## President's Desk

# Staying Busy with State Events, Club Meetings

Wow, what a difference a year makes. We have received more snow in January and the first part of February than we have had the past three years. A lot more cold weather also makes for better grooming, better trails to ride on and a lot more fun.

Unfortunately, for not having enough snow the past three years, there have been a number of members who have sold their snowmobiles to pursue other activities, such as traveling south for the winter and other forms of recreating, like atving, motorcycling and bicycling.

The last report I saw from Past ISSA President Terry Durby showed Iowa snowmobile registrations were down 30 percent from 2010. With lower registrations, we have less monies available for groomer operation and trail development. From here on out, we all need to do the best we can in stretching the dollars we receive. This year's fuel costs, with diesel prices half of where we were last year, have been a very big help.

That last report from the state's electronic licensing system also showed only 70 percent of the registrations purchased also bought the snowmobile trail user permit. I have heard many reasons/excuses for not doing so. One main reason was to wait till it snowed first. We have now had the best snowfall in four years. How many of you "forgot" to purchase your user permit?

As a reminder, the user permit came to be to raise additional monies to help in the purchase of grooming equipment. There are requests from many clubs to update their equipment, and this will not happen as

quickly as we would like to see unless everyone does their part in purchasing the user permit. Like I said before, there are less registrations which means less funds available. Please help us to help you.

One question that often comes up is how to enforce the

user permit. I have talked to local law enforcement, sheriff's departments and even the Iowa State Patrol, and they tell me it is not their problem. Most are not even aware of what some of the snowmobile regulations are. So I am asking everyone here, if you see or know of snowmobilers without user permits, please remind them of their purpose and ask them to support the program. It also wouldn't hurt to ask them to join the local club and the ISSA.

I've been attending many local club meetings and am hearing the clubs are grooming frequently with new snow. That's great. More grooming leads to more trails

for snowmobiling and more business for the towns we travel through, doing our part for tourism in Iowa.

Back on Jan. 26, Region 7 Director John Kahler, ISSA Vice President Chris Willey and myself manned the ISSA booth at the Legislative Showcase, put on by the Iowa Travel Federation, held at the Iowa State Fairgrounds in Des Moines. There were 29 Senators and 53 House Reps in attendance, making for one of the better turnouts in a number of years.

We visited with a number of the legislators, asking their opinion on a bill that was introduced on allowing the carrying of firearms while operating a snowmobile or an atv. We heard a number of different opinions. As an association, our stand is to remain neutral at this time. We will discuss this topic at the next board meeting.

In the meantime, I have received many phone calls and emails from a number of you voicing your opinion. After having two groomer certification training meetings and many club meetings, I was surprised to hear how many of you have permits to carry firearms already. I am asking for more opinions, so at the next board meeting, we will decide the ISSA's official position on this topic.

Also in January, I made it to Okoboji for the 36th Annual Okoboji Winter Games. The Dickinson County Snowhawks again hosted the "120 Kids Ride." The event was very successful with a big turnout again. I set up the ISSA/IDNR's snowmobile simulator and had many riders for the first time having a great experience. There were two boys from Pakistan who had never been on a snowmobile, and they were all smiles.

In February, I made my annual trip to the Jack Helgren Memorial Race in Clear Lake. It was another great turnout despite the cold and the wind blowing snow on Friday. Many volunteers got the course set up, and they were ready to go on Saturday. By race time, the wind had died down resulting in perfect conditions. I heard the ice thickness was around 18 inches, which was much better than back in January when the event was originally scheduled.

One last thing I have been hearing from some of you is the use of fat-tire bicycles on our trail system. After visiting with Mark from the Iowa Bike Coalition, he tells me they are more popular around the larger population areas, and he says they are willing to join a club, pay for a user permit, help with signing and even take training to be a groomer operator. I need to hear from you if you have these new bikes in your area.

Well, I rambled on long enough. With this recent change to warmer weather melting our snow, hopefully we will see more snow again before the season ends. I am not ready to put the sled away yet. As always, please send me any comments or questions. I look forward to hearing from you.

# **Declining Ticket Sales Force Grand Raffle Change**

fter posting four consecutive profits, the ISSA's Grand Raffle suffered a \$3,000 Aloss in 2015, forcing the ISSA Board of Directors to disband the program and move toward a straight 50-50 cash raffle for 2016.

Since 2011, the ISSA had sponsored a 'Sled of Your Dreams' grand raffle where the organization paid \$10,000 toward the purchase of a new sled from any ISSA associate member dealer. Before then, the ISSA had offered an ATV raffle and a pair of trailer raffles with varying degrees of success.

Until last fall, the snowmobile raffle had been fairly popular, and to promote ticket sales, an Early Bird drawing was held at the ISSA Summer Campout where three winners were drawn and awarded snowmobile apparel from a member-dealer of their choosing. Those names were then placed back into the final drawing at convention each November.

In 2015, Region 6 Director Gene Gerdes won the Grand Raffle, making it the third straight season a member of the Sac County Snow Lovers won the top award. That club also was the top-selling club for the second year in a row and received a 10 percent commission from the ISSA.

ISSA officials could not pinpoint the exact reason for the declining ticket sales last year, but the inconsistent snow over the past few seasons is the prime suspect. The weather pattern has not only caused a decline in snowmobile registrations statewide but has also hurt interest in the ISSA's programs.

"We appreciate everyone's participation in the grand raffle over the last five years and we thank you for your support, but at this time, we feel it is in the best interest of the ISSA to move in a different direction with our raffle program," explained ISSA Grand Raffle Committee Chair Gary McVicker.

## Travel Plans Ahead for ISSA Officials

fficers and directors from the ISSA will be travelling this spring to represent Iowa snowmobiling interests on the national and international stage.

April 16-19, local leaders fly to Washington, D.C., to participate in the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA) annual D.C. Fly-In. After that, they travel to Rapid City, S.D., for the 48th Annual International Snowmobile Congress (ISC) hosted by the South Dakota Snowmobile Association June 9-11.

Each event is filled with guest speakers and meetings related to the sport of snowmobiling. In D.C., participants will meet with their respective representatives on Capitol Hill, and at ISC, leaders from state, provincial and international snowmobile associations will gather to develop strategies on preserving access and funding for snowmobiling.

ISSA President Merv Hoermann will represent Iowa on the International Snowmobile Council as well as during meetings with the full ACSA board and the Midwest Chapter of ACSA. In addition to meetings and speakers, the ISC also includes a groomer reception and awards banquet.

# **Educating the Future**

The ISSA Education and Scholarship Foundation (ISSAESF) awarded two \$1,000 scholarships and two \$500 scholarships to qualifying students of ISSA families in 2015, bringing the total number of students aided to 40 over the past 17 years.

The ISSA's scholarship program was created with the seed money left over from the ISSA's hosting of the International Snowmobile Congress in Cedar Rapids in 1995. The amount awarded each year is determined by the proceeds of its investments as well as the success of its fundraising efforts.

The first scholarship was awarded in 1998. Recipients have been as few as one and awards as little as \$200. Since 2007, the foundation has maintained scholarship levels at \$1,000 per student, except in 2015 when a third-place tie resulted in the final award being divided in half.

Recipients for 2015 included Samuel Nissly, Dallas Center, Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club, Region 7; Emily Bonnstetter, Cylinder, Palo Alto Rough Riders, Region 2; and twin sisters Allison and Ashley Heims, Manchester, Snow Pioneers, Region 5 (tie).

The deadline for applying each year is April 15, and application materials can be found on the ISSA's website at www. iowasnowmobiler.com/issa/scholarship. The top applicant is then forwarded on to the international C.J. Ramstad Memorial Scholarship competition.

To qualify, the student or his/her family must be in good standing with the ISSA. The scholarship is based in part on need, and since 2012, each applicant is expected to acquire an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) rating number from the Iowa College Access Network at www.icansucceed.org.

To get this number, the student will be required to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. After filling out the FAFSA, the applicant will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) and be issued the required EFC number.

"This number is now required to be attached to the scholarship foundation application, replacing the requirement to furnish their parents' 1040 tax form with their application in the past," Andreini explained.

According to Andreini, many of the foundation's guidelines also follow those established by the International Snowmobile Media Council (ISMC) for its Ramstad scholarship, including judging applications for neatness, completeness, accurate spelling, correct grammar and school and community involvement.

"Keep all of this in mind when filling out your application; every required detail is important," Andreini said. "Take your time and follow the instructions as closely as possible; it will pay

good dividends if you do. Carefully read the instructions listed on the application information. They are very important items of instruction to follow for the Iowa program as well as for the international snowmobile scholarship.

The number of applications the ISMC receives in a yearly cycle is quite similar to what is received by ISSAESF, making the odds of our qualifying students receiving another \$1,000 scholarship "very good," Andreini said.

Student applicants are also asked to write an essay on 'What Snowmobiling Means to Me.' Last year's submissions appear on pages 11-12 of this month's issue.

All decisions of the scholarship committee are final. Scholarship funds will be awarded when the school of choice confirms enrollment.

Andreini thanked everyone for their support of the program over the past 17 years. Since the scholarship program's inception, Iowa snowmobilers have contributed generously to the foundation. Through various fundraisers, including Sally Carmichael's quilt raffles, auction items at convention and club participation in the Younkers Community Day events, Continued on page 10

# Driftrunners' 45th Annual Event Draws Sledders to Region 5

Here today, gone tomorrow. Winter's roller-coaster ride in Iowa ran off the tracks the third week in February as the thermometer crept above freezing for several unwelcomed days and prematurely put an end to a six-week stretch of decent to excellent riding conditions in the northern tier of the state.

Just a week earlier, windchills had dipped well below zero, and the forecast for above-average temperatures seemed hard to fathom. Disbelief quickly turned into reality as the foot base of snow in the farm fields across from my driveway began to reveal the black topsoil underneath. The snowmobile season in Iowa was cut in half again.

The impact of this weather pattern cuts deep. If you make hay when the sun shines, then you almost need to ride snowmobile any time there's snow on the ground, work schedule and family commitments permitting, of course. So I was glad I was able to seize the day a handful of times this winter and get out on the trails when I could.

#### **Charting a Course for Cresco**

One of those opportunities came Friday, Jan. 22, when a day off from work allowed for an overnight trip to the Cresco area to celebrate the Driftrunners' 45th Annual SnowFest. Coming along for the ride was Past ISSA President Gary McVicker of Hampton, a steady companion who had joined me on a few other escapades across Iowa during seasons past.

After upgrading his ride at House of Sports in Mason City earlier that morning, McVicker arrived at my place around noon. By car, Charles City to Cresco is an hour drive, so we had plenty of daylight left to make it to Cresco by sled in time for the scheduled club ride that evening. Before long, we were geared up and ready to hit the trails.

Crossing the impressive

Thanks to neighboring clubs working together in our area, several options existed to make it to Cresco by trail. We chose to head north to Osage and then cut over to Riceville from the Stacyville trail on the Mitchell County E-Z Riders system. Outside of Riceville, we picked up the Howard County Stumpjumpers trail to Saratoga, our preplanned dinner stop for the afternoon.

All trails had been groomed to this point, and it was a quick ride to the Togie Pub, where we each scarfed down a quick sandwich and some fries. By now, we were beginning to hit traffic from SnowFest. Some riders were participating in the day's planned Ladies Ride, while others were out showing newcomers to the area the local trail system. Among the latter was Driftrunners member and ISSA Region

5 Director Matt Miner, who was helping to guide a group of riders from the Southeast Iowa Ridge Blasters of Region 12.

Most riders were preparing to leave when we arrived at the watering hole, so we made plans to meet up with them later. As their group headed south to Lourdes, McVicker and I continued our course due east. Within seven miles, we were at Highway 63 just north of Davis Corners, picking up the Driftrunners trail near Bodensteiner Implement.

#### So Long, Region 4

At this point, we were crossing over into Region 5 as the highway serves as the boundary line with Region 4. A little more than three miles later, we reached a T-intersection in the middle of a field with one arrow pointing north to Lime Springs and another directing us south to Schley. We chose the northern route as it appeared from the map to be the quickest path to Cresco.

About five miles from Lime Springs, we located the intersection to Cresco and began heading south and east again. Halfway down this trail, we came across an abandoned railbed which now serves

as part of the Driftrunners trail system. After crossing numerous fields throughout most of the afternoon, this wooded corridor was a nice change of pace.

Not long after emerging from this trail, we could begin to see the lights from Cresco's Industrial Park and followed the trail through the Howard County Fairgrounds en route to the Super 8 motel. The signs through town led us directly to our overnight accommodations. We settled into our room around 5 p.m. and rested for a bit before the club ride in a few hours. The ride over from Charles City was approximately 80 miles.

#### Several Visitors from Southern Iowa

At 7 p.m., we met up with the Driftrunners club for their evening ride to Lime Springs and Florenceville. About 25 snowmobilers participated in the 40-mile ride, including Tim Wirth and his son Cole from Lost Nation, members of the Eastern Iowa Sno-Riders of Region 9. The pair had come up for the weekend based on social media reports on trail conditions.

checking "We were Facebook, and they were saying

the trails were pretty decent here so we thought we'd come up for the weekend," Tim Wirth said. "With SnowFest going on, we thought it would be a good time. It's been good riding so far, but a little bit more snow would help. But it's more than what we have at home, so anything's better than that."

Although they had been on a few snowmobile trips out-of-state already this season, the father-son team said they would just as soon stay and ride in Iowa when they can. Based on the out-ofcounty plates on the tow vehicles in the hotel parking lot, several other snowmobilers were making the trek to Cresco for SnowFest weekend for similar reasons.

Bob and Mindy Scott of Lone Tree, members of the Eastern Iowa Sledheads of Region 12, also left the brown landscape of home behind for the weekend and made the three-hour drive north for their fifth year in a row. Mindy Scott said the variety of crosscountry trails and the scenery keep them coming back year after year. The white stuff helps too.

"We don't have any snow back home. It's all gone now," she said. "Plus most of our trails back home are mostly in the ditches, so getting out across the fields is fun up here. This is also a close drive for us, so if we can't get away for a long, extended trip, this is a good close trip. They have good trails, and we always have a lot of fun when we're up here."

Roger "Roto" Hastings of Keosauqua lives about five miles from the Missouri border in southern Iowa so not too many snowmobiling opportunities exist for him close to home each winter. For the past 36 winters, he has been trailering up to Cresco for SnowFest weekend and has enjoyed the club and the trails so much that he joined the Driftrunners.

"The people up here are really nice," the 60-year-old Hastings said. "They are a close-knit group, and they are all good friends of mine. The trail system is well marked up here, and it's been that way for a long time. I truly enjoy snowmobiling, and with my chances to ride back home very limited, I like coming up here every winter."

Hastings said he first learned of the Cresco area from others back home who used to come up for SnowFest. According to Hastings, their sleds would have a "round, white Cresco snowmobile logo" on their hoods and windshields. "We got to seeing those stickers a lot, so we decided to come up and see what it was all about," he said.

#### Dates Back to the Early 1970s

Founded in 1968, the Driftrunners started SnowFest in the early 1970s to showcase their trails and snowmobiling opportunities in northeast Iowa. Cresco native and Past ISSA President Dale Vagts moved backed to the area in 1982 and has been a member of the Driftrunners ever since. He said the four-day event has had several incarnations over the years, mostly due to cyclical snowfall.

SnowFest weekend used to include snowmobile races, a statewide

charity ride-in, broomball tournaments and ice sculpture contests. According to Vagts, the event was also heavily supported by the snowmobile manufacturers, and as many as 3,000 snowmobiles would blanket the fairgrounds.

"It was standing room only inside the Expo Center," he recalled. "The manufacturer reps would have banner wars and donate snowmobile gear to raffle off. There were so many people here that you couldn't even move inside. It was just nuts.'

Now, SnowFest activities have been scaled back to more local events. The club still hosts charity rides for spina bifida and cancer research, and the torchlight parade from Cresco to the mill pond at Vernon Springs occurs before the Saturday evening dance. Other regular offerings include the Ladies Ride, Boy Scout Breakfast and Vintage Sled Ride.

"It's still a good time now, and we're proud of what we have, but it's not like it was," Vagts said. "As long as we get the snow, we will still have people coming in from all over."

Miner, a state-certified operator, said club volunteers have been grooming the 220 miles of trail in and around the Cresco area since early January. The area had received some timely snowfall so most of the trails were in above-average condition most of SnowFest weekend. The only thin spots were around the Kendallville area, which we discovered the second day of our ride.

"We're doing pretty good this year," Miner said. "We have had a good turnout for the snow we did get. A lot of people have been out supporting our sponsors. People we talk to like coming up here for the variety of trails and the friendly atmosphere. People are already making plans for next year to come back."

At well over 100 members, the Driftrunners are one of the largest clubs in the state and are 100 percent ISSA. In 2014, they were recognized as the ISSA's Club of the Year, and Miner said approximately half of their membership dues are collected SnowFest weekend.

"It's nice to have the Boy Scouts handle the breakfast so we can concentrate on our membership drive and raffle ticket sales on Saturday," Miner said. "SnowFest is also nice because we can show off what we have for trails and scenery in northeast Iowa, and it's good for the ISSA as we can show what our groomer operation is like for people who visit from other parts of Iowa and from out of state."

State Line Trail Bridge One of the more popular destinations on Driftrunners trail system is to Florenceville and its sister-city of Granger, Minn. To get there, you cross a massive 180-foot, clubbuilt snowmobile SPRINGS bridge over the Upper Iowa River. Known as the State Line Trail Bridge and completed

in 1995, a sign overhead welcomes you to Iowa, and integrated wooden rails keep your sled on track as you cross the river below.

About a mile before that impressive structure is the club's warming bin, which is home to Charlie's Chili Feed every February. Preserving the memory of long-time club supporters Charlie and Fern Nast, this trailside stop features firewood, restroom facilities and large, wooden cable spools for tables. It's a pretty elaborate set-up and worth a second visit.

Having motored through the area the night before on the club ride, the bridge and warming bin were must-see stops during the daylight on Saturday. The Dickinson County Snowhawks of Region 1 recognized International Snowmobile Safety Week Jan. 16-24 by hosting an afternoon snowmobile ride with students from Spirit Lake High School Tuesday, Jan. 19.

The event drew 23 high-schoolers and three teachers and was held in conjunction with the school's "J Term," a monthlong course each January where students follow a project-based learning model. One of the options available to them is winter recreation and is intended to answer the question, "How come there's never anything to do around here?" explained teacher Tim O'Hagan.

"Our mission is to expose our students to as many recreational activities in the greater area as we possibly can and hope that a few of them stick," O'Hagan said. "As the students go from activity to activity, we try to have guests/business owners explain their personal background, education and interests and let the students see what it might take to make these passions become a part of their lives."

According to Snowhawks youth safety instructor Dan Delperdang, the local snowmobile club has been trying to incorporate snowmobiling into the J Term



schedule for several winters, but poor snow and trail conditions have thwarted those efforts. This winter, Mother Nature finally cooperated, and "we were finally able to make it work," he said.

The morning began with about two hours of classroom instruction on snowmobile safety, operation and regulations. Then after lunch, students were bussed down to the Okoboji Boat Works snowmobile rental shop to get fitted for helmets and clothing for those who needed them. The group was then transported to Okoboji Boat Works owner Leo "Butch" Parks' private property for the snowmobile ride.

Some students brought their own sleds, club members offered some of theirs for use by the kids and Okoboji Boats offered free snowmobile rentals as well. Helping Delperdang from the club for the day were members Randy Magg and Mark Dykema.

"Because the majority of the students had

not taken the snowmobile education class and did not have the proper certificates, they were split into two different groups," Delperdang said. "Those students who had passed the snowmobile education class and had their certificates went on a trail ride from the YMCA to East Okoboji to Superior and back."

The trail ride lasted until about 3 p.m. Those students who had not taken the education class had to remain on the privately-owned field south of the YMCA. Here, they were allowed to ride or drive the snowmobiles. The school bus was also parked in this area so students had a place to warm up while they waited their turn to go snowmobiling.

"All of the students were able to experience the sport of snowmobiling in one form or another," Delperdang said. "It was a very successful day for all students and teachers as it was a great opportunity to introduce many people to their first ride on a snowmobile. We especially want to thank Butch Parks and Okoboji Boat Works snowmobile rentals for their free use of the snowmobiles and land as well as to the club members who helped out. We also want to thank the employees of Okoboji Boat Works and Parks Marina for helping to drive the rentals to and from the ride site."

According to O'Hagan, the students enter J Term with such a wide range of experiences, so it's exciting to see the peer encouragement and leadership that comes from those who are experienced at a certain task, like snowmobiling.

"The relationships formed during these experiences is priceless," he said. "We hope this extends beyond the parameters of the classroom calendar and students go back to these activities and maybe bring new people along to recreate, volunteer or pursue it as an occupation."
