ing held at various locations across the state. Anyone who is interested in becoming a groomer operator

for their club is welcomed at these courses also. Watch the ISSA's website and social media outlets for upcoming dates, times and locations for a class near you.

I would also like to take this time to let vou know that as a result of the vote of ISSA members taken at convention in November, we as an association will be trying again this year to get legislation passed for the change from having to have a registration sticker and a trail pass displayed on our sleds to Iowa residents only needing to

have one sticker to ride in Iowa. The trail pass would still be required for out-of-state visitors coming to ride in Iowa.

Dates Confirmed for Organized Club Rides this Winter

Aspinoff from the club displays at convention each fall, the ISSA's Snowmobile Iowa program is entering its third season this winter with seven dates set for organized rides across the state.

According to event coordinator and Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini, Snowmobile lowa is designed for clubs to "showcase" their trail systems, to increase the economic impact of snowmobiling in their areas and for snowmobilers to stay closer to home to ride.

"The host clubs are asked to have members lead the arriving guests on tours showing and educating them about the best trails in each of the areas," Andreini said. "Host clubs will be a source for information pertaining to the given area regarding gas, restaurant, historical sites and, of course, overnight accommodations if anyone should want to stay the night after a long day's ride."

Beginning Jan. 12 and ending Feb. 23, seven consecutive Saturdays have been set aside to host rides at the following locations in Iowa. Each ride begins at 10 a.m.

SPINA BIFIDA GROWS UP

THIRD IN A SERIES

Editor's Note: The Spina Bifida Association of Iowa (SBAIA) has been the ISSA's official charity since 1982. In November, we began this series profiling adults living with the condition. This month, we meet Mollie Baltutat.

Mollie Baltutat, 38, believed she was never going to get married. "No one would want me," she worried. "I also wondered whether I could have kids.'

But today, she's not only married but has two children, Emily, 71/2, and Brice, 3. She met her husband August online, after a few years of sporadic dating with unsatisfactory outcomes.

"I told August that I just wanted to be friends and was done with dating, but when he gave me earrings for Christmas, my mother inquired, 'Are you sure this is just friendship?" she said.

A successful career person with a degree from Waldorf College in business and finance and 10 years of experience at Wells Fargo, she feels that she is mostly treated like everyone else. She credits a small town background with her confidence and ease in interacting with others.

"In Algona, everyone knows you. They knew I had spina bifida, but they didn't single me out or treat me differently," she said, flashing a smile that shows her ease in relating to others. She didn't walk until she was 3 and wore braces on her legs at an early age.

"My friends found things to do that I was able to do as well," she said. "I swam, rode a bike, went to K-Mart and scooped the loop like the other kids. At times, I had a hard time keeping up. I saw a lot of backs,"

"My mother was protective of me, worrying I would get hurt. She let me get involved in church and in Girl Scouts and made special provisions for my care when I had sleepovers. In retrospect, I wish she had allowed me to take more risks," she said. "In physical education, I taught my teachers about spina bifida and showed them what I could and could not do."

Mollie cites concerns as an adult who needs specialized health care.

"I had wonderful care as a child at the Mayo Clinic but once you reach adulthood, you age out of most clinics for people with spina bifida," she said. "I would love to have a team of doctors like I did at Mayo, but that's not possible in Des Moines. Most of the time, I'm teaching the doctors about spina bifida."

It's also a challenge being a parent with a disability. "I would love to have a sup-

port group of parents with spina bifida, so I could talk about raising children. You can't pick up your children, run after them or manage car seats.

"You have to get creative," she added. "I've taught my children that they need to come to me since I can't run after them. When I go through the drive-up window at Walgreens, they get the items I need so I don't have to take my children into the store. But not everyone is willing to make this kind of accommodation."

Her daughter, Emily, helps out too, looking for slippery spots on the sidewalks, holding her mother's arm and "seeing the world through my eyes," Mollie said. "At times I wish she could just be a child, not an assistant."

Mollie has a lot to teach others, about adapting, surviving, thriving and finding meaningful work and love. She doesn't see herself as limited, but rather as creative.

"I know what I am capable of and I am persistent in showing that to others, and teaching them, if necessary, about how to relate to me," she said. "At times, like when I started college, I was just thrown into new situations and challenged to figure things out on my own. Happily that has led to the life I have now."

Normally scheduled for the middle of January, the ISSA's Winter Kids Day with families from the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa at Huxley has been postponed to Feb. 10 in hopes of increasing their chances for rideable snow.

International Snowmobile Safety Week Jan. 19-27

The ISSA is joining the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) in observance of Jan. 19-27 as International Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week for 2019. A safety proclamation has been requested from Iowa Gov. Kim Reynolds, and club-related activities and safety classes are being encouraged at the local level.

"The purpose of International Snowmobile Safety Week is to expose people to safe snowmobiling practices and to demonstrate how operating safely can prevent mishaps," explained ISMA President Ed Klim. "Snowmobiling is a fun and exciting family activity enjoyed by over four million people across the United States and Canada. The sport is a safe and enjoyable form of recreation if done properly and with respect."

In Iowa, snowmobiles are operated by men, women and children of all ages. Depending on weather conditions, approximately 8,800 miles of snow-covered trails are maintained and groomed by snowmobile club volunteers across the state and enjoyed by a variety of winter recreationists.

Activities and events held during Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week will promote responsible attitudes and actions that will foster the safe, family image of snowmobiling.

"Safe Snowmobiling means riding within your own capabilities, operating at safe and appropriate speeds for the terrain and never drinking alcoholic beverages before or while driving," explained ISSA President Brian Carmichael. "Always wear a helmet and adequate clothing, stay within designated riding areas and always snowmobile with another person, never alone."

Occasionally, problems occur, and snowmobilers should be pre-

pared for all possible scenarios.

"Take along a spare belt, spark plugs and tools to do basic repairs. You also should carry emergency supplies, such as a basic first aid kit, and overnight survival provisions, such as food, matches, flashlight and extra batteries, and shelter building materials," Carmichael recommended. "Most importantly, always use common sense and keep a clear head. Learn all you can about responsible snowmobiling and keep safety as your top priority."

Carmichael said the ISSA is encouraging its member-clubs to sponsor youth snowmobile safety courses and to host other safety-related activities. Ideas and suggestions are available online through ISMA's Campaign Action Manual at www.snowmobile. org. Also posted there is information on ISMA's Safe Riders! pro-

Materials that are available from both programs include the following: posters, fact books, a safety video, public service announcements, a website and decals that highlight safety messages and enhance safety education efforts.

"We hope that you will find this web-based information useful in your organization's snowmobile safety campaign," Klim said. "The suggested activities contained there can be modified to meet your club's needs. Any suggestions or ways to improve this manual are welcome. Have a great snowmobile season!"

Take a look at Gene Genues manner forearms, and you'll tell fairly quick-deal job Rather, his Take a look at Gene Gerdes' hands and ly he did not have a desk job. Rather, his "battle scars" write the script of a 42-year career as a snowmobile mechanic, turning wrenches for a pair of west central Iowa Ski-Doo dealerships.

Riding snowmobiles since 1972, Gerdes of Lake View, the ISSA's perennial Region 6 Director, began working on sleds fulltime in 1974. The 70-year-old retired two years ago and reflected on his time in and around the sport at the 2018 annual convention at Okoboji

"With all of the electronics, snowmobiles were a lot easier to work on when I first started out than they are now. My hands are way too big to get at some of the components on the newer sleds," he said. "I would have never guessed back then that you would need a computer to make a snowmobile run now."

Besides the improvements in technology and the resulting price increases associated with it, Gerdes also pointed to Ski-Doo's introduction of the Rev chassis in 2003 and the advancement of the rider-forward sled design as a pivotal change in the industry.

He said he has also witnessed a surge in the popularity of back-country riding for snowmobilers from his area, citing their proximity to the mountains and the guarantee of snow out west.

"A lot of guys I know used to go out there and rent mountain sleds. Now, they are buying them," he said.

Located south of Highway 20, Gerdes said the recent lack of snow in his region

has also affected club memberships and general enthusiasm for the sport. Region 6 used to have three clubs. Now there's just his home club, the Sac County Snow Lov-

"It's been challenging," he confessed. "We're on the border of the snow line in

Iowa, and we are a fairly small club. We are to the point now that we don't have very many active members.'

Gerdes Still. said it's important to be involved in organized snowmobiling and to represent riders from



his area. He first joined the ISSA board as an assistant in 1995 and, running unopposed at convention, was re-elected to his ninth consecutive two-year term in November.

"They didn't really have to twist my arm to run again," Gerdes said, noting he finally has an assistant director in fellow club member Jamie Rohlf of Wall Lake. "I enjoy being involved and to make sure there's someone there from our area."

Recognizing that commitment and honoring his years of service to the board, Gerdes was presented with the ISSA's Lifetime Achievement Award at convention. "I was really surprised to win the award," he said afterwards. "I didn't expect it and just about teared up over it."

Always good for the motion to adjourn, Gerdes rarely misses a board meeting, and to the best of his recollection, he has made every state convention except one over the last two decades. He has also participated in the ISSA's Winter Kids Day at Huxley for children with the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa, the ISSA's official charity.

But perhaps Gerdes' largest contribution to the ISSA came during its string of "Win the Sled of Your Dreams" Grand Raffle drawings from 2013-16. Gerdes sold the most tickets annually, and to no one's surprise, three of the four winners hailed from his local club. "It was always easy to sell tickets," he said. "Twenty dollars for a chance at a new sled? It didn't take too much to talk people into buying them."

Always on a Ski-Doo, Gerdes' health has slowed his riding down lately, but he did participate in the ISSA's only group trip in March of 2015 to the Upper Peninsula of Michigan, an area he had visited before during his pastime in snowmobiling.

He was also a fan of riding in the Hayward-Cable area of northern Wisconsin and Park Rapids in northern Minnesota. One of the first trips he remembered taking was to the Black Hills in 1973 on a new Ski-Doo Silver Bullet 440 TNT. "That was back before they had any trails out there," he said.

His fondest memory on a sled came in 2000 during an excursion to Canada. Along with two friends, they hopped on a "snow train" at Sault St. Marie and took it up to Hearst, Ont., where they unloaded and rode back 300 miles. The area was fairly remote and fuel stops were few and far between, he recalled.

"You needed to have a sled that would get you at least 100 miles between fuel stops. They were that far apart," he said. "We had to call ahead to make sure the next stop was going to be open. Otherwise, they would leave gas cans along the trail, and you would put your money in the coffee can hanging on a tree. They were very trusting back then."

Snow Snoops Named ISSA Club of the Year

by-product of the recent stretch of marginal snowcover in Iowa The last three winters has clubs around the state motivated to perform more pre-season trail maintenance to take advantage of what snow does land here.

Last fall, 13 clubs signed up to use the ISSA's Toolcat and front-mounted mower to help clear weeds and tall grasses from their trails and ditches, and now one club in Region 4 has built its own trail roller to help knock down vegetation and smooth over chisel-plowed fields on their crosscountry trails.

In mid-November, members of the Butler County Snow Snoops unveiled their custom-made roller and even painted it to match their 2002 Tucker groomer. The beefy


unit includes seven weighted semi tires with a pintle-hitch tongue and a warning beacon and slow-moving vehicle sign on the tail. The plan is to employ it annually after the harvest and even following the first few snow events in their area.

"We are hoping to use our new roller after early snowfalls to help establish a base by compacting the snow and taking the air out of it," explained club president Seth Bram. "We found that panning with the groomer drag only smears the snow and is a much slower process. We should be able to cover twice the ground in the same amount of time with our new roller."

Club vice president Dan Stanbrough helped design the roller and oversaw its construction effort. He also secured sponsors to help pay for the materials. The ISSA Snowmobile Trail Grant Program okayed its use, but no registration dollars were spent on it.

"There are many to be thanked with this project, but this would have never been possible without Dan's coordination and the many sponsors who stepped up in a huge way to get this done," Bram said. "We are very excited to use this attachment and improve our trails."

This type of dedication to trail preparation is one of the reasons the Butler County Snow Snoops earned the ISSA's Club of the Year honor at the 2018 annual convention in Okoboji. The club was nom-

inated by neighboring Region 4 club, the Floyd County Groomers Association.

"What an awesome feeling that was to win that prestigious award at convention," Bram said. "We appreciate the Floyd County Groomers for the nomination. It was a kind gesture from our wonderful friends to the north."

According to their nomination form, the Snow Snoops are "committed to having the best trail system possible and are continually making improvements to their trail system by installing bridges, increasing trail markings and regular grooming."

In December, the club began installing used cement hog slats for creek and waterway crossings and to replace worn out bridg-

es. Purchased through a Facebook post, the four-foot-by-10-foot spans each weigh 1,500 pounds and, put together, should easily support their groomer.

Members also participated in a trail-marking day the Sunday after Thanksgiving. Thanks to the generosity of 200 landowners, most of the club's 192-mile trail system crosses private property and features woods, fields and river bottoms. Some landowners are also club members with total membership currently at 72 snowmobilers, many of whom are multi-generational members.

Founded in 1972, the club is a strong supporter of the state organization. They are 100 percent members of the ISSA and a Platinum Sponsor as well. Bram currently serves as the Region 4 director on the board, and in 2017, the club hosted the ISSA Summer Campout. Later this month, they are planning to co-host a Snowmobile Iowa event.

Last winter, club members sponsored a vintage ride that was attended by 26 old-iron enthusiasts, and throughout the year, they hold activities to keep the level of interest up with their members, including a steak fry and membership drive, fun runs, car and motorcycle cruises and golf outings.

"We try to meet monthly throughout the year and hope to keep things fun and exciting so people know we are out there and what we are trying to do as a club," Bram said.



We meet the second Thursday of every month, year round, and currently have about 120 members. Collectively, they have developed over

220 miles of trails within our system, which connect the towns of Ely, Shueyville, Western, Walford, Fairfax, Norway, Blairstown, Solon, Sutliff, North Liberty, Tiffin, Cosgrove, Homestead, Amana, Windham and Kalona. In 2011, 70 miles of trail were added to include the towns of VanHorne, Newhall, Atkins and Keystone.

As detailed on our map on the next two pages, the majority of our trails are in Johnson County, but we also cover parts of Linn, Iowa, Benton and Washington counties. You'll see lots of scenery on our system...from wooded trails that are tight and twisty to open fields with fenceline drifts. Our trails also go through Lake Macbride State Park and to the Coralville Reservoir.

With a long list of sponsoring businesses, you're never very far from food or fuel. Our system connects to the Sledheads trails to the south, and the Winter Warriors trails to the east, resulting in many hundreds of miles of marked trails to enjoy.

If you can't make it down during the winter, be sure to catch our Big Town Showdown Truck and Tractor Pull in August in Cedar Rapids. This is our primary fundraiser, and we have been putting it on for the past four years.

Either way, come on down to our area and have some fun this year!



RULES FOR TRAIL USERS

Snowmobiles must yield to all other vehicle traffic at all times. If you encounter horse drawn vehicles, please limit your speed to avoid spooking them. We rely on landowners for our trails; please respect them at all times.

These trails are funded by your registration dollars and the Snowdirfters Inc. No tax dollars are used to create or maintain these trails for Snowmobiles. The money received from the sale of these maps and the donations is used by the Snowdrifters Inc. to maintain these trails for your safety and enjoyment.

STAY ON THE MARKED TRAIL. If you put a single track in the wrong place, others may follow it. This can cause the loss of trail sections. The most common complaint are for noise and riding off the trail. Please ride quietly around housing areas and in towns. We sometimes face opposition when trying to expand the trail system, or maintaining what we have, because of noise.

Know the rules for the towns you ride through. Some of them are posted on this map. Repeated violations will jeopardize the trails. Always check the condition of ice yourself before crossing it.

Please limit trail usage during marginal snow conditions.

Clear Lake Vintage Race to Observe 10th Anniversary this Month

The Jack Reaches Milestone Year

Better known locally as 'The Jack', the Jack Helgren Memorial Iowa Lemans Championship Race will observe its 10th Anniversary later this month at Clear Lake; and to commemorate this milestone occasion, the volunteer planning committee is ponying up \$10,000 in guaranteed purse money.

For the seventh consecutive winter, the event returns to the south bay in front of Clear Lake State Park on Saturday, Jan. 18, and will once again feature Lemans-style racing along a 1.5-mile serpentine track. The undercard includes radar runs, youth events and a vintage snowmobile show, and as always, admission for spectators is free.

Representing race entry fees and generous donations from area sponsors, The Jack will pay back three places in each of the 21 vintage Lemans races, and \$100 will be awarded to each winner in the 17 radar run classes. Another \$1,000 has been set aside for the fastest time of the day in four additional radar run categories.

More than \$2,000 in prize money is up for grabs in the vintage snowmobile show, including \$800 for the Best of Show and up to \$800 for the new vintage race sled class, where the dollar amount will be determined by the size of the winning engine. The only

catch here is the race sled must be driven to and from the show grounds.

Youth 120 and Kitty Kat races are also back this year, and the day-long event wraps up with the Iron Man Challenge, a minimum 20-lap endurance Lemans race open to any class, including modified sleds, with the winner taking home \$1,000. Complete race details can be found at www.thejackrace.com as well as on the flyer on the back cover of this month's issue.

"We really wanted to step up our game this year, and hopefully, with our increased prize money, we have caught everyone's attention," said race coordinator Gary McVicker of Hampton, chair of The Jack planning committee. "This event continues to grow every year and exceed our expectations. We keep picking up significant sponsors, so this is our way of giving back locally."

Honoring Local Dealer

Spending the first two years at McIntosh State Park on the west end of Clear Lake and another year in front of the seawall near downtown, The Jack began in January of 2010 as a tribute to a local snowmobile dealer in north central Iowa and has since evolved into a premier snowmobile event in Iowa.

At the 2018 ISSA Annual Convention in Okoboji in November, then-ISSA President Chris Willey described the race as "one of the top three winter destinations in Iowa each January," ranking it right up there with the Okoboji Winter Games in northwest Iowa and Snowfest at Cresco in northeast Iowa.

Pulling competitors from all over Iowa as well as from neighboring states, the event honors the memory of Jack Helgren, who with his son, John, owned the House of Sports Ski-Doo dealership in Mason City before his passing from cancer in May of 2009. For more than 40 years, the Helgren family supported snowmobiling and clubs in their area.

McVicker, a past ISSA president, was a Helgren family friend and, after his passing, wanted to recognize Jack's contributions to the sport by organizing a local snowmobile event. What he and others came up with was Lemans-style racing, similar to which he, John and even Jack had participated at Clear Lake in the 1970s.

"We really wanted to remember our good friend and celebrate this area's heritage with lake racing," McVicker said. "But when we first started out, I would have never guessed it would have reached the level of interest it has gained.

"It has really taken off," he continued. "We have people coming up from Des Moines and over from Cedar Rapids and even pulling guys down from Green Bay. There was also a guy last year who flew in from Las Vegas to race one of his buddy's sled."

With help from neighboring clubs, The Jack is sponsored by the North Iowa Snow Seekers of Region 3. Officials conservatively estimate the attraction draws more than 1,500 people to Clear Lake, and at last year's race Jan. 20, parking was three- and fourdeep, stretching from the entrance onto the lake to the event site.

Dan Stromer, president of the Hancock County Snowmobile Association of Region 3 and owner of Stromer Powersports and Marine near Klemme, has volunteered as a technical advisor for every year of the race since its inception and testified to the event's surge in popularity.

"I know there are a lot of other smaller events around the state, but I don't know if they are pulling the crowds in like The Jack has been lately," said Stromer, who performs race-day inspections. "Last year, the crowd was huge. We had warm weather, and the ice held up all day."

Monitoring Ice Thickness

Last year's ice was nearly two-feet thick, and the lake this winter

froze over in early December, so organizers feel fairly confident they won't need to resort to their Feb. 9 back-up date, as they have in past years. Committee members will regularly monitor the ice thickness, and site preparation will begin in earnest the week leading up to the event.

Rusty Peters of RLP Specialties near Rock Falls, another technical advisor for the race, is in charge of the course layout. Outlined by pylons and hay bales, the length of the track typically depends on the snowcover and ice conditions, but Peters said he tries to keep it at a mile and a half with plenty of straight-aways farther out on the ice and tight corners near the start-finish line.

"I always shoot for at least one quarter-mile or longer straightaway so the racers can get close to 100 mph," he said. "If it's smooth ice, I can let them go, but if there's good snow out there and the track is a little rough, I'll have to back it down a little bit, which most guys don't like. They want to run wide open."

Obviously avoiding ice heaves and other safety hazards, the track surface is left as they found it. Some winters, conditions have been glare ice, and other years, competitors have dealt with uneven snow depths. Usually by the end of the day, however, the corners are shaved down to bare ice from the ski pressure, no matter how much snow was covering it in the morning.

Peters' son, Luke Peters of Mason City, has participated in every

Jack race from the beginning and said he prefers a rougher track. That's not too surprising, considering the younger Peters spends most of his time riding dirt bikes on the Lucas Oil Pro Motocross circuit. He said his body, which is conditioned to tougher terrain, can handle the moguls better than some of his fellow competitors.

"I personally like the rough track because it helps separate the racers a little more," the 28-year-old said. "When it's glare ice, the playing field is pretty level, and everyone can go fast and smooth. So when the track is rough and all chopped up, it really separates everybody, and you can start to pull away."

'Run What You Brung'

Planning to return this month, Luke Peters is the three-time defending champion of The Jack's Iron Man Challenge, previously known as the Stud Boy Challenge. Including modified sleds, this open class concludes the day's full slate of activities, and this year's payout is advertised at \$1,750 to the top three finishers.

"You run what you brung," Rusty Peters said. "Back when Gary, John and I used to compete out there in the 70s, the races would last close to 90 minutes. That's a long time to run wide open. Now, our last race is about half that time, and its length is usually determined by how well the ice held up throughout the day."

Racing at The Jack is open to anyone willing to pay the entry fee and sign a liability waiver. Classes for the vintage races range



carbides and studs to make it handle. The best rider on the planet with an ill-handling sled is not going to do well on that track."

"We've seen guys out there with 15 to 20 more horsepower, but they can't make them handle," Rusty Peters added. "Don't get me wrong. Horsepower makes a difference, but how you use what you have is just as important. You just need to be smooth out there. Don't waste any time. Don't spin the track and keep it from sliding sideways."

"Your corner speed is where you are going to make or break your time out there," Luke Peters said. "If your suspension is set up too high and you have too much travel, you won't get that consistent traction. If you suck everything in tight, the corners will be nightand-day difference."

Favoring the Mid-1990s Polaris Chassis

Although a late-model Arctic Cat won the Iron Man Challenge in 2015, the preferred model for race day, for the most part, is the mid-1990s Polaris chassis. They easily outnumber the rest of the field at least 2:1. In fact, all but four of the 16 entries in 1996 and Older 440 Class last year piloted that brand.

"The guys with the Indys had it figured out right away and were really dominating the races early on," Stromer noted. "I guess it's because those sleds have a low center of gravity. You definitely don't want a snocross sled out there. You want something that's sucked down low and will corner flat.'

"You can make any sled compete, but for that era of Polaris, the chassis works pretty good," Rusty Peters said. "Polaris made a good cross-country sled in the 90s and always seem to work well with less horsepower."

Luke Peters' chariot is a 1996 Polaris 600 XCR. He and his dad rebuilt it from the "bottom up" and estimate they have invested more than 200 hours into that sled. The younger Peters credits that dedication for his latest success in the open challenge.

"We have put a lot of work into that sled to get it where I like it and where we can get out front right away," he said. "It always



he straddles a snowmobile, Luke Peters said he appreciates all of the hard work the committee has put into that effort and hopes it will stick around for another 10 years.

"The Jack gives me a chance to get out there and compete when I can't ride my dirt bike," he said. "I think it's been a huge success for the area. They have done a lot of hard work to get it there, and they are definitely on the right track to keep it going."

"I've always said from the beginning that it almost looks like we know what we're doing out there," McVicker said, sharing the credit with his fellow committee members and thanking everyone who shows up to help. "To see it come this far is just amazing. It's hard to slow down now."

Pre-registration begins Friday night, and opening ceremonies are at 9 a.m. Saturday. The radar runs and vintage show are held concurrent to the races with a break around noon for the youth events. Following the day's action, prize money and awards are handed out at the banquet Saturday night at the Best Western in Clear Lake. The evening also includes live entertainment.


