Groomer Operators Need Recertification by 2020 As I sit down to write this month's color myself. I hope this plan makes sense; if

umn, we are a little over a week from Christmas and Mother Nature has yet to give us any serious amounts of snow. I know it gets kind of frustrating for all of us when we do so much work to get trails and groomers ready and then it's hurry up and wait for the snow.

As ISSA President and a member of the Review and Selection Committee (RSC), I do ask that all snowmobilers do one thing: Remember that every one of us is a vol-



unteer...from guys and gals who mark trails run the groomers to the ISSA Board and RSC members.

None of us is getting paid to do the job or jobs we do. We do it because we love snowmobiling. We are all glad to help you out and understand your frustration, but yelling at someone or complaining to others rather than asking the questions you have doesn't help any of us solve a problem or get things done.

I have had a lot of people asking about groomer cards and classes. We are going to be having classes across the state through the winter. As I shared in an email to the club contacts last month and at convention, current groomer operator cards are no longer valid as the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) is no longer part of the groomer program. All groomer operators will need to attend a recertification class. This will allow us to have an accurate list of the operators running the ISSA-owned equipment. To make this a little easier on everyone, we split each club's list of groomer operators in half, so the first half of each club's list will need to attend recertification class by Jan. 1, 2019, and the second half by Jan. 1, 2020. The lists are alphabetical so if you're an operator, it kind of gives you an idea when you need to recertify by. If you want to know for sure, contact your club's groomer coordinator, your region director not, get ahold of me and I'd be happy to discuss it further.

After recertification, operator cards will be good for five years. We don't have cardmaking capabilities at this time, and I personally feel the money it would take to pur-

chase the card-making equipment is better spent at the club level for trail or equipment updates.

So the plan for the immediate future (this season for sure) is each club contact (the same contact that gets the grant information) has received a list of operators for their club. A copy of that list is to

be kept in the logbook in the club's groomer. This list, along with your state-issued driver's license, will serve as proof of being an operator if stopped while operating.

As a reminder to be a groomer operator, there are four requirements:

- 1) Love snowmobiling.
- 2) 18 years old or older
- 3) Have a valid driver's license.
- 4) Have approval of the club

It is the responsibility of the club and the club's groomer coordinator to ensure that only certified operators are running the ISSA-owned equipment. This includes the brush cutter and ToolCat owned by the state as well.

That's enough serious stuff. How about the fun stuff? I just saw on Facebook that Bruno and his team have put together six locations for the Snowmobile Iowa events across the state. The Jack, Snowfest and Winter Games are always a great time as well. I plan to attend as many of these events as possible, and I hope to see everyone out on the trails REALLY SOON. If your club is having an event or just a club ride, let me know about it, and I will try and attend.

Dates Confirmed for Club Rides this Winter

Eight snowmobile clubs have stepped forward to host Snowmobile Iowa rides this winter as the ISSA enters its second season of promoting snowmobile tourism in Iowa. The organized events are a spinoff of the club displays at convention each fall by the same name.

According to ride coordinator and Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini, Snowmobile Iowa is designed for clubs to "showcase" their trail systems, to increase the economic impact of snowmobiling in their areas and for snowmobilers to stay closer to home to ride.

"The host clubs are asked to have members lead the arriving guests on tours showing and educating them about the best trails in each of the areas," Andreini said. "Host clubs will be a source for information pertaining to the given area regarding gas, restaurant, historical sites and, of course, overnight accommodations if anyone should want to stay the night after a long day's ride."

Last season, nearly every planned event was cancelled due to poor trail conditions, but snowmobilers were willing to give it another shot this winter. At November's convention, Andreini said he received enough response from ISSA members to make another attempt at hosting snowmobile tours this winter.

Beginning Jan. 13 and ending Feb. 17, six consecutive Saturdays have been set aside to host rides at the following locations in Iowa. Each ride begins at 10 a.m.:

Jan. 13 (Regions 3/4)

County Groomers/Butler Floyd County Snow Snoops/North Iowa Snow Seekers host Shell Rock River bottom ride from Clarksville to Rock Falls. Trailer parking available at the high school in Clarksville on the south

Jan. 20 (Region 5)

Snowdrifters named Club of the Year

The Iowa Snowdrifters of Region 9 was named the ISSA's Snowmobile Club of the Year at the 2017 ISSA Annual Convention in Cedar Rapids Nov. 18. The award recognizes a club's involvement in its local communities as well as its support of ISSA programs.

Formed in the late 1970s, the Snowdrifters maintains 220 miles of trail around Solon. North Liberty, Ely, Fairfax and the surrounding area. Their trail system meets up with two other clubs, and the scenery features routes through Lake MacBride State Park and the Coralville Reservoir.

The Snowdrifters is a 100 percent member of the ISSA, and as of 2017, membership stands at 111 snowmobilers. To recruit new members, the club hosts membership drives in the fall, and for those new members who sign up before January, the club has paid for their trail user permit fees.

The club meets throughout the year and keeps members up-to-date through its website at www.iowasnowdrifters.com and through its Facebook page. Members host trail-marking and clean-up days each fall, and every four years, they sponsor a landowner appreciation dinner.

For the past three years, the club's biggest event has been the Big Town Show Down Truck and Tractor Pull at Hawkeye Downs in Cedar Rapids in August. A dedicated committee organizes the competition, and more than 30 members help out on the day of the pull.

More than 1,700 people attend the event each summer, and the club has raised more than \$32,000. Members are saving most of those funds to purchase trail maintenance equipment. but they do support the ISSA's charities and lobbying efforts.

Four years ago, the club started the Melvin Rinehart Memorial Scholarship in honor of its late member and former ISSA director. So far, the scholarship has donated more than \$2,500 to area youth snowmobilers.

I believe we have all the trail work behinds us now. Maybe a little left, but not much. We went to the convention in November. It was pretty good this year. The snow show was well represented by most of the clubs. They all had displays with trail maps and pictures. Our club won the ISSA Club of the Year award. We had about seven members there to accept it. Also my wife and I got the ISSA Snowmobile Family of the Year. It was quite a surprise to us. We would like to thank everyone involved in nominating us and voting for us. Thank you all.

Our club is trying to get some club events set up for January or February, depending on the snow situation. Maybe it will end up just being a party if we don't get snow.

I don't have any plans to go north yet, but I should be thinking about it a little more and get some reservations made. Hopefully, everyone can start planning some trips up north or out west or the best thing would be have a lot of snow in Iowa to ride.

This is about all I have for now. I will have more news after our December meeting. I hope everyone had a Happy Holidays and THINK SNOW!!

intage ice racing returns to Clear Lake this month for the ninth installment of

the Jack Helgren Memorial/Iowa LeMans Championship Race. Here, comfort and technology are left on the beach as racers head out onto the frozen lake to navigate a mile-long serpentine track, negotiate slushy corners and pilot sleds which, in some cases, are as old as they are.

Barring poor ice and snow conditions, the two-day event—which also features youth racing, radar runs and a vintage show—will take

place in front of Clear Lake State Park Jan. 19-20. Pre-registration is scheduled for Friday night at Rumorz Bar in Clear Lake or Saturday morning out on the ice. Radar runs begin at 9 a.m. and run concurrently to the LeMans racing, which starts at 10 a.m. If the weather does not cooperate, the race committee has listed Feb. 9-10 as the back-up date.

or on the flyer on the back page of this month's issue. Results from 2017 are also posted on the race website. Last year, 106 entries competed in 21 different LeMans classes, including a 10-lap Stud Boy Challenge finale. The radar run included four divisions, and 33 kids participated in the 120 and Kitty Kat races. Awards at the show were handed out in seven categories.

With help from neighboring clubs, the event is sponsored by the North Iowa Snow Seekers of Region 3. Officials estimate the attraction draws more than 1,000 people to Clear Lake; and while most participants hail from Iowa, a few show up from Minnesota, Wisconsin and South Dakota. The vintage snowmobile show sees the greatest interest from out-of-state entries because judges here offer cash prizes to the winners in addition to a little hardware.

"The participation with our event has been going up every year, and our vintage show has really been drawing more people in," explained event coordinator and Past ISSA President Gary McVicker. "We are pulling people in from further away. That's because we are one of the few shows which actually pays out prize money, which helps offset their costs to get down here."

Bittersweet Event This Year

Simply known as 'The Jack', the race weekend started in 2010 to honor the legacy of Mason City snowmobile dealer and former

racer Jack Helgren, who died from cancer in 2009. McVicker, a family friend, wanted to create an event to recognize Helgren's contributions locally, and he said he is proud of the event's longevity and outreach in the area.

"We're definitely honoring Jack's memory, but this event has grown into much more than that," he said. "It is all about promoting snowmobiling and about driving economic dollars to the Clear Lake area. That's why we have such strong support from the community and why we try to make donations to local charities with our race proceeds in return. We have a very good reputation in Clear Lake and have a good group of volunteers to work with."

For Jack's son, John Helgren, this year's event is a little "bittersweet." For the first time in 43 years, the House of Sports dealership he and his father ran is no longer affiliated with a snowmobile manufacturer. Starting out with Boatel, Scorpion, Sno-Jet and others, the dealership began selling Ski-Doo snowmobiles in 1982, and the two spent 35 years together.

This fall, Helgren announced he had sold the Ski Doo line to local competitor Mason City Powersports. He said it was a personal decision and not driven by any outside pressure. He said he's not retired, and he will continue to sell and service used sleds as well as a line of lawn and garden equipment. At 61, he said it was time to start slowing down.

"I wasn't quite ready to do this, but I had an opportunity to sell, and I didn't know if the opportunity would be there again in a few years," Helgren admitted. "My passion is snowmobiling, and I want to start enjoying the sport again. I'm still around. I'm still dabbling in snowmobiles, but I'm just not going to work as hard as I used to during the winter months." turn to page 17

Legislation Committee Moves Forward with Plan to Merge Registration, Trail Pass

While still touting the passage of landmark legislation from last season, the ISSA's Emergency Funding and Legislation Committee (EFC) has a little unfinished business to tend to when the 87th Iowa General Assembly opens Jan. 8 at the Statehouse in Des Moines.

Not letting off the throttle, the committee—with the support of the full ISSA Board of Directors and its membership—will be working with ISSA lobbyists Mike Heller and Paula Feltner to once again urge lawmakers to merge the \$15 registration sticker and the \$15 trail user permit into one \$30 decal for snowmobile

owners in Iowa.



Even at the combined rate, riding in Iowa would still be cheaper than riding out of state in most areas, as illustrated in the table at right. South Dakota currently does not

require a non-resident trail permit.

If the measure passes in Iowa, a \$15 trail pass would still be required for non-residents. For Iowans, one less sticker to affix would certainly help clear up a sled's windshield, but anyone close to the state snowmobile program knows this proposal is less about aesthetics and more about economics. Looks are secondary.

The ISSA has been pushing for an increase in the snowmobile registration fee for most of this decade. With a new groomer and drag costing close to \$200,000, the budget is tight as 52 clubs around the state work to maintain 8,800 miles of snowmobile trail. In fact, trail grant applications in Iowa are currently funded at only 50 percent of their annual requests.

The \$15 user permit fee became a compromise to a registration increase in 2013. Rather than double the registration fee at that time, the trail pass surfaced as an alternative revenue stream. The permit is required to operate on public snowmobile trails and frozen lakes and rivers in Iowa but remains optional for those snowmobilers who claim they only ride out of state.

As a result, the yearly trend shows trail permit purchases lag behind snowmobile registrations by approximately 25 percent. That ratio equates to roughly \$90,000 in lost revenue for the state snowmobile program. By moving to a single sticker system, the EFC hopes to bridge that gap and put more money on the trails in Iowa.

Still Alive from Last Session

Carried over from the ISSA's 2017 legislative package, the bill unanimously passed the House last session and remains alive in the

Senate, where it sits before the Ways and Means Committee. Heller said the ISSA has its work cut out for them because snowmobilers in southern and western Iowa have let their legislators know they are not in favor of the merger because they only ride out west and only need the registration sticker.

"That's going to be a challenge," Heller said during his annual update to members at the ISSA convention in Cedar Rapids in

November. "I think we need to have discussions and explain why it's important."

The first opportunity for ISSA officials to meet with legislators will be Jan. 30 at the Travel Federation of Iowa's Legislative Showcase at the state fairgrounds in Des Moines. The ISSA has staffed a booth there for the past several years, and the event

offers a chance for user groups to share their stories with elected officials. ISSA President Chris Willey said the ISSA's presence there is worthwhile.

"When we go to the legislative reception each January, the legislators all know who we are because of the work of Mike and Paula," Willey said. "They know about the volunteerism we do, and they like working with us."

Cash Back for Most Snowmobilers

While some snowmobile owners in Iowa view the proposal as a fee increase, Past ISSA President and EFC member Terry Durby believes the merger will actually save the majority of snowmobilers in Iowa a little cash as they will only have to pay one writing fee to the county recorder offices.

"With it already passing in the House, we just have the Senate and Governor to work on this year," Durby said. "Our message on this proposal is we are saving people money. It's not saving everybody money, but it's saving money for the mass of snowmobilers in Iowa because you are not paying for that extra writing fee of \$2.75."

ISSA members unanimously supported the single-decal measure at the 2016 ISSA convention and the ISSA Board of Directors voted in August to pursue the measure again this legislative session. As leaders continue to meet with clubs this season, Willey said in

October they hear one consistent message from members.

"When I go to clubs and talk about this, members get upset because they feel the people who are against this idea are spending more than \$15 any time they stop any where on their sleds," Willey

"Or they are spending a lot more than that on their mountain sleds that they say they don't ride in Iowa," Durby added.

At convention, Heller urged club members to invite their legislators to meetings and events and to explain why the singledecal measure is important and why the extra funding is needed. With 2018 an election year, local politicians should be more than willing to attend, he said.

"I don't think you'll have a hard time getting them to your meetings because they want to get re-elected," Heller said.

ISSA officials said club members need to remind politicians they are in favor of the merger. According to Heller, making the trail pass mandatory by including it in the registration fee could be interpreted as a fee increase, and generally speaking, Heller said legislators in Iowa are never in favor of that. That fact alone makes the passage of the trail permit five years ago that much more remarkable as well as the House vote last session.

"You have legislators who are firmly committed to no fee increases," Heller noted. "Getting the trail permit passed five years ago is something that would not have been possible without the work of all of you, the local clubs. When the single-sticker bill unanimously passed the Iowa House last year, two Republican representatives told me it was the only fee increase they had ever voted for."

Pretty Impressive Resume

Working on the combined sticker is just the latest in a long line of productive proposals Heller and Feltner have promoted for the ISSA since being retained in 2003. Initially hired in response to the

Iowa Legislature's depletion of nearly \$1 million in snowmobile program reserves, they were key players in restoring that money five years later and have also led the organization to other milestones, including the annual registration period, a \$5 fee increase, the trail pass and separating snowmobiles from ATVs in the Iowa Code.

Last session, the ISSA, aided by its lobbyists and grass-roots snowmobilers, was able to gain control of the state snowmobile program by securing 70 percent of the snowmobile registration fees and transferring ownership of the groomer fleet from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR). Heller said this new arrangement has the "potential to be a good public-private partnership."

"You have something here with this new legislation that is going to return more money to the clubs," Heller said. "Money is tight right now with declining registrations. This is something that I really didn't think was going to be possible, but with a lot of hard work, it turned into really good legislation for snowmobilers. You have real strong support in the Iowa Legislature right now."

Recognizing their successful efforts, the ISSA Board of Directors rewarded Heller and Feltner with a six percent raise in November, bringing their annual retention fee to \$25,000. So far this year, snowmobile clubs in Iowa have donated more than \$3,000 to offset that direct expense to the ISSA budget through the Club Challenge The balance will need to be paid by membership dues.

Heller said they enjoy working with the ISSA board and consider many of its members as friends. He appreciated how their issues always have one consistent goal.

"The direction we have always gotten from your leadership is that it's important that the money goes back into snowmobiling," he said. "I can't think of another user group which has done a better job getting their funds to where they are intended to go."





snowmobilers from across Iowa to its neck of the woods for the 47th Annual SnowFest celebration. The club started SnowFest in the early 1970s to showcase their trails and snowmobiling opportunities in northeast Iowa. Slated for Jan. 25-28 this month, the fourday event features trail rides each day as well as a full slate of activities on Saturday.

A complete intinerary appears on the next page. New this year, the club will also be hosting a Snowmobile Iowa trail ride beginning at 10 a.m. on Saturday from the Howard County Fairgrounds in Cresco, the base for most of the weekend's activities as well as home to the Driftrunners' clubhouse.

As staple events throughout SnowFest, the club will lead charity rides for spina bifida and cancer research, and the torchlight parade from Cresco to the mill pond at Vernon Springs occurs before the Saturday evening dance. Other regular offerings include the Ladies Ride, Boy Scout breakfast and a vintage sled ride.

The weekend also serves as a vital membership recruiting opportunity as half of the club's annual dues are collected then. At well over 100 members, the Driftrunners is one of the

largest clubs in the state, and members are 100 percent ISSA. In 2014, the club was recognized as the ISSA's Club of the Year.

With a dozen or so groomer operators, the club maintains approximately 220 miles of trail with a late-model Pisten Bully. Club officials report 85 percent of those runs are cross-country and the balance is in the ditches. The club currently works with 245 landowners who graciously open up their property for the club's trail system.

"We take pride in not running all ditch trails," reported club member Brandon Plaht. "While we do have some ditch trails that offer no other option, we work with many landowners in the area to ride in fields and cross-country areas."

Florenceville Besides field crossings, the trails in this part of the state include abandoned railbeds and scenic routes through bluff country. The Driftrunners connect with neighboring clubs in nine locations. One of the more popular destinations on their trail system is the route to Florenceville and its sister-city of Granger, Minn.

To get there, you cross a massive 180-foot, club-built snowmobile bridge over the Upper Iowa River. Known as the State Line Trail Bridge and completed in 1995, a sign overhead welcomes you to Iowa, and integrated wooden rails keep your sled on track as you cross the river below. Earlier this fall, club volunteers cleared brush near the bridge and reinforced the river's bank at the crossing.

About a mile before that impressive structure is the club's warming bin, which is home to Charlie's Chili Feed every February. Preserving the memory of long-time club supporters Charlie and Fern Nast, this trailside stop features a fire pit, large wooden cable spools for tables, and new this summer, a directional signpost reminiscent of the one from the popular television series, M.A.S.H. It's a pretty elaborate set-up and worth a visit.

Convention Seminar Rolls Out Slight Changes for Program

The number of empty chairs at the Nov. 18 open forum in downtown Cedar Rapids with administrators of the new Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program could be interpreted as an endorsement of this season's shift in management of snowmobile registration fees from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) to the ISSA.

Held in conjunction with the ISSA's annual convention, the Saturday afternoon seminar was open to any registered snowmobile

owner in Iowa. However, less than a third of the convention attendees participated in the question-and-answer format, and no snowmobiler outside of the organization showed up to voice any concerns with the direction of program.

The scene was drastically different a year earlier at the convention in Waterloo. At that time, the IDNR still

controlled the program and had recently named a new manager as well as adopted new accounting practices. Those changes made stakeholders in the program nervous, and ISSA members filled the room as IDNR officials explained their recent moves.

Those issues ultimately led to the ISSA pursuing more control of the program, and during last year's legislative session, they successfully lobbied for 70 percent of the snowmobile registration funds and for ownership of the state's groomer fleet. The 30 percent balance remains with the IDNR for safety education, law enforcement and registration oversight.

Leaders from both sides like to call this new arrangement a "public-private partnership," and IDNR representatives were on hand this year to field questions at the open forum at convention. Unlike last year's meeting, which lasted close to three hours, this year's session lacked any dissension, and program managers were able to use the shortened time to roll out changes for the 2018-19 season.

PowerPoint Available Online

The forum was led by program co-administrators Chris Willey and Terry Durby. Willey currently serves as ISSA president and has managed the groomer operator training program for the past five years. Durby is a past ISSA president and has worked hand-in-hand with the IDNR on grooming issues for the past decade. About 45 members showed up for the seminar.

"This year's session was well attended by those club members who handle the paperwork and grant applications for their clubs," Willey said. "I was happy to see a lot of clubs represented there to ask questions and make sure they had the information they need to continue to get the funding their clubs need."

Durby and Willey's entire PowerPoint presentation is available online on the Trail Grant Program tab on the ISSA's website at www.iowasnowmobiler.com. Highlights include a review of the changes to the administration of the program as well as guidelines for next year's grant application process. As they have in the past, applications and reimbursement requests are both due May 1. Forms for next year will be posted online by Feb. 1.

Trail grants are reviewed by the Review and Selection Committee

(RSC) each off-season. In addition to Willey and Durby, the committee consists of the sitting ISSA president (or his appointee this year) and vice president as well as representatives from the west, central and east regions of the state. The IDNR also holds one position on the RSC.

As they shared in their presentation at convention, Willey and Durby vowed for "100 percent transparency" on where program dollars are being spent. With volunteers now in control, fewer snowmobile registration receipts are needed for administration and salaries, and more dollars can be obligated to maintaining the



8,800 miles of snowmobile trail in Iowa.

"Part of the reason this works so well—for us to partner with the IDNR and take over more of the program—is that it allows them to utilize their funds where it's best needed and to not have to pay someone to manage the program where we can do it on a volunteer basis," Willey explained at convention.

"Everybody on this Review and Selection Committee is in a volunteer position," he continued. "We're doing it because we love snowmobiling. We want to make sure the clubs are getting the funds they need. We're not paying any salaries. The money is all going back to the trails."

Increased Compliance

At convention, IDNR's Safety Education Coordinator Rhonda Fowler and District 2 Supervisor Randy Schnoebelen reported the department is purchasing more sleds with its portion of the fees to allow more code enforcement out on the trails. Willey said afterwards he was "encouraged by that information" as registration fees and trail passes remain the lifeblood of the program in Iowa.

"Everyone needs to remember that the money that puts fuel in the groomers, signs on the trails and helps build bridges all comes from registration and trail pass sales," he said. "People who don't buy a registration and trail pass are literally taking money away from the clubs. If snowmobilers want groomed and marked trails or want to find out where the groomer has been, they had better have a current registration and a trail pass. Better yet, they can join the club and help out."

Another goal for the program this season is to keep groomer breakdowns and downtime to a minimum. The RSC has set a policy if the repair or part is less than \$1,500, Durby and Willey, who are handling the day-to-day operations, can approve the purchase. Any dollar amount above that threshold will need committee approval.

"Even when we are both in agreement, there are times that we

will still check with the rest of the committee members, especially if someone on the committee lives in a certain area and knows that equipment and wants to make sure we are making the right decision," Willey explained. "If Terry and I don't automatically agree on a repair, we will reach out to the rest of the board. We want to keep that equipment going and trails groomed when the snow arrives."

Also announced at convention and as explained in Willey's column this month, any groomer operator card with a IDNR logo is no longer valid, meaning all operators will need to be recertified by 2020. Half of each club's groomer operators will need to be recertified by Jan. 1, 2019, and the other half will need to be recertified by Jan. 1, 2020. The lists were divided alphabetically, and each club knows who needs to be recertified and by when.

Going forward, operator cards will be good for five years, up from the current three years; and for the next two seasons, clubs will need to have a roster of current certified groomer operators in the cab of the groomer in lieu of operator cards. As of this writing, three groomer operator training courses are scheduled in the state: Jan. 7 in Hale, Jan. 8 in Clarksville and Jan. 16 at Cresco.

"We don't have card-making capabilities at this time," Willey said. "For the immediate future, each club has received a list of operators for their club. A copy of that list is to be kept in the logbook in their groomer. This list along with their state-issued driver's license will serve as proof of being an operator if stopped while operating."

Ensuring only certified operators run a groomer will be the responsibility of the club and its groomer coordinator. The ISSA is joining the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) in observance of Jan. 20-28 as International Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week. A safety proclamation has been requested from Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds and club-related activities and safety classes are being encouraged at the local level.

"The purpose of International Snowmobile Safety Week is to expose people to safe snowmobiling practices and to demonstrate how operating safely can prevent mishaps," explained ISMA President Ed Klim. "Snowmobiling is a fun and exciting family activity enjoyed by over four million people across the United States and Canada. The sport is a safe and enjoyable form of recreation if done properly and with respect."

In Iowa, snowmobiles are operated by men, women and children of all ages. Depending on weather conditions, approximately 8,800 miles of snow-covered trails are maintained and groomed by snowmobile club volunteers across the state and enjoyed by a variety of winter rec-

Activities and events held during Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week will promote responsible attitudes and actions that will foster the safe, family image of snowmobiling.

"Safe Snowmobiling means riding within your own capabilities, operating at safe and appropriate speeds for the terrain and never drinking alcoholic beverages before or while driving," explained ISSA President Chris Willey. "Always wear a helmet and adequate clothing, stay within designated riding areas and always snowmobile with another person, never alone."

Occasionally, problems occur, and snowmobilers should be prepared for all possible scenarios.

"Take along a spare belt, spark plugs and tools to do basic repairs. You also should carry emergency supplies, such as a basic first aid kit, and overnight survival provisions, such as food, matches, flashlight and extra batteries, and shelter building materials," Willey recommended. "Most importantly, always use common sense and keep a clear head. Learn all you can about responsible snowmobiling and keep safety as your top priority."

Willey said the ISSA is encouraging its member-clubs to sponsor youth snowmobile safety courses and to host other safety-related activities. Ideas and suggestions are available online through ISMA's Campaign Action Manual at www.snowmobile.org. Also posted there is information on ISMA's Safe Riders! program.

"We hope that you will find this web-based information useful in your organization's snowmobile safety campaign," Klim said.

The Jack

Riding sleds since he was eight years old, Helgren said he will now start sorting

through a quonset full of vintage sleds and probably go on a few more snowmobile trips. He still serves on The Jack race committee and was instrumental in bringing youth racing to the event four years ago. Starting out with 120 and Kitty Kat classes, The Jack now offers a junior division as well.

"From a business standpoint, for what it costs to insure those races, it gets pretty spendy, but from a moral standpoint, that's our future in snowmobiling and we need to promote that," he explained. "We don't want these teenagers falling through the cracks. I remember how thrilled I was to run the junior races back in the early 1970s. We need to get more kids involved in the sport and participating in our races."

McVicker agreed and recalled the conversations at this fall's

ISSA annual convention Cedar Rapids in which centered around youth involvement and the brainstorming which transpired to get this age group involved in organized snowmobiling.

"We definitely need to reach out to the generation younger and get them involved more and interested in snowmobiling," he said. "We also want to

get families out there. Our biggest draw is the kids and youth classes. That's where we get our biggest bang in exposure."

This year, The Jack may be adding a 200 youth class with Arctic Cat and Yamaha both offering sleds in that engine size now. "We won't know for sure until race day, but it won't take much to add them to the line-up," McVicker said.

Special Notice for Unregistered Sleds

Another change this year stems from non-registered snowmobiles participating in the races. McVicker said The Jack race committee is still working out the details with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources on that "little bit of red tape." At this point, they do know non-registered sled owners will need to obtain a Temporary Identification Number from race officials and not simply purchase a race button as in years

"Anyone without a Temporary Identification Number may be subject to a fine from the IDNR," officials posted on the event's website.

Besides those few changes, people attending this year's event should expect much of the same experience as during previous years. The latest race information will be posted on The Jack's website, and hopefully, organizers will not have to revert to the back-up date, like they had to last year and for at least three times in the history of the event. Not holding the event on the first date seems to hurt attendance.

"Last year's draw was down because we went with our back-up date due to the warm forecast for the original race date," McVicker noted.

"If we can get some good weather this year, we should have increased participation and spectators coming out. The weather is the key," Helgren said. "Considering all the obstacles we've had over the years—weather being the biggest factor—we've been able to pull this event off every year, which is amazing."






