

Legislative Package

EFC members crisscross lowa, soliciting support for proposals, changes to state snowmobile program

quipped with a Power Point presentation and informational brochures, the ISSA's Emergency Funding and Legislation Committee (EFC) spent the month of January crisscrossing the state of Iowa, stumping for support of its 2017 legislative package.

In addition to the merger of the trail user permit into the annual snowmobile registration fee and the inclusion of snow bikes on public trails previously profiled in the January issue of this publication, the committee's proposal is also looking to improve transparency in the state snowmobile program and even assume administration of several of its key components.

At a meeting in Cedar Falls the first week of January, the committee informed officials with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) of the ISSA's desire to control the groomer program and the allocation of trail funding to Iowa snowmobile clubs. The ISSA already manages the groomer operator training portion. Overseeing the purchase and placement of the equipment seems to be the next logical step.

"The ISSA is willing to take those programs over," ISSA President Chris Willey said. "We have looked at a lot of different scenarios on that, and we need to run some numbers to see how it could work, but it does present some opportunities for us. The DNR has seemed favorable to that in the past."

According to the committee's brochure, "the DNR has indicated that they would like to transfer administration of the groomer inventory to the ISSA to ensure as much of the registration dollars as possible is used at the local level."

Changing the Percentages

To that end, the ISSA is proposing that 80 percent of the registration and trail pass receipts is earmarked for the local trail side. Current code allows the IDNR to spend up to 50 percent of the total revenue for the state side for program administration, salaries, law enforcement, etc. This proposal corrects the intent of the user permit when it was passed four years ago.

"Funding generated by the trail pass was supposed to go 100 percent to the clubs and supporting the program," explained Past ISSA President and EFC member Jim Willey. "As you know, when it got passed into law, the money was thrown into the general fund and the DNR can spend up to 50 percent of that money. That's not what we intended, and that's not what the lawmakers believed we were going to do with that increased revenue."

Even though the proposal reduces the percentage to the IDNR, the impact should be minimal and should result in a net-zero loss in total dollars for the IDNR—as long as the proposal to merge the \$15 user permit with the \$15 registration fee is approved by the Iowa Legislature. Currently, an average of 6,000 registered snowmobilers in Iowa do not purchase a trail pass. Not giving them an option next year would increase revenue by at least \$90,000.

"The receipts are going to be larger if the trail pass merger goes through, so even at 20 percent, the DNR will still have the same amount of dollars available to them," Jim Willey said as he outlined the legislative package to the ISSA Board of Directors at its Jan. 15 meeting in Huxley.

Transparency Request

Members of the EFC are also looking to improve transparency in the state snowmobile program. Each June, the ISSA and the IDNR meet as a Review and Selection Committee to determine how the trail grant money will be dispersed to local snowmobile clubs for the upcoming season. Usually within a month, a spreadsheet is sent out to clubs, itemizing what each one was awarded for the winter.

The ISSA would now like to see a similar breakdown on how the state side of the registration dollars are being spent. This ongoing request is now in its fourth vear, and by including it in its legislative package, EFC members hope to gain some momentum with it. Jim Willey has been championing this effort and met with IDNR officials in Des Moines Jan. 24 to hopefully get some more answers.

"As you know, we have been trying to get accurate numbers on the state side of the program, and we're getting close, but we still don't know how all of the funds have been spent over the past several years," he said. "We want the DNR to give us full disclosure. We know where the club dollars

go, but we don't know how they spend the state-side dollars.

"I am not an accountant, and this is not an audit," Willey continued. "We simply want to know what they are spending on law enforcement, equipment, etc. and then have some say on how they spend it. We're not trying to do anything that they don't know about. We are proposing what we feel is the right thing to do for the program."

"We have in our legislative package that they have to provide documentation on where the money is going," Past ISSA President and EFC member Terry Durby said.

Making a Pitch to Lawmakers

A week after Willey's visit with the IDNR, members of the EFC were back in Des Moines for the Travel Federation of Iowa's Legislative Showcase at the Iowa State Fairgrounds. In addition to Durby and both Willeys, past ISSA presidents Gary McVicker and Merv Hoermann, ISSA Vice President Brian Carmichael and Region 7 Director John Kahler were also on hand to drum up support for the ISSA's plans.

"We had a very productive evening, I felt, with our legislators," McVicker reported.

So far, committee members said feedback has been fairly supportive toward the proposed changes. Chris Willey said ISSA Lobbyists Mike Heller and Paula Feltner have been pitching it around the Capitol and "are really positive about all of this."

On Jan. 11, Durby and Kahler attended a Team Iowa Snowmobilers club meeting to discuss the ISSA's legislative priorities. According to Durby, "there was a large turnout of enthusiastic snowmobilers, and our legislative package was met with great support."

The only pushback so far has been coming from southern and western Iowa regarding the merger of the user permit and registration fees. Snowmobilers located in those areas typically own mountain sleds and said they do not ride their machines in Iowa. They therefore feel they should not have to pay for the extra \$15 if both fees are rolled into one \$30 decal.

Chris Willey has been fielding those concerns directly and is open to discuss the ISSA's proposals with any concerned stakeholder in the state. He can be reached by cell phone at (563) 920-9010 or by email at kioti79@gmail.com.

"If clubs have questions or concerns, they can reach out to us," he said.

"If you snowmobile and if you live in Iowa, then you need to support snowmobiling in Iowa, regardless of where you ride," Kahler said.

IDNR Remains Neutral

Heller and Feltner have been working with Rep. Rob Bacon, R-Slater, chair of the Natural Rescources Committee in the House, and Sen. Ken Rozenboom, R-Oskaloosa, chair of the Natural Resources and Environment Committee in the Senate. As of Feb. 13, they are close to introducing Legislative Study Bills.

"We have had good indications of support early on, and I think everything is on a positive framework for our bills," Heller said. "Working with the two chairs, they have both been very helpful and have

At this point, the plan is to introduce two separate bills, keeping the proposal to merge the trail pass and registration fee away from the rest of the package. Since the user permit is currently optional for Iowa snowmobile owners, making it mandatory could be construed as a fee increase. Because it involves money, the bill also has to go through the Ways and Means Committee in both chambers.

"The merger is going to be a little bit of a tougher hurdle to clear. I think we are in good shape so far, but it's still early on in the session," Heller said. "There is concern that they don't want to be doing a fee increase unless there is broad-base support for it from the stakeholders.

"We need to convince ISSA members and snowmobilers in general that moving to one sticker will be helpful, easier to register and bring in more money for clubs and trails and other things that we care about," he continued.

Heller said the remaining components of the ISSA's legislative package are gaining traction. Moving the percentages, he said. has been "very positive in talking with the legislators."

"We want to keep the two issues separate so we can get the rest of the bill passed if the merger proposal stalls," Heller said. "Hopefully, we will get both bills passed."

Any proposed legislation needs to be

voted out of committee by early March to have any chance this session. As for the IDNR's opinion on any of the ISSA's proposals, officials at the Wallace Building in Des Moines remain silent because it is not their legislation.

"Obviously, once it gains any traction, we

will be taking a real close look at it and have a position on it; but at this point, we are just neutral on the issues and will monitor it going forward," explained IDNR Deputy Director Bruce Trautman.

ISSA to Raffle Off Pair of Grizzly Coolers at Campout, Convention

downhill ski resort near Dubuque is bringing snocross racing Action back to Iowa this winter for the first time since the Frozen Few Snowmobile Club hosted its amateur events at Hawkeye Downs in Cedar Rapids in 2011 and 2012.

On March 3-4, the Amsoil Championship Snocross series will land at Sundown Mountain Resort for the Theisen's National Snocross, the seventh leg of its eight-race campaign. Streaming live online and slated for rebroadcast on CBS Sports Network on March

> 18, the nationally-televised event will feature the sport's most prominent racers and big-air production.


> Expected to compete is high-flying superstar Tucker Hibbert of Pelican Rapids, Minn. Sponsored by Arctic Cat, Monster Energy and Ram Trucks, Hibbert is currently third in the points standing, and his

career trophy case includes 14 Winter X Games medals and 10 national pro snocross championships. Casual race observers may also recognize the names of points leader Tim Tremblay and Ross

Mark Gordon, general manager at Sundown Mountain, attended the snocross event at Shakopee, Minn., in early January to get a feel for what to expect for this event. From his vantage point in the circuit's "nerve center," he said he was amazed by the racing action as Hibbert won the weekend's Pro Open Final.

"I don't know how Tucker does it, but he ends up in the front just about every time," Gordon said.

Fairly new to the sport, Gordon was also impressed by the series'





snocross race. "The guys who run this event are simply amazing to work with," Gordon said. "While up at Shakopee, you could tell everybody knew what they were doing, as any issue that came up was

Overall, the early March races at the eastern Iowa ski hill will be the third offering in the state over the last decade for this type of entertainment on snow. Besides Cedar Rapids, the ISSA sponsored amateur races at Sleepy Hollow Sports Park in Des Moines in 2009 and 2010.

Gordon was first introduced to the opportunity to host an ISOCseries event last summer when an email invitation was sent to prospective locations. Gordon seized the opportunity, and after ironing out a few wrinkles, his venue landed on the race calendar for early March, as announced last September.

"They first offered us a race in December, but we had to decline at the time," Gordon said. "Unfortunately, for us, that's right when we are trying to get our mountain opened up for the season. Then about four days before Hay Days, they called back and said they were considering us for an event in March, and we agreed to it. It was really an interesting process."

The ski runs will remain open during race weekend as the snocross track only takes up the northeast corner of the resort in front of the North Lodge. Building the track falls on ISOC officials, and work will begin in earnest the Monday of raceweek. Gordon said he is responsible for promoting the

event locally, lining up vendors and securing adequate parking.

"Anything inside the fence is their responsibility," Gordon noted. "They will have a very busy week prepping everything. As for us, we have three extra food vendors coming in, beer stands and live entertainment. We want to make sure people have a good time. It's just amazing how much work goes into this."

Most of the on-site parking will be consumed by tractor-trailers from race teams and series sponsors. Spectators will be routed to off-site parking locations with "an elaborate shuttle system to get people in and out quickly," Gordon promised. Attendance is expected to be in the thousands.

"Hotels are starting to fill up fast, especially the ones closest to our place," he noted.

If purchased ahead of time, general admission tickets cost \$25 each day for Friday and Saturday, and a weekend pass is available for \$45. Spectators can save even more by purchasing a weekend package of turn to page 12

ISSA Honors Downing with 2016 Lifetime Achievement Award

decade removed from his father receiving the same award, Iformer state snowmobile program manager David Downing was honored by the ISSA in 2016 with its Lifetime Achievement Award, recognizing his "outstanding dedication, commitment and support" of the ISSA over the past 14 years.

Downing, whose dad Roy first developed the fee-based program for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) back in 1973, moved to the snowmobile and all-terrain vehicle (ATV) section in 2003, becoming its first full-time director since 1991. A year ago, Downing voluntarily transferred to the department's parks division.

Considering him a loyal friend of snowmobiling in Iowa, ISSA officials wanted to thank Downing for his years of service to their members and other stakeholders across the state. The award was slated to be handed out at the ISSA's annual convention last November but, due to scheduling conflicts, was eventually presented to Downing at the ISSA Board of Directors meeting in Huxley Jan. 15.

"We wanted to recognize David's contributions over the past dozen or so years," explained ISSA President Chris Willey. "He always had the snowmobilers' best interests in mind. No matter what was going on, you always knew David would make the decision based on bettering our sport. He was always there to champion for our cause."

Downing said he felt humbled by the award, especially considering his father received the same recognition in 2006. He said he was proud to carry on his father's legacy and to also leave his own fingerprint on the program, including enhancing safety iniatives, improving trail access, upgrading the aging groomer fleet and increasing revenue.

"I was an administrator, yes, but I also felt I had the stakeholders' best interest at heart," Downing said. "I am a snowmobiler and always have been. It became less of a job and more of a passion for me. We had eight straight years of getting legislation passed, and we did it in partnership with the ISSA. Otherwise, we couldn't get anything done.

"I'm very proud of everything we accomplished," he continued. "There was equal weight for everything we did. We had a groomer fleet that to say was dilapidated would have been an understatement. To get the groomer fleet back and to see the clubs grow was important. Then to attend county and city meetings to explain the program and gain access to rail beds, for example, was also neat."

Personal Decision to Transfer

Downing said his decision to leave the program was not an easy one but had to be made for "personal reasons." His mother was in assisted living now, and he moved south to be near his father and to help him out as needed. He still works out of the Wallace Building in Des Moines and even maintains the same cubicle. Only his responsibilities have shifted.

"My new job gave me an opportunity to move in a different direction and the opportunity for me to spend more time with my father," he said. "I really miss the snowmobile program and the relationships I had with the snowmobilers. I had the hardest time even telling anyone about my decision. I had mixed emotions about it. That made it extremely difficult."

Outside of the department, Willey was one of the first people to

learn of Downing's decision to leave. Downing said he notified Willey of the news two hours before the transfer request had to be submitted. It was that type of communication and friendship that Willey will always remember about Downing. He said he was always there to support the program.

"I knew I could call on him day or night to discuss matters, and I know clubs felt the same way," Willey said. "He was always there and took care of what needed to be done. Never did I think when David was in that position that somebody wasn't minding the store, that something wasn't being done to protect our funds."

Handed Four Goals

Downing easily recalls the day he was approached to take over the joint snowmobile and ATV program. He had been working in the IDNR's energy division, and his boss knew about his legacy with his father in recreation. He also assumed control at a time when the Iowa Legislature had just swept the fund, and several eyes were watching the IDNR's next move.

"The division head told me at the time I had four main goals: grow the fund, protect the fund, grow the recreational opportunities and update the snowmobile code," he said. "When the job came open, I talked to my father because it was something we always did and something we were proud of so I took it without question."

Downing credited his father for his "love of recreation." As a youngster, he would accompany his dad to snowmobile meetings around the state and learned firsthand the value of personal interaction with the user group they were and had been hired to represent. He took that responsibility seriously when it became his turn to further snowmobiling in Iowa.

As pictured at left, Downing was a fixture at many ISSA events. He also visited local club meetings and, when requested, attended city council meetings to explain the program and gain trail access through various communities. During his tenure, the amount of snowmobile trails in Iowa grew from just shy of 5,000 miles to the current level of 8,800 miles. That effort was not lost on him either.

"To be able to just about double the amount of snowmobile trails in Iowa and to do it in an enjoyable setting is also noteworthy to me," he said. "Our program even grew during times when there wasn't a lot of snow. There was so much enthusiasm from the clubs. It was definitely a cooperative effort we had between the ISSA and the DNR."

Spencer Couple also Recognized for Years of Service to Club

When Past ISSA President Merv Hoermann served as Region 1 Director, he made a point to visit every club in his territory as many as times as possible each winter. If clubs were committed to meeting regularly and furthering the sport in their communities, attending their functions, he felt, was the least he could do.

One club in particular always stood out to him. The Clay County Sno Broncs would continue to meet throughout the summer months and even during the low-snow years. When it came time for their meetings, he knew he could count on at least three dedicated couples showing up, even if nobody else did. In fact, for a few years there, a club meeting would consist of them simply going out for supper together.

At the core of the group were Larry and Donna Dailey of Spencer. They weren't charter members of the club but were close. They joined in 1975, three years after the club formed, and rarely missed a meeting in the 40 years since. That dedication impressed Hoermann enough to nominate the couple for the ISSA's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2016.

"They were not going to let the club die, and I always respected them for that," he said. "If it was only those three couples, they were going to keep the club going. Just like all clubs do, they went through some lean years, but they believed in the club. They were not quitters."

The Daileys were recognized at the 2016 ISSA Annual Convention in Waterloo. They were unable to attend the ceremony due to health reasons, but club president Doug Alger accepted the award on their behalf. "They deserved this," he said. "They no longer ride but continue to renew their membership each year, and their faith in our sport and our club is very strong."

"They have been very beneficial and loyal to the club," Hoermann added. "They are the ones who kept on coming and believed in the club, even though there were pretty thin times there for quite a while. You don't see that all the time, but I'm sure there are others in the state who are just as deserving. I always had my eye on this couple, and other club members thought it would be nice to recognize them."

Alger presented the Daileys with their award at a club meeting in December. Larry, who suffered three strokes in the past year, called the honor "pretty humbling." "They kept it a pretty good secret from us," he said.

in eastern Iowa. Like most ski runs, Sundown Mountain can create snow if needed, thus making the resort a desirable location for the series this late in the season.

"Of all the concerns that I have, snow is really not one of them," Gordon said. "We have a 'mountain' of additional snow that is already stockpiled. It would take Death Valley temperatures to shrink that, and I'm not exaggerating. We have a lot of snow."

Gordon said hosting a snocross race allows his resort the opportunity to "diversify" its offerings and draw new crowds to the area. "We have been looking to do something like this for a while now," he said. He hopes the new locale will please spectators and racers alike.

"Obviously, we are a small mountain, and we had to get creative on how to get people in there," he said. "We've come up with some neat solutions to that. We have freed up some space where people are going to have a great view of the race. The promoters want absolute visual excitement at all times. The way they are going to set up their course here is going to be punishing and exciting with tight corners and narrow passing lanes."

ISSA officials are also using this opportunity to promote its organization and is partnering with Gordon and Sundown Mountain to provide volunteers to assist that weekend. If you are available and would like to help out, please contact ISSA President Chris Willey at (563) 920-9010.

"We are looking for help on Friday and Saturday for sure," Willey said. "Volunteers who work at least four hours will receive a pass into the event and a free meal. The main help needed is directing traffic."

In addition to riding in their home area, they enjoyed taking trips to Park Rapids, Minn., and the Black Hills of South Dakota. Eventually, their adventures took them out to Big Horns, the Snowies and even Yellowstone National Park a few times.

"I've always enjoyed snowmobiling and have gone to quite a few places over the years. But I've always liked riding around Iowa and especially enjoyed river riding the most," he said, remembering several times going out to eat with his family on sleds and also participating in as many club rides as possible.

When he wasn't riding, he was always eager to help out the club when he could. A former club president, they hosted meetings in their home and helped the club get ready for the season, from clearing trail to picking up trash to installing signs. He even rode in their old groomer a bit.

"That thing didn't have a lot of power to get up out of the ditch, but now we have a new groomer which has a lot of power and it is real smooth for the operators now. What a difference," he said.

While Larry's health may have slowed them down, they are still passionate about the sport, and Alger said the award is very fitting. "They have been very active in our club over the years and are very deserving of this award," he said.

Timely Winter Storm, Local Club Efforts Help Stimulate **Economy in Late January**

his winter's volatile weather pattern should probably not come as a big surprise to most loyal readers of this magazine. State climatologist Harry Hillaker predicted in the November issue that La Nina conditions would persist this season and lead to some inconsistent snowfall.

Knowing what to expect, however, and eventually accepting it is a bitter pill to swallow. Periods of cold and snow followed by stretches of warmth and rain is hard to choke down when the riding season continues to shrink year after year. It's getting old.

December started out somewhat promising. Three measurable events painted the ground white before rain over the holidays ruined most of that blank canvas. A cold snap the following two weeks then turned the northern half of the state into a skating rink until rain and above-average temperatures returned the third week of January.

As a result of this uncooperative weather, many club events this winter had to be altered, postponed or scrapped—including nearly every Snowmobile Iowa ride. But then our luck seemed to change. A major winter storm finally emerged the last week of January, arriving just in time for SnowFest in northeast Iowa and the University of Okoboji Winter Games in northwest Iowa.

According to Hillaker, the Jan. 25 event accounted for nearly all of the January snowfall in Iowa with as much as 15 inches landing in Mason City alone. Areas along Iowa's Snow Belt received at least six inches of snow with most locations reporting nine to 12 inches. Looking back three weeks later, the snow wouldn't last long, but clubs were sure glad it showed up when it did.



For the Iowa Great Lakes region, the Dickinson County SnowHawks were able to plan snowmobile rides for the first time in five years for Winter Games weekend Jan. 26-29. As soon as the snow stopped falling, groomer

operators hit the ditches and spent the next 43 hours manicuring the club's 100 miles of trail in and around Spirit Lake.

"From the looks of our trails on Sunday afternoon, we had many people enjoying themselves over the weekend," observed Jantina Carney, publicity director for the SnowHawks.

Maintaining a Winter Games tradition, the club loosely organized a Fun Run on Saturday; and by mid-afternoon, a handful of members led this reporter on a 45-mile tour of the area. Visiting club sponsors along the way, we headed east from Spirit Lake to Superior along

Highway 9, turned south to Terril and looped back west to Milford before returning north to the lakes.

Earlier that morning, the club hosted its popular 120 demo rides in partnership with Polaris Industries, which operates a

plant in Spirit Lake. Also at the youth event, members raffled off a Polaris 120—the club's primary fundraiser for each of the last four years-and Past ISSA President Merv Hoermann was on hand with the state-owned snowmobile simulator.

Years previous, volunteers needed to haul in snow for the 120 rides, but not this time. Plenty of snow was available at the Okoboji Indian dealership grounds to introduce the sport of snowmobiling to the younger generations, including 11-year-old Ben Geil of Prior Lake, Minn., and eight-year-old Chloe Collins of Beloit, Wis.

"We want to get the kids hooked on our sport," club member Randy Magg said after volunteering at the event.

Both Geil and Collins were in town visiting relatives for the 37th annual Winter Games, and their families were among the throngs of winter tourists who converged on this popular resort community for the weekend. In addition to the snowmobile events, the schedule listed as many as 100 different activities for participants to enjoy over the four days.

As an equal number of sleds and utility vehicles crisscrossed the lakes throughout the day on Saturday, helicopter rides periodically departed from Parks Marina, local residents braved the elements at a polar plunge in front of the famed Arnold's Park Amusement Park and a fireworks show lit up the evening sky. It was quite the spectacle.

Economic Impact

The economic impact of the weekend cannot be overlooked. Ask any lodging facility in the Spirit Lake area how the week started and how it finished after the snow arrived, and they would be able to tell you plenty of the white stuff turns into plenty of the green stuff.

"We had very few reservations leading up to event before the storm, and then we picked up 90 percent of what we had within that week," reported Bridget Johnson, who opened the Oakwood Inn Bed and Breakfast last May with her husband Bill. "I thought the weekend went great."

Carney said local business owners were describing the snow event as a "million dollar storm," likening it to a timely rain during the growing season in the summer. Trailers lined the parking lots

along Highway 71 as snowmobilers filled the hotels, supported local restaurants and purchased fuel for their machines.

"Overall, our sport has a huge economic impact on our area, which is much needed during the winter months," Carney said. "When we have good ice and then good snow conditions for Winter Games, we see a huge increase in people here."

Overseeing two properties, Dan Toman, general manager at Bridges Bay Resort and Arrowwood Hotel and Conference Center, understands firsthand the impact of weather on Winter Games and the subsequent draw and appeal the event has for snowmobilers.

"There is no question that the influx of snowmobile enthusiasts during our Winter Games drives economic activity to various different types of area businesses, not only those related to hotel and tourism," he said. "It is my thoughts that you would be hardpressed to find many businesses that did not benefit from this event this year."

Providing a Good Experience

Club member Lynn Van Dyke was among those contributing to the local economy. The Wednesday night after the storm, his family was among five families who rode to Superior for supper for a total of 17 snowmobiles in their group. He said many club sponsors called this weekend "their single busiest day of the year," and that positive impact is why he and other club members take pride in marking and maintaining the area's trails.

"We try to make it safe for snowmobilers to enjoy the Lakes area each year," Van Dyke said. "We're out there marking trails, making sure there are no obstacles, putting up signs and knocking down weeds. We are all volunteers, and it can become a thankless job, but it is all worthwhile in the end."

Magg, a Region 1 assistant director for the ISSA, serves as trail director for the SnowHawks and spent a tremendous amount of time in the club's Prinoth following the storm. When asked about all that seat time, he said he is motivated to provide a pleasurable experience on the trails for visitors to the area. That in turn will help grow the club, he said, but increasing their numbers is not the primary goal.

"Sure, we would like to increase our memberships, but the real deal for us is to bring people to the area so they will spend their money here," said Magg, a former school board member. "I would say that recruiting members would be secondary. It's about bringing people to the area to create an economic impact. Two weeks ago, there were a lot of hotel rooms that hadn't been booked yet. By Thursday night after the storm, they were all full. It happened that fast."

Hoermann, a former Region 1 director for the ISSA, has long been a proponent of snowmobiling in and around the Iowa Great Lakes region. On behalf of the ISSA, he joined the Western Iowa Tourism Association, and after a snowfall like the last weekend in January, he doesn't have to remind too many what a snowy forecast can do for an area.

"What I've noticed at Winter Games is as long as it snows, people will fill up the rooms at the Lakes," he said. "Between the rooms and the eating and the socializing, they spend a lot of money each year here. It's good for snowmobiling, and it's good for the entire Lakes area in regards to tourism. This tourism just trickles down."

By the Numbers

According to the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR), nine conservation officers and five park rangers patrolled the area





that weekend, making more than 1,100 contacts with snowmobiles and ATVs/UTVs.

IDNR Supervisor Randy Schnoebelen, who oversees the snowmobile and ATV program, reported officers stopped 660 snowmobiles and 490 ATVs/UTVs. Forty-two citations were handed out, and five warnings issued.

Finally, O'Brien County got some snow—more than a couple of inches—actually eight to 10 inches. And it got used in the brief time it lasted!

I was fortunate to join four others for three and a half days of riding in the Black Hills (not excellent, but good), coming home on Monday, Jan. 23. The timing was perfect, for the predicted blizzard started about noon on Tuesday. On Thursday night, 11 people met at the warming hut on the north side of Sanborn to ride to Melvin for taco night.

Riding was good Friday and Saturday. Invitation was open for any to start at Primghar at 12:30 p.m. Saturday, ride west to the Archer blacktop, south to Highway 10, east through Paullina to Sutherland for pizza, north to Highway 18, west through Sanborn to



Sheldon, south to Granville, east and south a little to Germantown for broasted chicken and back north and east to Primghar—probably around 100 miles. Five guys did make the complete trip. With other obligations, I headed toward home after the pizza but did put on 50 miles that afternoon.

By Sunday, the temp reached about 40 degrees, with several thawing days off and on since. Yesterday, Feb. 11, I rode my bicycle on gravel road over three miles, needing no gloves or cap or heavy jacket because it was so warm. Nearly all of the snow we received has disappeared into ice and then water and mud.

I heard of two guys actually cancelling a trip out west because there was snow to ride on here! (Probably that trip has since been rescheduled.) I have heard of other trips west that have been successful. One group in December initiated a new outfit with air-ride cab and suspension on its first mountain trip of 1,960 miles.

Five or six guys timed it perfectly last week, reaching Cooke City at the same time that four feet of fresh powder fell there. Some comments from Facebook: "Epic trip with awesome sleds and great riders and athletes...riding four full days in four feet of fresh snow into unreal scenery." Even in much snow, it is still possible to hit a hole, as one guy did: "One of the little obstacles that can swallow you up," with the handlebars just barely

It's always handy to have a mechanically-minded person in the group, especially if a sled is showing its age a little bit. I heard this happened when a Cat ran out of gas way too soon, got some from a can someone else was carrying and soon was about out again. When the leak was found to be a worn hole in the fuel drain tube at the bottom of the carburetor, a couple inches were cut off. The problem was found, but not fixed. Adapting to the limited material available, the creative guy cut off a couple inches of similar tubing from the piece that supplied fuel on top of the carburetor. Still, something else was needed to wedge into the end of the tube, and the right size of a Phillips screwdriver fit. The repair job held for the next three days out west—and probably is now the permanent fix.

We appreciated the snow while we had it, but now we need more. And several ditches half full of water need to freeze first!


