

Additional Groomer Funding Made Possible by Federal Grants

The Iowa Transportation Commission on Jan. 8 approved \$3.2 million in total funding for 10 federal Recreational Trails Program (RTP) projects in Iowa, including \$224,000 for snowmobile trail grooming equipment for the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program.

Created in 1991 by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), RTP is financed by a tiny percentage of the federal fuel taxes paid by off-road user groups. Iowa's share of that pool historically comes to more than \$1 million annually, but this year's total more than tripled that amount.

"This funding is available to cities, counties, state and federal agencies and private organizations through an annual application-based process," explained Craig Markley of the Iowa Department of Transportation in a press release announcing the awards.

FHWA guidelines require RTP grants to be spread across three trail user groups: 30 percent motorized, 30 percent non-motorized and 40 percent diversified. Volunteers on the Iowa Recreational Trails Advisory Board grade the applications and then make funding recommendations to the transportation commission.

ISSA Region 7 Director John Kahler represents snowmobiling interests on that committee and reported at the ISSA's Feb. 10 board meeting they reviewed 39 applications from various entities across Iowa. The annual deadline for grant paperwork is Oct. 1.

"We had a lot more money to work with this year because there were projects that never got completed from previous years, and some that didn't even get started, so all of that funding got rolled back in for this year," Kahler said. "The whole process was definitely interesting."

In addition to snowmobiling, other trailuser groups involved on the review committee include off-highway vehicle owners (OHV), bicyclists, hikers, equestrians and water sport enthusiasts. Each member grades the applications based on estab-

lished criteria.

"Scoring the applications took forever and reviewing them at our committee meeting took forever," Kahler noted. "Everyone seems to want our portion of the money, so I offered suggestions on what needed to be changed on the questionnaire in regards to motorized trail use."

"It's by rule that motorized gets 30 percent of the total amount," pointed out Past ISSA President Terry Durby, who, as coadministrator of state snowmobile program, submitted the RTP grant application on behalf of the ISSA's Review and Selection Committee (RSC).

The only other motorized grant application to receive funding this year was for the Iowa OHV program. That award total was \$213,812. The highest grant award approved for the current funding cycle was \$650,000 to the Linn County Conservation Board for the Cedar Valley Nature Trail.

The state snowmobile program has been applying for RTP grant money to purchase grooming equipment for the past 18 years, primarily in the motorized category. Awards have typically ranged between \$200,000 and \$240,000.

"We have to justify what we're doing with each application and don't want to ask for too much and get denied," Durby said. "It becomes a balancing act."

With this latest approval, the Iowa snowmobile program is currently working with four open RTP grants and is close to completing the first one with the purchase of two Prinoth groomer leases for the Kossuth County Driftskippers in Region 2 and the Iowa Snowdrifters in Region 9.

Part of the delay in obligating this funding was created when the ISSA assumed control of the state snowmobile program from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. The RSC also works carefully to ensure equipment purchases satisfy the conditions of the Buy American Act.

Another factor to consider is these federal grants are an 80/20 match, where the snowmobile program must pony up 100 percent of the purchase price of new grooming equipment and then wait for reimbursement of 80 percent of the funds from the federal government before moving on to the next one.





Professional Snocross Series Returns to Sundown Mountain this Month

The Amsoil Championship Series re-L turns to Iowa this month for the third year in a row for the Theisen's National Snocross race at Sundown Mountain Resort March 8-9.

The weekend marks the seventh of eight venues on the International Series of Champions' 2018-19 circuit and is bookended by Salamanca, N.Y., and the season-ending grand finale at Lake Geneva.

Tickets are on sale now at any one of Theisen's 24 retail locations across Iowa and Wisconsin. Tickets can also be ordered online at snocross.com.

The track layout will remain the same as

the 2018 race, and all spectator parking is at the Northeast Iowa Community College lot in nearby Peosta 12 minutes away.

Seven buses will be arrive in the lot every 10-15 minutes to take spectators to the front door at Sundown Mountain. These same buses will be available to take everyone back on the same schedule. The cost for parking is \$10 per car.

Later on in March, Sundown is also hosting the first of four Midwest Extreme Snowmobile Challenge events from Cor Powersports. The March 23-24 event will include hillcross, cross-country racing and hill-climbing competition.

ISU Enters Clean Snowmobile Challenge

Engineering students from Iowa State University will be among 22 collegiate teams competing in the 2019 SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge at Michigan Tech University at Houghton, Mich., this month.

This year marks the fourth straight year students from ISU, called Cyclone Snowmobile Engineering, have entered the week-long competition, which begins at the Keweenaw Research Center in the U.P. March 4 and ends March 9.

In December, members of the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club toured the team's facility in Ames and presented them with a donation to offset the costs associated with participation in the event.

The competition is designed to bring innovation to the sport of snowmobiling. Fuel economy, exhaust emissions and engine technology are judged, and entries are also tested for endurance, including a ride to Copper Harbor.

The ISSA will be represented at the event by past president Merv Hoermann, who has volunteered there for more than a decade.

Moving Forward with Single-Sticker Legislation; Trail Pass Compliance this Season at 62 Percent

As of the second weekend in February, only two-thirds of the registered snowmobilers in Iowa had purchased user permits to legally ride on snowmobile trails, in ditches and on public ice in Iowa, according to officials with the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program.

Figures provided by program co-administrator and Past ISSA President Terry Durby show 18,766 snowmobiles had been registered in Iowa through Feb. 9, but only 11,708 owners had bought the optional trail pass for an overall compliance rate of just 62.4 percent. Dickinson County had the highest rate in the state at 100 percent, and Sioux County was the lowest at seven percent.

ISSA board members Dan Delperdang and Randy Magg both belong to the Dickinson County Snowhawks and credit a positive working relationship with their county recorder's office for the perfect score in their area. Regular patrols by conservation officers with the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR)—including multiple checkpoints during Okoboji Winter Games in January—also help tremendously, they said.

Des Moines by offsetting the costs of retaining lobbyists.

Past ISSA President Jim Willey, chair of the ISSA's Legislative Committee, recognizes the value of spot checks by law enforcement to improve compliance but also realizes riders are going to continue to attempt to evade the two-sticker system currently on the books in Iowa.

The \$15 trail pass was created six years ago as a compromise to an increase in the \$15 registration fee to offset rising program



costs. The total fine plus court costs for riding without a registration or trail pass sticker is \$127.50 for each.

"The problem here is twofold," Willey said. "People wait until it snows before

they'll buy a trail pass or they will say they don't ride in Iowa at all. Law enforcement cannot be everywhere, and many ride on the trails without paying for the permit. With no penalty to that behavior, the problem only gets worse."

Following landmark legislation two years ago, the ISSA assumed control of the state snowmobile program from the IDNR. The ISSA keeps 70 percent of the registration and trail pass revenue for trail maintenance, and the IDNR applies the remaining balance to law enforcement and education.

The ISSA's Review and Selection Committee oversees program expenditures and makes decisions on groomer placement and re-

pairs. Durby projected the ISSA's portion of this season's revenue at nearly \$428,000, which will cover trail insurance, trail signs, groomer fuel and repairs and also help with groomer purchases.

"Right now, our registrations are slightly behind last year and so are the trail passes," Durby reported at the ISSA Board of Directors' Feb. 10 meeting. "The only area that's up are the late fees," which are charged to those owners who register their sleds after the first of year.

With a third of the registered snowmobilers in Iowa not buying trail passes this year, close to \$74,000 (70% x \$106,000) is not being collected to offset those trail expenses, most of which are incurred regardless if it snows in Iowa or not, Willey pointed out.

For more than two years, the ISSA has been working to close that gap. Members have lobbied to combine the registration sticker and the trail pass into one \$30 sticker, but their efforts failed last spring when a House bill in favor of the merger failed to emerge from the Senate Ways and Committee.

The bill perished at the end of the 2018 legislative session, and at their annual convention in November, ISSA members renewed



their commitment to push for the same legislation this year. With no changes in language, Rep. Rob Bacon (R-Slater) agreed to sponsor the bill, now known as House Study Bill 104.

According to ISSA lobbyist Mike Heller, the bill has been assigned to a subcommittee of three legislators from Gibson, Mason City and Glenwood. The ISSA Legislative Committee is now urging snowmobilers to attend political forums in their areas to stump once again for the merger.

"We need to start talking to our local legislators now to keep this out in front of them so we don't experience the same fate we did after the last two years," Willey said.

"Our bill needs to come out of the full committee by March 8 to remain alive for the year," Heller reported in his Feb. 10 weekly update to the board. "We will work with the members of the subcommittee to try to get a meeting scheduled as soon as possible."

If the legislation passes this year, a \$15 non-resident trail permit would still be required for out-of-state riders, and even at \$30 plus writing fees, the cost to register a snowmobile in Iowa would pale in comparison to the fees charged in neighboring states, Willey noted.

"Most snowmobilers in Iowa support adequately funding our program and to continue having good trails maintained by Iowa clubs with good equipment," he said. "When they understand the reasons for the one-sticker legislation, I have not had any Iowa snowmobiler say that it does not make sense.

"The bonus to adequately supporting the program is that they only have to put one registration sticker on their sled to legally ride, and sleds registered under the Iowa vintage sled program will once again be able to be ridden on trails without the additional requirement for the trail pass," he said.

Carly, 16, chose hockey because "it's a sport I know I can play." Her father, Chris, took up hockey when he was 33 and now coaches her and other young adults from across Iowa. To watch a practice session at the Buccaneers Hockey Club in Des Moines, as I did on a cold, sunny day, is to appreciate how much patience and endurance it takes to come close to the professionals practicing nearby.

Once you become acquainted with Carly the athlete, you learn about the Carly who loves biology and the Carly who plans to study education at the University of Iowa. Her goal? To become a teacher. But for now, she's focused on high school and her favorite sport.

Carly and her family—her dad Chris, her mother Megan, and her sister Ally-passionately support the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa. They attend educational events and help to raise money at the an-



nual Walk-N-Roll.

Carly has her own campaign: to educate people about spina bifida. "Initially people are a little hesitant to get to know me because they don't know about spina bifida. I am always telling people what it is."

She's a typical teenager. A recent highlight was going to Krispy Kreme doughnuts with her friends. She also enjoys watching television—"whatever looks interesting"—and playing with her black Lab, Sherwood.

Minimizing any obstacles she has faced along the way, Carly has a quick response to any new challenge: "How can I adapt so I can do that?"

Piloting his buddy's Ski Doo 600 Renegade snowmobile, club member Barry Starmer of Ankeny pulled up to the curb in front of city hall in Huxley the second Sunday in February with a bright yellow cutter in tow. He had a very enthusiastic VIP to drop off.

When the tandem unit came a stop, 10-year-old Christian Davis climbed out of the 'Ski Boose', adjusted the open-face helmet he had squeezed on over his stocking hat and turned to his mother waiting for him on the sidewalk. "I'm going to go again!" he announced, repeating it to anyone who would listen.

Davis of Norwalk suffers from spina bifida, and his family

belongs to the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa (SBAIA), the ISSA's official charity since 1982. They were in town for the ISSA's annual Winter Kids' Day, an event now in its 13th year devoted to fellowship between the two organizations.

When conditions allow, snowmobile rides in pull-behind sleighs or on two-up machines are the marquee entertainment for the day. This year, the weather cooperated and brought three inches of fresh snow the morning of the event. Shortly after noon, the participants were eager to hit the trails.

"This is the highlight of his year," Christian's mother, Sarah Davis, said. "He really looks forward to riding on the snowmobiles." Twenty minutes later, her son was perched on the back of a two-up sled for a different per-

spective on his second lap around town.

Saylorville Club Chips In

Coordinating the ride once again were members from the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club from Region 7. Along with ISSA board members, they brought in the equipment as well as the gear and blankets for the SBAIA families to wear. In addition to the kids, siblings, parents and even a grandmother went for rides on the nearby multi-purpose Heart of Iowa Nature Trail, which is part of the Saylorville Dam trail system.

Last month marked only the sixth time the charity ride was held on snowmobiles. Beginning in January of 2007, the event started off strong with four straight years of snowmobile rides. Then poor trail conditions forced organizers to resort to hayrack rides and UTV rides over the next four years.

Before this year, 2015 was the last time spina bifida kids were able to ride with snowmobiles. The last three years had also been on UTVs. Planning this event around suitable snow had become a moving target for the ISSA. Batting one for eight over the last nine winters, event organizer and Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini knew he needed to change his luck.

So earlier this year, he decided to postpone the event a month in hopes of increasing their chances for rideable snow in February. The decision proved fortuitous as conditions on the Heart of Iowa trail survived an unseasonable warm-up the previous weekend and then were buoyed by measurable snow the morning of the event.

"It's so much nicer to have this event on snow," said Andreini of Dallas Center, a member of the Saylorville club and the ISSA's liaison on the SBAIA board. "I know road conditions probably kept some families at home today, but I really want these kids to experience what we do as snowmobilers."

Great Community Support

In all, seven sleds participated in the ride, and approximately 50 people attended the event at the Huxley Safe Room, a multipurpose civic center connected to the police department, city hall

and middle school in Huxley. In addition to the rides, the event included an ISSA-catered meal, games, crafts and a visit from three Shriner clowns.

Since its inception, the Winter Kids' Day has been held in Huxley, primarily due to the nature trail running through this central Iowa community. Andreini said the city has been very accommodating and does what it can to make sure enough snow is available to get out to the trail.

"The City of Huxley has just been great to work with over the years," Andreini said. "They furnish us with these fine facilities at no cost and offer their help in any way they can. The cooperation of this community is the best I've ever dealt with."

"It's great to have you guys here," city administrator John Haldeman said. "We love doing this. With all the departments we have involved here today, none of them balked at helping out with this event. We look forward to it every year."

From the Safe Room, the Saylorville club staked a trail past the football field and over to a farm field on the west edge of town. From there, the caravan turned south and picked up the Heart of Iowa and followed it to Highway 69, where they turned around and headed back. A second tour commenced after a brief warm-up period inside.

Largest Benefactor

Besides the obvious entertainment value, the Winter Kids' Day, according to Andreini, is designed for families and members from both organizations to get acquainted with one another. "If we get to know these families on a first-name basis, it should encourage us to work harder for them and to increase the willingness of making that extra step," he said.

Over the past 37 years, ISSA members have donated more than \$250,000 to the Urbandale-based organization, and so far this season, they have raised close to \$8,000. For the past two years, the Saylorville Dam club has earned the SBAIA's top fundraising award with roughly \$2,200 donated each year.

According to president Zac Parry, the club earmarks a large portion of the proceeds from its annual fall grass drags in Ankeny to top fundraising award at the 2018 ISSA convention in November.

spina bifida. He said it just makes sense with SBAIA offices right here in their backyard and with the participation of club member Andreini on its board.

"Being involved with spina bifida is almost like our club's legacy," said Parry of Des Moines, who led the trip through town and gave Maria Davis, Christian's older sister, a ride on his two-up sled. "We've always done it, and we give as much as we can from our grass drags."

Parry also said the donation and volunteering with the Winter Kids' Day provides great publicity for the club and the sport, at a time when most news coverage reflects negatively on snowmobiling. In fact, ABC-affiliate Channel 5 from Des Moines came up to cover the event and shed a positive light on their efforts.

"This is a great way to reach out to the community and to let people know we're not just a bunch of guys hopping from bar to bar and riding where we're not supposed to," Parry said. "We're actually giving back to our community and doing some good. Events like this are a good way to spread that message around."

Networking for Families

For Carlyn Crowe, executive director of the SBAIA, the Winter Kids' Day is an opportunity to thank the ISSA for its generous support over the years as well for their members to socialize and interact with snowmobilers and to take in an experience that they may not get otherwise.

"It's also great for us to get face-to-face with the snowmobile association because we don't always have that opportunity to connect with one another," she said. "Think about it. We are polar opposites. Snowmobilers want more snow, but for our members and families who deal with mobility issues, ice and snow does make it tricky for most of them to get around."

Spina bifida is a birth defect where the spinal cord does not develop properly. Children with the condition have limited sensation in their lower body, and as a result, mobility and incontinence are major obstacles for the families to overcome. Crowe said her organization relies on contributions from snowmobilers to offset travel expenses associated with medical care.

With ISSA donations, the SBAIA is also able to perform outreach and offer educational programming. Each fall, the SBAIA raises additional funds through its annual Walk-N-Roll at Principal Park in Des Moines, in which the Saylorville club also partakes.

"Events like these are great from a social perspective to get everybody together every few months," she said. "It's a time for our members to catch up with each other and to touch base on the programs we are working on because we are so spread out across the state as a small organization."

A fter getting skunked out last winter, enough timely snow arrived this season for members of the Cresco Driftrunners to host their 48th Annual Snowfest the last weekend in January.

The most significant weather pattern arrived the weekend before with nearly a foot of snow falling in the Howard County area. Extremely cold temperatures later in the week helped firm up the trails, and the club was able to move forward with most of their activities Thursday-Saturday, Jan. 24-27.

"We had all major events as planned except for the torchlight parade," reported club president Brandon Plaht. "The ice (at Vernon Springs Mill Pond) was not safe to ride on so we cancelled that as well the bonfire. Otherwise, the trails were in good condition at the beginning of the weekend, but by the end, they got beat up pretty well."

While the cold weather and marginal trail conditions in some areas kept some folks away, Plaht estimates 200 people showed up for the Snowball Dance Saturday night. "We had a decent amount of out-of-towners come and ride for the weekend, but it is hard to say for sure the total number of snowmobilers," he said.

The weekend did start out on a somber note when a 28-yearold club member was tragically killed while riding near Lime Springs early Friday morning. Enthusiasm for the weekend seemed subdued after that, as noted by club treasurer Bob Martinek in this month's Club News.

The club also overcame a groomer breakdown and was able to return to service Saturday afternoon. Operators worked to pull snow back onto the trails and preserve what base was left. Had a weather system earlier in the week not detoured south and followed up the previous weekend's total as forecasted, the trails would have held up much better, Plaht noted.

"But the biggest thing with the weather was the below-zero temps we had all weekend," he said. "That sort of kept a number of people home, but there was still a good crowd overall."

Throughout the week leading up to the event and even during the weekend, the club posted timely updates on social media on trail conditions and events to benefit riders visiting from outside the area. Photos from the club's Facebook page accompany this Region 5 Profile.

Foundation Awards Four Scholarships in 2018

The ISSA Education and Scholarship Foundation is proud to do its part to further educa-I tional opportunites for ISSA-member families by continuing to offer academic scholarships to qualifying students.

Since 1998, the foundation has supported 50 deserving kids in Iowa. Last year, four scholarships totalling \$2,750 were awarded, and the board is once again encouraging high school seniors to apply for financial assistance this spring.

"The main purpose behind creating a scholarship program 20 years ago was to get people interested in pursuing their education beyond high school," explained Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini, executive director of the foundation.

New in 2018, the foundation added a fourth scholarship opportunity for ISSA students who are already enrolled in college. Students who have previously earned an ISSA scholarship, however, are not eligible to apply for this second offering.

Jeanette Kempe, a 2016 graduate of South Hamilton High School, was the first person to receive the second-year scholarship last year. Other recipients in 2018 included high school seniors Clayton Ollendieck, Cresco; Ryley Helle, Worthington; and Hannah Miller, Webster City.

Annual scholarship amounts are determined by the proceeds from the foundation's investments as well as the success of its fundraising efforts. The program was first created

with the seed money left over from the ISSA's hosting of the International Snowmobile Congress in Cedar Rapids in 1995.

At last November's ISSA convention in Okoboji, the scholarship program received \$450 in donations from snowmobile clubs and another \$250 from Sally Carmichael's annual quilt raffle. The Silent Auction added \$542, bringing the total haul from convention weekend to \$1,242.

Scholarship applications are available for download on the ISSA's website. Applicants should check the box on the form if they are high school seniors or students already enrolled in

According to Andreini, the chances

of earning a scholarship through the ISSA are above average, given the relatively small number of entries each spring. Applications are judged anonymously, and the decisions of the scholarship committee are final. Scholarship funds are deposited when the school of choice confirms enrollment.

The top applicant each year is also forwarded onto the International Snowmobile Media Council's (ISMC) C.J. Ramstad Memorial Scholarship competition. To align itself with that program, the ISSA's scholarship application mirrors ISMC requirements.

Applicants are graded on neatness, completeness, accurate spelling, correct grammar and school and community involvement. They must also submit essays on 'What Snowmobiling Means to Me'. Last year's essays accompany this article on the ensuing two

The award is also based, in part, on need, and since 2012, each applicant has been asked to acquire an Expected Family Contribution (EFC) rating number from the Iowa College

Access Network at www.icansucceed.org. To get this number, the student will be need to fill out a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov. After filling out the FAFSA, the applicant will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) and be issued an EFC number.
