, never alone."

Occasionally, problems occur, and snowmobilers should be prepared for all possible scenarios.

"Take along a spare belt, spark plugs and tools to do basic repairs. You also should carry emergency supplies, such as a basic first aid kit, and overnight survival provisions, such as food, matches, flashlight and extra batteries, and shelter building materials," Willey recommended. "Most importantly, always use common sense and keep a clear head. Learn all you can about responsible snowmobiling and keep safety as your top priority.'

Willey said the ISSA is encouraging its member-clubs to sponsor youth snowmobile safety courses and to host other safetyrelated activities. Ideas and suggestions are available online through ISMA's Campaign Action Manual at www.snowmobile. org. Also posted there is information on ISMA's Safe Riders! program.

Materials that are available from both programs include the following: posters, fact books, a safety video, public service announcements, a website and decals that highlight safety messages and enhance safety education efforts.

"We hope that you will find this webbased information useful in your organization's snowmobile safety campaign," Klim said. "The suggested activities contained there can be modified to meet your club's needs. Any suggestions or ways to improve this manual are welcome. Have a great snowmobile season!"

Coming Soon to a Trail Near You

ISSA Board Seems Okay with Snow Bikes in Iowa as Long as Riders Register Their Machines, Join Clubs, Help with Trails

A lready popular out west, dirt-bike conversion kits are slowly

creeping onto the snowmobile trails around Iowa, and as learned during the ISSA Board of Directors online meeting Dec. 18, the reception from the organized snowmobiling community here has been surprisingly warm.

Randy Magg, a groomer operator from the Dickinson County SnowHawks and assistant director for Region 1, has observed these so-called snow bikes—equipped with a single front ski and 12-inch track--in use in the Iowa Great Lakes Region and has found their impact to be fairly minimal.

"We've had them up here in the lakes area, and they seem to do less damage than a three-inch paddle track from a snowmobile does on our trails," Magg reported.

ISSA Vice President Brian Carmichael lives in Aplington in Region 4 and knows of two snow bike riders from nearby New Hartford. He too is not offended by their use on trails.

"I've seen them on the trails, and they leave less of a footprint than our sleds do; and even when they take off, they don't dig a trench in the snow," Carmichael said. "This new sport is going to get really big, and we should be ready for it."

"They are very popular out west," ISSA President Chris Willey said. "And usually what's popular out west is coming to the midwest."

Growing in Popularity

The growing popularity of snow bikes came up during the board's discussion on its legislative agenda for the approaching session of the Iowa Legislature. The Iowa Department of Natural Resources, according to Willey, has put the onus of allowing or denying these dirt bike kits on snowmobile trails in the hands of the ISSA.

By roll call vote, the board overwhelmingly approved their use and will now be urging legislators to change the definition of a snowmobile to include one or two skis. The only dissenting vote came from Region 5 Director Matt Miner of Lime Springs, whose home club, the Driftrunners, has had a negative experience from snow bikes on its trail system.

"These guys are not going to stop riding when there's only an inch of snow out there on our trails," Miner said. "They are still going to go out on our trails and ride those things. They've done it in the past, and that's one of our biggest issues up here. They want to go out and ride and don't care what the trails look like.

"We want something in there to protect our landowners and our trail system," Miner continued. "If we allow these on our trail system, what will be next? Fat tire bicycles and tracked OHVs? We need to make a rule to protect our landowners and protect the trails and protect what the clubs have built. We need some sort of enforcement attached to this language where there are penalties when these snow bikes are on the trails when they shouldn't be."

ISSA Secretary Sue Paulus, who doesn't vote by position,

voiced her concerns with allowing snow bikes on snowmobile trails and the perceived conflict they present with landowners. The trails maintained by her home club, the Floyd County Groomers in Region 4, are nearly all cross-country, thanks to the generosity of their landowners.

"We don't want to lose our landowners because we have worked very hard to get them and keep them," she said, siding with Miner

"We don't want to do anything that jeopardizes the trail system because every club has worked hard to get these in place," Willey said. "The landowners I've talked to have said if they operate the same as a snowmobile and they're not going to be tearing up their land, then they have no problem with them."

Not Legal Yet

Currently, snow bikes are not legal to ride on snowmobile trails in Iowa. They do not fit the definition of a snowmobile and therefore cannot be registered as such. The best way to control their use this season is through law enforcement, Willey said.

"We need to write tickets and not give warnings to control this



right now," Willey said. "If we decide to allow them to ride on the trails, then they would have to register them and have to buy a trail pass."

Willey and others on the board called snow bikes "selfregulating," meaning they need the same conditions on which to ride just like a snowmobile does. Carbides are required for the front skis, and snow is needed to lubricate the rear slides. Because of that fact, a number of board members didn't think there would be issues of snow bikes tearing up trails at the end of the snow season.

"As long as there is language in the code which requires that, I'm okay with it," said Region 9 Director Tim McPherson, who heard from snow bike supporters at an Iowa Snowdrifters meeting last month.

"That machine is only going to operate on the trail at the same time a snowmobile is going to be out there," Willey said. "We need to realize this sport is knocking on the door in Iowa, and they are looking for ways to get on the trails one way or another."

Willey is concerned if the board and the IDNR does not okay their use, this new user group will lobby local officials to allow them on the trails or at least in the road right-of-ways. He specifically pointed to counties which allow ATVs to operate on secondary roads.

"We are at the point we need to decide what we want to do," he urged the board. "My personal stance is that we embrace this. These guys seem willing to help with trails and join our clubs. This is a new segment of the sport that's not going away. Two years ago,

Now, I can tell you it's here to stay."

Several Providers Available

Presently, two snowmobile manufacturers are promoting snow bikes. Polaris owns the Timbersled brand of conservation kits, and Arctic Cat is partnering with track manufacturer Camso to produce its own version. Other third-party alternatives are also available.

Former IDNR state snowmobile program coordinator David Downing first predicted this insurgence of snow bikes at the 2015

> ISSA Convention in Storm Lake, and Bob King of Council Bluffs, chair of the American Council of Snowmobile Associations' Midwest Chapter, told Iowa members at this year's convention to be on the lookout for them as well.

> "They have caught on in the west and have been approved in South Dakota," King said. "Minnesota has not approved them yet but is in the process of rewriting its snowmobile laws and the definitions of a snowmobile. This is an ongoing situation that you need to be aware of."

Potentially becoming a leader in the adoption of the sport, the ISSA board is now looking to capitalize on the popularity of snow bikes by capturing those new registration dollars and increasing memberships by appealing to the youth who are interested in them.

"This could be a shot in the arm for club memberships and registration dollars," Willey said. "It's going to take some explanation to our landowners because they are going to see a different type of machine out there riding on their property. It's going to be a little




Brinkman, who lives in rural Marble Rock and is a member of the Floyd County Groomers, is also a strong supporter of his local club and the state organization.


"They have helped with many membership drives over the years and always encourage other


Duetmeyer began snowmobiling with his father at the age of three. Now he and his dad are building a bridge over a large stream to make it safer for others to cross.

Neal Beck of Fairbank spends his days selling late model snowmobiles to customers throughout northeast Iowa. On the weekends, however, his attention turns to those machines which haven't seen the showroom floor in more than 40 years.

Beck, parts and sales manager for Myers Polaris, doesn't hide his passion for vintage snowmobiles. Eight years ago, he began coordinating the Leaf Spring Rally, a local vintage ride now hosted by the Trail Blaz-zers Snowmobile Club of Region 5; and for the past four years, he and a group of friends have been travelling to Clear Lake for the annual Jack Race each January.

"The attraction of vintage sleds for me is that they're simple to work on compared to the newer equipment out there," Beck explained. "They have a lot less moving parts and electronics. I'm kind of on the younger side of this vintage thing, but at the same time, those are the snowmobiles I grew up riding and enjoy being around."

At 32, most of the snowmobiles Beck wrenches on are older than he is, and he's fine with that. They are similar to the sleds which introduced him to the sport in his youth—old machines that his grandfather kept out in the barn. He now maintains a salvage yard of donor sleds, and his trailer on race day is the place for other competitors to find replacement parts.

"You have to have a stockpile of parts if you're going to be active in vintage racing," Beck acknowledged. "Even though I work at a dealership, you just can't go back to the parts room and pull the parts off the shelves that you need. These machines, for the most part, are obsolete, and you have to have some parts sleds sitting around."

He calls one of his sleds 'Bits and Pieces', because it's made up of parts from about 10 different machines, he guesstimates. His preferred ride is a 1979 Polaris TXL 340, and at last year's Jack Race, he won the 1985 and older Leaf Spring class on this white and blue pony. He also took home first place in the 1973 and older race on his 1972 Polaris ATX.

Affordable Form of Racing

Beck said the Jack Race, known officially as the Jack Helgren Memorial Iowa LeMans Championship, provides the perfect platform for satisfying his competitive drive without breaking the bank. He said the event provides a "cheap alternative" for snowmobile racing in Iowa, if such a unicorn exists.

"I used to race grass drags and ice ovals with the newer stuff, but the cost just got to be too huge," he explained. "Vintage racing is definitely a lot more affordable. You don't need a factory sponsorship or a dealer connection to race vintage sleds. You can be competitive in vintage racing just by taking the time to test and tune."

Beck said most of the sleds involved in the Jack Race can be purchased on Craigslist for under \$1,000. With 26 classes for all different ages and sizes of sleds and racers, he said there are plenty of opportunities for newcomers to the sport to get acquainted to the competition at Clear Lake. Just take a walk down pit lane, and most people are more than willing to lend a hand.

"A lot of us are always ready to help out and answer questions," Beck encouraged. "We're not going to give up all of our secrets, but I'm a promoter of snowmobiling and snowmobile racing, and we always would like to see more people out there on the track. The more the merrier. It's no fun to just have four guys out there competing. We want to see classes with 10 sleds in them."

Beck said he spends most of the year tinkering on his sleds and getting them ready for the race. The work begins in earnest during the late summer. He and his buddies take what they've learned

from last season and improve on it or tweak it after shaking down their sleds during test-n-tune sessions on an abbreviated track near

"You learn every year what you can or can't do...what worked



and what didn't," he said. "These machines were not really made to do what we're doing with them. You have to beef them up a little bit and make them hold up for a 10-lap race. It's funny to see some of the carnage left on the track after a race. You'll see parts scattered all over."

Beck said he works closely with a group of five friends from the Fairbank area—each with two sleds—and another pair from Vinton also travels with them to the Jack Race. The annual competition is a chance to hone their skills and expand their comradery to other racers from other parts of Iowa and from neighboring states.

"We all have a competitive spirt in us, and The Jack is our big race of the year," Beck said. "We really enjoy participating over there. It's another outlet, another place for our group to meet up and race. The Jack is something different for us than just going out for a vintage trail ride."

Snowmobile Destination

Race promoter Gary McVicker of Hampton, a past ISSA president, envisions the Jack Race as a destination for Iowa snowmobilers each season. He said the competition and attendance increases each year, and he invites people to ride into the event on their sleds whenever possible. The local trail dumps right out into Clear Lake State Park, which has hosted the event the last five seasons.

"One of the things we want to stress to people is that we are here to promote our sport and the greater Clear Lake area," McVicker said. "We have plenty of participants who come in from all over, and the only time they get these sleds out is for our race. We also have plenty of people from the area who have built sleds just for the Jack Race. It's the only time they hit the ice."

This year's event is planned for Jan. 20-21. Friday night includes a vintage ride around the lake and Saturday morning begins with Radar Runs promptly at 9 a.m. followed by LeMans racing action at 10 a.m. A complete agenda appears on the back page of this issue and



additional information can be found online at www.thejackrace.com. "The format is going to be pretty much the same as it has been the last several years," McVicker said, adding that the 120 kids races are returning for their third straight year. "We're not adding anything, and we'll finish off with the Stud Boy 50 open class race at the end of Saturday afternoon."

Unlike last year, when the event had to be postponed a month, the weather appears to be cooperating this winter as a December cold snap and a trio of snowstorms have created fairly ideal race conditions on the lake. As always, organizers will leave the lake surface unmanicured as racers bang their way around the serpentine course on the lake's south side.

"The lake surface is the track. That's part of it," said McVicker, who founded the event in 2010. "This heritage goes back to the original LeMans races on the lake in the 1960s and 1970s. I know some guys think we need to smooth it out a little bit, and some want us to add more moguls. We will continue to leave it alone. That is what makes The Jack what it is."

Hosted by the North Iowa Snow Seekers of Region 3, the race weekend honors the memory of Jack Helgren, a snowmobile dealer who passed away in 2009. McVicker was a close family friend and wanted to commemorate Helgren's contributions to the sport locally. Drawing several thousand snowmobilers to North Iowa, the event is now recognized throughout the Midwest.

"We're not perfect, but we're having fun," McVicker said. "Some people take it more seriously than others, but it's supposed to be a fun event so let's enjoy it. This thing has grown every year. People in the community know what you mean when you say The Jack now. You talk to snowmobilers all over Iowa, and they know what our event is all about."

Bring on the snow!!






