

Special Election Results

Following the pandemic-related cancellation of the 2020 ISSA Annual Convention in November, the ISSA conducted a special election online to fill open board seats. Voting ended a minute before midnight on Dec. 15. Region 7 Director John Kahler was elected Vice President, and incumbent Sue Paulus was re-elected Secretary.

With 2020 an even-numbered year, incumbent directors in Regions 2, 4, 8 and 10 were re-elected. In Region 6, Assistant Jamie Rohlf swapped positions with incumbent Gene Gerdes.

Former Vice President Scott Nauman was automatically named ISSA President in accordance with ISSA By-Laws. Director positions are for two-year terms on the board of directors. Officers are elected annually, and the Treasurer is appointed.

'New to Us' Groomer Finally **Arrives in Franklin County**

The backlog of federal grants used by the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program to purchase grooming equipment in Iowa loosened a little in late November when a used 2018 Tucker 2000 groomer was finally delivered to the Iowa River Riders in Region 3.

In the fall of 2017, the Franklin County Board of Supervisors applied for and received a Recreational Trails Program (RTP) grant on behalf of the club and the state snowmobile program. Past ISSA President Gary McVicker is a Franklin County Supervisor and a member of the club and helped the process along.

"It took awhile but we finally got our 'new to us' groomer," McVicker said.

Causing a three-year delay, the equipment purchase had to satisfy the federal Buy American Act. After clearing several hurdles, the ISSA's Review and Selection Committee (RSC), which oversees groomer placement, was able to acquire a latemodel Tucker groomer.

"We had to work through the challenges presented with the requirements of the RTP and only being able to buy certified American products," explained Past ISSA President Chris Willey, an RSC co-administrator. "Tucker has the documents to meet these requirements, starting with the 2018 model year."

The RSC still has two additional RTP grants to obligate, and committee members are currently working through that process. For now, they are glad to get one purchase out of the way.

"We were able to bring the first of what we hope are several new groomers to Iowa," Willey said. "We want to make sure we are fiscally stable before making such large purchases."

International Snowmobile Safety Week Jan. 16-24

The ISSA is joining the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association (ISMA) in observance of Jan. 16-24 as International Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week for 2021. Club-related activities are being encouraged at the local level.

"The purpose of International Snowmobile Safety Week is to expose people to safe snowmobiling practices and to demonstrate how operating safely can prevent mishaps," explained ISMA President Ed Klim. "Snowmobiling is a fun and exciting family activity enjoyed by over four million people across the United States and Canada. The sport is a safe and enjoyable form of recreation if done properly and with respect."

In Iowa, snowmobiles are operated by men, women and children of all ages. Depending on weather conditions, approximately 8,800 miles of snow-covered trails are maintained and groomed by snowmobile club volunteers across the state and enjoyed by a variety of winter recreationists.

Activities and events held during Snowmobile Safety Awareness Week will promote responsible attitudes and actions that will foster the safe, family image of snow-

"Safe Snowmobiling means riding within your own capabilities, operating at safe and appropriate speeds for the terrain and never drinking alcoholic beverages before or while driving," explained ISSA President Scott Nauman. "Always wear a helmet and adequate clothing, stay within designated riding areas and always snowmobile with another person, never alone."

Occasionally, problems occur, and snowmobilers should be prepared for all possible scenarios.

"Take along a spare belt, spark plugs and tools to do basic repairs. You also should carry emergency supplies, such as a basic first aid kit, and overnight survival provi-



sions, such as food, matches, flashlight and extra batteries," Nauman recommended. "Most importantly, always use common sense and keep a clear head. Learn all you can about responsible snowmobiling and keep safety as your top priority."

Ideas and suggestions are available online through ISMA's Campaign Action Manual at www.snowmobile.org. Also posted there is information on ISMA's Safe Riders! program.

Materials that are available from both programs include the following: posters, fact books, a safety video, public service announcements, a website and decals that highlight safety messages and enhance safety education efforts.

"We hope that you will find this webbased information useful in your organization's snowmobile safety campaign," Klim said. "The suggested activities contained there can be modified to meet your club's needs. Any suggestions or ways to improve this manual are welcome. Have a great snowmobile season!"

You Make Snowmobiling Safe

Safe Snowmobiling Tips

- 1. Never consume alcohol or drugs.
- 2. Become familiar with the snowmobile you ride.
- 3. Operate at safe and reasonable speeds.
- 4. Stay on trails and areas where snowmobiling is permitted.
- 5. Avoid travel on unfamiliar frozen bodies of water.
- 6. Use extra caution at night.
- 7. Keep your snowmobile properly maintained.
- 8. Become familiar with the terrain you will travel on.
- 9. Listen to the weather forecast before you leave.
- 10. Always wear a helmet and proper clothing.
- 11. Never ride alone and let someone know where you're going.
- 12. Carry emergency supplies and learn survival skills.

Six Clubs Confirmed for Guided Rides this Winter

The ISSA has finalized the ride schedule for the fifth annual Snowmobile Iowa program this winter. Organizer Bruno Andreini, a past ISSA president, had planned on seven weekend events, but only six clubs stepped forward to host, so the first calendar slot was dropped.

Starting Jan. 16 in western Iowa and ending Feb. 20 in eastern Iowa, six Saturdays have been set aside by ISSA-member clubs to host guided tours of their areas. All rides depart at 10 a.m., and host clubs should have chase vehicles and trailers available in case of breakdowns out on the trail. See the table below for the ride dates and contact information for each.

"This program is an excellent opportunity for Iowa riders to learn about Iowa's bestkept snowmobile trail secrets," Andreini said. "The goal is to inform our Iowa riders about our beautiful places to ride and increase ridership and membership within our state.'

The ride dates coincide with the season-long Take-A-Friend Snowmobiling campaign sponsored by the International Snowmobile Manufacturers Association. With that in mind, Andreini is encouraging participants to bring along riders who may be new to the sport and to introduce non-members to the ISSA.

"This is a great way to invite a non-snowmobile friend to tag along for the day while introducing him or her to our sport of snowmobiling," he said. "In addition to this, keep in mind those snowmobile friends who are not ISSA members are welcome to be part of all 'Snowmobile Iowa' rides as well."

Additional ride information and trail conditions will be posted on social media as the dates get closer. The ISSA has snowmobile gear available for anyone bringing along a non-snowmobiling guest. Andreini Honored by ISSA

Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini averages close to 1,000 miles a season on his snowmobile. Some winters see a little more action; others, a little less. He could probably do even better if he didn't choose to split his time between the trails and meeting rooms each year.

Andreini, 82, of Dallas Center, has been involved in organized snowmobiling nearly as long as he's been riding. He hopped on his first sled in 1970 and, by 1974, had joined the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club in Region 7. His desire to get involved was driven by what he observed early on in the sport.

Snowmobilers back then acted like teenagers, riding whenever and wherever they wanted, he said. Trails did not exist, and people rode across private property without permission. "I could recognize the problems we were headed for," Andreini recalled. "There was so much to accomplish to make the sport better during those early years."

Andreini, a retired electrical contractor, served in several capacities at the local level, including a stint as president in 1989. In 1992, he joined the ISSA Board of Directors as a Region 7 Assistant. Two years later, he was elected vice president and, in late 1996, became the organization's 16th president. He has remained an active board member since his two-year term in office ended.

"Fortunately, the sport of snowmobiling fit my occupation well," Andreini said. "During the construction season, hours were long, but winters would be a little leaner, allowing me time to recreate and volunteer."

Charity work

For more than 20 years, Andreini has led the ISSA's Education and Scholarship Foundation as its executive director and currently serves as the board's liaison to the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa, the ISSA's official charity. He coordinates the Winter Fun Day for Spina Bifida families—an annual ISSA event he started in 2007—and also spearheads the ISSA's Snowmobile Iowa program.

In 2002, he helped form the ISSA's Emergency Funding and Legislation Committee. This lobbying team was created in response to the Iowa Legislature's depletion of nearly \$1 million in snowmobile registration receipts. The funds were eventually restored six years later, and for their efforts, Andreini and the rest of the committee were named "Most Valuable Snowmobilers" by *Snowmobile* magazine.

Andreini is also a member of the international Iron Dog Brigade, an honorary society of club volunteers and industry legends recognized for their contributions to the sport. In 2007, he received the ISSA's Past Presidents Award and, in 2009, was inducted into the International Snowmobile Hall Fame (ISHOF), joining six other Iowans enshrined since 1991.

"Bruno has been involved in every aspect of snowmobiling, from attending meetings to grooming trails," his biography reads at the ISHOF. "He has spent countless hours to promote snowmobiling as a family sport and preserving it for future generations."

The ISSA could not agree more, and late last year, officials honored Andreini with the ISSA's Lifetime Achievement Award for 2020. He was originally scheduled to receive his glass plaque at the Nov. 14 Awards Ceremony in Ames, but following the cancellation of the state convention due to COVID-19, he was presented with his award at his home last month.

"We can't thank you enough for everything you have done for the ISSA," then-ISSA President Brian Carmichael told Andreini when announcing the award at the ISSA's virtual board meeting Nov. 15.

"I am very humbled to receive this award," replied Andreini, the 12th ISSA member to receive the honor. "Thank you for supporting me over the years. I will value this award the rest of my life."

Legislative legacy

Andreini's resume in snowmobiling tells the story of a volunteer committed to an organization, compassionate about special-needs families and dedicated to educating the future of the sport. It also illustrates his skills as a leader and motivator, getting others to buy into what he's trying to accomplish.

What he hopes stands out for his legacy is his work on the legislative front. In addition to his efforts on getting the snowmobile registration money returned, Andreini said he worked extensively on creating the antique snowmobile registration system and lobbied hard for snowmobile titles in the late 1990s.

"I spent bookoo hours getting that done," he said. "We organized and attended legislative breakfasts and negotiated as needed to move the legislation along. I am very proud of that. Having snowmobiles titled is important for so many reasons, including proof of ownership, insurance and theft prevention."

Andreini admits his involvement gives him the same rush as squeezing the throttle. As shown by the odometer reading on his Ski-Doo, he can still be found out on the trail, but he truly relishes the time spent with fellow board members and others committed to improving the sport.

"I seemed to get along with all the people I have been associated with over the years," he said. "I have never met a snowmobiler that I truly dislike. It's been a wonderful ride."

The Cresco Driftrunners snowmobile club in Region 5 will be celebrating its 50th Annual Snowfest Jan. 21-24, marking the milestone occasion with snowmobile trail rides, fundraisers and socially-distanced activities.

Amidst the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, organizers are cautiously yet optimistically moving forward with event planning and will be adhering to the most up-to-date safety and health guidelines. The latest developments will be posted on the club's Facebook page as the four-day weekend draws near.

As detailed in this month's Club News and on the flyer on page 12, the 2021 Snowfest schedule will include Early Bird and Ladies rides on Thursday and Friday and a Snowmobile Iowa ride Saturday morning. Evening trail rides are also planned, capped off by a torchlight parade through downtown Cresco Saturday evening.

Including fundraising meals, most activities will be centered around the Driftrunners' clubhouse and the Expo Center on the Howard County Fairgrounds in Cresco. The band, 'The Dweebs', will headline the annual Snowball Dance Saturday night, and a bonfire and fireworks display are planned after the parade.

During the dance, the club will be drawing for two snowmobile/ trailer packages. Members had planned on just one snowmobile and trailer raffle, but the first 150 tickets sold out by October, so they decided to hold a second raffle, again at 150 tickets at \$100 each. The original raffle is for a 2020 Ski-Doo Renegade and two-place trailer. The second raffle is for a 2020 Polaris Indy 600 and Triton trailer.

Tickets for the second raffle went on sale Dec. 11. To purchase, visit the club's Facebook page. "We would like to thank Mason City Powersports and Bodensteiner Motorsports for sponsoring these raffles alongside with us," the club posted online.


Formed in 1968, the Driftrunners stand as the largest snowmobile club in Iowa, ending last season with 139 members. The club is 100 percent ISSA, and as shown on the trail map in this month's center spread, members maintain close to 220 miles of trail in and around the Cresco area.

Nearly all of the club's trail system is cross-country, highlighted by bluffs and woods. Near the Minnesota border, the club is known statewide for its elaborate warming bin and trailside gathering place south of Florenceville, home of the club's annual Charlie's Chili Feed each February.

Just a few miles north of there is another popular destination: the State Line Trail Bridge, a massive 180-foot span the club built over the Upper Iowa River in 1995 and refurbished in 2017. Complete with wooden rails to guide skis, this impressive structure leads riders into Florenceville and its sister city of Granger, Minn.

The Driftrunners started Snowfest in 1971 as the International Snow Fest, later shortening it to just Snowfest. With snowmobiling at its core, the winter celebration over the years has included charity events, broomball tournaments and even ice sculpture contests.

Club members said they are proud to continue the tradition this year and will do whatever it takes to provide a safe and exciting four days for anyone who makes the journey over to northeast Iowa. ISSA Sholarship Update

The ISSA Education and Scholarship Foundation handed out four scholarships in 2020 to students from ISSA-member families. The awards totaled \$3,000, the same amount

Last year's recipients include Morgan and Allison Nuss from the Chickasaw Sno-Riders, Region 4; Isabelle Willey from the Snow Pioneers, Region 5; and Garret Ollendieck from the Cresco Driftrunners, Region 5.

Scholarship awards ranged between \$500 and \$1,000 per student. They were made possible by the foundation's annual fundraising efforts and by income from interest-bearing investments. Scholarships are available for graduating high school seniors and those already enrolled in college.

Applications for 2021 are due April 15. Students must belong to ISSA-member families to qualify. Materials are available for download at www.iowasnowmobiler.com/ issa/scholarship. Completed applications should be mailed to foundation secretary Carol Nauman at 402 Fifth Street, Rudd, IA 50471.

Each applicant is also required to obtain an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) rating number from the Iowa College Access Network at www.icansucceed.org. To get this number, the student will need to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. After filling out the FAFSA, the applicant will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) and be issued an EFC number.

Each applicant is also expected to submit an essay on 'What Snowmobiling Means to Me'. Last year's submissions accompany this article.

The ISSA's scholarship foundation was created with the seed money leftover from the ISSA's hosting of the International Snowmobile Congress in Cedar Rapids in 1995. Since 1998, the foundation has supported 58 students.

The foundation continues to raise funds through club donations and, for the second year in a row, a gas card raffle. Due to the cancellation of convention last November, Sally Carmichael's scholarship quilt raffle was postponed.
