No Movement on Single-Sticker Legislation at Statehouse

nother legislative attempt to merge the Another legislative attempt to the snowmobile registration fee with the trail user permit fee in Iowa appears to be stalled once again in the Senate Ways and Means Committee. As of Feb. 17, the bill (HF 749) had not made it out of subcommittee.

ISSA Lobbyists Mike Heller and Paula Feltner are urging snowmobilers to reach out to their legislators and especially for those in central Iowa to contact Sen. Jake Chapman, R-Adel, chair of the Ways and Means Committee, to push this legislation forward.

"We are over one third of the session completed, and it is critical that we get our bill assigned to a subcommittee and moving in the Senate," Heller said. "(Chapman) has indicated that he has heard from more opponents than supporters. We are not getting the message to legislators."

Earlier in the session, Heller said they met with Chapman and former chair, Sen. Randy Feenstra, R-Hull, and "had encouraging conversations." However, the Ways and Means Committee "has not had any meetings since the organizational meeting the first week of this session."

Past ISSA President Jim Willey, chair of the ISSA's Legislative Committee, is asking all Iowa snowmobilers to contact their representatives to support this "important" legislation. He recognized that several clubs and individuals have already made calls and contacts, but more work needs to be done.

Willey said the proposed legislation will "simplify" Iowa snowmobile registration requirements. To legally ride on Iowa trails, in rights-of-way and on frozen bodies of water, snowmobilers need to display

a current registration sticker and a trail pass sticker, each currently set at \$15 plus writing costs. If passed, the bill will combine those two stickers into one \$30 decal plus writing costs.

"The combination registration and trail pass does not cost Iowa snowmobilers any more money than the current separate registration and trail pass. Plus, it makes it

ISSA Opposes Multi-Year Registration Bill for Off-Highway Recreational Vehicles

According to the ISSA Legislation Committee, a bill—not supported by the ISSA—has been introduced at the Statehouse in Des Moines to revert back to a multi-year snowmobile registration period. The state snowmobile program changed registration from a two-year \$25 fee to a one-year \$15 annual fee a dozen years ago.

"Someone who does not represent lowa snowmobilers has introduced a bill to change snowmobile registration to a multi-year registration period, which would require lowa snowmobilers to pay for their registrations two and possibly three years in advance," Committee Chair and Past ISSA President Jim Willey reported.

"Please do not support any legislation that would require multi-year registrations for lowa snowmobiles," he continued. "History has shown us that when registration dollars are held in advance, they can easily be diverted to other uses. Then, when they are needed for our program, they are not available. lowa snowmobilers fought for and were successful in getting the annual registration a number of years ago, and we need to ensure our legislators do not change this."





easier for law enforcement who will have to check for only one registration instead of the current situation where they have to check for two decals," Willey explained.

The fine for failing to display either sticker is \$127.50 for each infraction. The trail pass is currently considered optional, and operators ride at their own risk when not displaying one. By combining the two stickers, the user permit will no longer be optional, and the ISSA hopes to generate an additional \$75,000 in revenue for the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program.

The legislation has twice passed the Iowa House unanimously but has bogged down in the Senate Ways and Means Committee the last three sessions. As the cost of fuel and snow grooming equipment continues to rise, Willey said the single-sticker measure will help keep the sport of snowmobiling financially viable in Iowa for years to come.

"The only opponents to the legislation... are snowmobilers who register their snowmobiles in Iowa due to the low registration costs but then take their snowmobiles and tourism dollars to other states to ride," Willey explained in an email to the ISSA membership. "To continue to keep the Iowa snowmobile recreational programs healthy and support Iowa snowmobile dealers, restaurants, gas stations and others who benefit from the program, we need your sup-

"There is no downside to this for Iowa," Willey continued. "The Iowa snowmobile

program does not receive any tax dollars. We are fully funded by Iowa snowmobile registrations. Iowa snowmobilers have overwhelmingly indicated they want this legislation. Now is the time to contact the legislators to make it happen. We have to get this moving now."

New Trail Grant Coordinator Named at Iowa DOT

Cott Flagg was hired Dec. 27 to manage The Federal and State Recreational Trails grant programs for the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT). Officials with the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program hope this appointment will accelerate the process on three open grants for trail grooming equipment.

Totaling close to \$750,000, the federal grants were awarded through the Recreational Trails Program (RTP), but funds have not been released until a determination can be made if those equipment purchases satisfy the Buy American Act under the Trump Administration.

Also delaying the process was the retirement of former state grant administrator Yvonne Diller nearly a year ago. With Flagg now filling that role with the IDOT's Office of Systems Planning, the ISSA hopes the three groomer grants will finally gain some traction.

"I feel we are a priority at the IDOT because we have outstanding grants that stalled because there wasn't a program administrator," explained Past ISSA President Terry Durby, a co-administrator of the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program, at the Jan. 12 ISSA Board of Directors meeting. "We look forward to working with (Flagg) in the very near future."

As a potential workaround to the Buy American requirement, Durby said the Review and Selection Committee of the state snowmobile trail grant program is also investigating other means to apply this grant funding and has been in contact with Kim Raap with Trails Work Consulting in Sioux Falls for guidance.

"We are looking at different ways to apply this money," Durby said. "These RTP grants are really meant for trail development. They are not intended to buy equipment so we are already at a disadvantage. That is one thing we are going to explain to the new administrator of the program. We would like to find a different and simpler way to utilize these funds."

RTP Absent from Initial Transportation Budget

The federal Recreational Trails Program ▲ (RTP) has been around for over two decades. The program is funded by federal fuel taxes paid with each tankful in a snowmobile or other off-road vehicle. A portion of the taxes come back to the user groups because it is not be spent on federal highways.

When the program was first started, a use study was completed, which resulted in averages being determined on the amount of gas taxes paid. Those averages--in addition to miles driven, number of registered off-highway vehicles and other factors--determined a formula for those dollars being returned to each state.

According to the American Council of Snowmobile Associations (ACSA), about a third of the money that was paid in was being returned to the trails programs each year. "There has been an effort to recover more than the 30 percent of our money as well as update the use study," ACSA's E-Newsletter announced Feb. 14. "The legislation requesting 100 percent of the funds was formally introduced last week."

"This week, however, when the President's budget was released, the RTP program was not included," ACSA Executive Director Christine Jourdain reported. "The legislative process, which includes the budget process, is fluid. This is not the first time the RTP program has been eliminated. Just another battle that is now before us."

ACSA has been an active participant in the Coalition for Recreational Trails (CRT) for more than 20 years. The CRT is made up of motorized and non-motorized user groups with its focus being RTP.

"RTP is very important to the snowmobile community," Jourdain said. "We will work with the other user groups and put together a plan. We may need assistance from you, and we will let you know exactly what we need once the plan is finalized."

In Iowa, RTP grants have been financing groomer purchases since 2001. The CRT meets regularly, and the topic will likely be taken to Capitol Hill when snowmobilers attend ACSA's D.C. Fly-In April 25-28.

"The Fly-In allows the Congressmen and Senators from the snowmobile states to meet with their constituents," Jourdain explained. "It's the best opportunity for them to hear about issues in their district directly from snowmobilers."

Extended this year is the deadline for the 2020-21 trail grant requests. This form is now due by June 1 and should be sent in a separate email from the 2019-20 reimbursement requests if submitted earlier than that. As with the reimbursements,

these forms will also be emailed directly to club contacts and posted online at iowasnowmobiler.com/trailgrantprogram later this spring. For questions, contact the RSC at ISSA.RSC@gmail.com.

Scholarship applications are due April 15. Any graduating high school senior or second- or third-year returning college student whose family is in good standing with the ISSA is eligible to apply. Application materials can be downloaded at iowasnowmobiler.com/issa/scholarship.

Nominations for the 2020 ISSA Awards program are due back to the Awards Committee by July 1. The ISSA recognizes the following club-level awards: Snowmobiler of the Year, Young Snowmobiler of the Year, Snowmobile Family of the Year, Groomer Operator of the Year, Dealer of the Year and Club of the Year. Passionate Snowmobilers Show Compassion for Spina Bifida Kids

Ryan Stancl of Marion is always on the lookout for new activities for his special-needs son to experience. An event planned for the first Sunday of February caught his eye, so the pair made the two-hour trip west along Highway 30 for the ISSA's annual Winter Kids Day with families from the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa (SBAIA).

Stancl's son, Max Stancl-Hess, 15, suffers from spina bifida and needs a wheelchair to get around. He's well adjusted at school but prefers to stay inside and play video games at home, like any typical teenager during the winter months. His dad said he wanted to shake up that routine with an afternoon of outdoor fun at the community center in Huxley Feb. 2.

"We want Max to get out and meet new people," Stancl said from the Huxley Safe Room, located 10 miles south of Ames. "We

want him to get him involved in new things and socialize with others outside of school. We're trying new things all the time."

Stancl said he has been following the SBAIA on social media for more than a year now and learned of the central Iowa event through a post on Facebook. Besides helping his son expand his horizons, he said the event helps his family's situation as well by networking with other families coping with the same disability. "It's been good for all of us," he said.

Spina bifida is a birth defect where the spinal cord does not close properly. The condition leads to mobility issues and incontinence, to name a few physical challenges. Nationally, eight babies are born each day with spina bifida, and the condition is the number one birth defect which leaves the person permanently disabled for life.

The SBAIA was created in 1972 and has served as the ISSA's of-

ficial charity since 1982. Over the past four decades, snowmobile clubs in Iowa have donated close to \$300,000 to the organization to help support families with medical and equipment expenses related to their care. As listed on page 17, this year's donations have exceeded \$10,000.

Organized by Past ISSA President Bruno Andreini, the Winter Kids Day is now in its 14th year at Huxley and is designed to bring the two organizations closer together by "putting a face to the name." The cornerstone of the event is a snowmobile ride on the nearby Heart of Iowa Nature Trail, coordinated by the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club of Region 7.

Andreini and other club members work closely with the City of Huxley to build a temporary trail from the Safe Room to the multipurpose trail, which runs along the south edge of town. Weather and conditions permitting, rides are given on either two-up sleds or in pull-behind cutters. Last month, despite temperatures climbing above 40 degrees, enough snow remained for multiple laps.

"I believe our day this year was a great success," said Andreini, a Saylorville club member and the ISSA's liaison on the SBAIA board. "The weather was warm, making it perfect for families to get outside and enjoy the activities. We had adequate snow for our snow-coach rides, and the snow was in perfect condition to even build two snowmen out front."

For Stancl-Hess, the ride was his first experience on a snowmobile trail. His dad and ride volunteers helped him out of his wheelchair and into a cutter, and ISSA President Brian Carmichael pulled him along on the mile-long route. "It was actually pretty fun," Stancl-Hess said afterwards. "I really didn't know what to expect, but it was really a good time."

Helicopter landing

In addition to snowmobile rides, Spina Bifida kids and their families were treated to a meal, crafts and entertainment from a pair of clowns. New to the schedule this year was a special landing by Unity Point Health's LifeFlight helicopter from Des Moines. Not only did the aircraft's appearance create a stir for the spina bifida families on hand but also drew the interest of community members and local EMTs as well.

"This was our first successful year for the helicopter landing," Andreini noted. "I scheduled it last year, but the flight controller canceled it because of unfavorable crosswinds. Today was perfect for the landing. The tour of the craft afterward was a great experience for everyone. We were able to visit with the crew and view the interior of the craft. We received so many positive remarks about it."

Attracting more than 50 people, the Winter Kids Day lasted close to four hours and opened with guest speakers around noon. Huxley Mayor Kevin Deaton welcomed everybody to his community, saying city leaders were "honored" to host the event again. "We are absolutely happy to help you folks," he said. "I hope everybody has a great time.

"I'm always amazed with all of the cooperation we get from the City of Huxley, providing us with a beautiful facility to work out of at no charge," Andreini said. "They do so much for us behind the scenes. This year, they moved snow to make a trail for us to ride west out of here to get to the trail. No matter what I ask for, they take care of it.'

SBAIA Executive Director Carlyn Crowe, echoing her comments at the ISSA Annual Convention in Burlington last November, also recognized snowmobilers for their hospitality and generosity. "We really want to thank you for the year long and years

long support you have given us," she said at Huxley. "None of our programs would be possible without your donations."

Improving the quality of life

In addition to helping cover travel and lodging expenses related to medical care, Crowe said her organization relies on ISSA dollars to support education, to increase networking and to improve the lives of its members. At convention, she said the SBAIA would eventually like to create a summer camp for kids and to help teenagers transition into adulthood. "That is such a pivotal point in their lives," she said.

"We are always looking at the best ways to invest our money and to help our people who are living with spina bifida," Crowe said. "While prevention is still key—because there are so many unknowns and so much money that needs to go into research—the work that we are doing locally really focuses on helping folks live with their condition.

"The work we do is hard because less people know about the defect, and that makes it difficult for fundraising," she continued. "More people are living longer with spina bifida. The bad news is

there aren't enough medical professionals out there to help them. Because of all the conditions that spina bifida perpetuates, people need to see a lot of specialists."

Crowe said her organization is planning to "celebrate its knowledgeable partnership" with the ISSA by dedicating a page to it on their website at sbaia.org. At convention, the SBAIA also presented Andreini with a plaque of appreciation for his efforts on the SBAIA board. "We would like to give a very special thanks to Bruno, who has done so much for us," she said last fall.

Saylorville Club Members Assist at Adaptive Sports Iowa Event

Members of the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club have been feeling generous with their time lately. Just days after helping the ISSA host the annual Winter Kids Day with the Spina Bifida Association of Iowa at Huxley, the Region 7 club spent three days assisting Adaptive Sports Iowa with its Winter Ski Experience at Seven Oaks Recreation near Boone Feb. 5-7.

Groomer Operators Should be Certified

ore than 125 groomer operators in Iowa were certified this **IVI** season to operate grooming equipment under guidelines established by the Review and Selection Committee of the Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Program, a program administered by the ISSA since 2017.

Following a two-year training period, anyone operating a groomer in Iowa should have been certified or recertified by Jan. 1. Each club should keep a record of its certified operators in the cab of the groomer. No cards will be issued, and certification is valid for five years.

With a statewide average snowfall of nearly one foot in January, new operators should have been able to complete their checklist with a seasoned operator to earn their full certification this winter. However, program co-administrator Chris Willey pointed out there is no "sunset date" to complete this mandate.

"We are at the mercy of Mother Nature to get that done," Willey said at the Jan. 12 ISSA Board of Directors meeting. "We just don't want clubs to pencil-whip this process. We want to make sure we have qualified operators running this equipment, and the clubs should know who these people are."

Willey said individual clubs have full control on whom they allow to run the machines, including non-club members if they don't ride a snowmobile.

"We're not going to micromanage a club on who's running their machine," Willey said. "It's hard enough to get guys in a groomer. If you have someone who is willing to get in a machine and run it, it might be worth it to pay that operator's membership as a token of appreciation."

Race Officials: New Venue at Fairgrounds Enhances Spectator Experience

The Amsoil Championship Snocross circuit returned to Dubuque for the fourth straight season Jan. 31-Feb. 1 for the Theisen's Snocross National presented by Kwik Star. After spending the first three years at Sundown Mountain Resort, the event relocated a little closer to town at the Dubuque County Fairgrounds.

Besides location, this year's event had also moved up earlier on the snocross schedule from its previous slot in early March. Making up Rounds 9 and 10 for the 2019-20 campaign, the weekend's action in eastern Iowa featured two full days of snowmobile racing inside the Dubuque Speedway racetrack. Riders competed in 20 classes ranging from top-level Pro to entry-level Youth.

In the weeks leading up to the event, snow was hauled in and made artificially to create a snocross track around the 3/8-mile oval. Media reports described the new track as "really challenging for racers, mixing a fast start, big rhythm sections and multiple

passing options." Miranda Hopp, social media coordinator for the series, said the new setting enhanced the spectator experience as well.

"Mother Nature was definitely in our favor, and we were able to create a pretty big track," Hopp said. "The racers, teams and crowds were ecstatic about the size of the track as well as well as all of the benefits the venue featured, such as great track visibility, on-site parking, several warming areas, vendors and all of the after-parties."

While appealing to the grandstand crowd, unseasonably warm weather made track conditions a little mushy as competitors snaked their way around the infield. Temperatures crept into the low 40s at race time on Saturday, and "the warm air the team saw last weekend in South Dakota was still present in Iowa," Hentges Racing said in a Feb. 3 press release.

"This meant riders battled the same sloppy mess of a track and the visibility problems that come with it. It was just one factor in the weekend's racing the team worked to conquer," Hentges noted.

event filling in for injured snocross star Kody Kamm, the 2017 series champion and runner-up the last two seasons. The 19-year-old Harr finished fourth in Friday night's Pro final and fifth in Saturday night's Pro final for a solid showing for the weekend.

"Iowa was a big track, but it worked good for me," the Swedish teen said. "Once again, the team gave me a fast sled. It was a good weekend for us. With two Top 5 finishes, I'm definitely feeling more comfortable now, so I'm looking forward to New York and getting some top finishes."

Podium finishers in both Pro finals at Theisen's Snocross National didn't change between the two races, just their places on the stand. Boss Racing's Aki Pihlaja won Friday night's final, and teammate and defending series champion Elias Ishoel claimed Saturday night's top spot.

Pihlaja finished third on Saturday, and Ishoel placed second on Friday. Meanwhile, Daniel Benham, Jr., finished third and second, respectively. Ishoel left Dubuque with the points lead and has been in the driver's seat most of the season, winning five finals before Iowa and only missing the podium twice.

Snowmobiling in the Fast Lane

Saylorville Club Member Casler Races into the Recordbooks

For many of us, we got started in snowmobiling through the influence of a friend or family member or even just because there was a sled around that no one was using. This is also true for SDSC member, Aaron Casler, whose dad did a little bit of riding.

Aaron, 45, started riding at the age of 12 as a way to deliver the *Des Moines Register* and Globe-Gazette in his home town of Leland. Each morning, he would have to have his dad, Richard Casler, start the snowmobile (either a 400 Scorpion Super Stinger or a 340 Eskimo), and then he would ride on the bags of papers to make the ride a bit more comfortable. When he wasn't delivering papers, Aaron was just riding around town enjoying the fun that we all know snowmobiling is.

Eventually, Aaron purchased a 1995 ZRT 800 and started racing his friends. The desire to win was kindled. He wrecked that sled in 2001 while trail riding and upgraded to a newer

Then in 2001, Aaron was invited to join a group of guys (Terrel Brock, Brian Hanson and Larry Folkerts) on a trip to the Houghton area of the UP. These guys were a little older, and like many of the more seasoned members of our sport, they were glad to take a younger rider along to help spread snowmobiling to another generation. This invitation is something that Aaron is grateful for and something he thinks we need to foster more of in snowmobiling to increase participation and avoid exclusion of potential club members.

His advice is: "If you have a spot on a trailer or trip, invite someone new to help them feel included and make them want to keep snowmobiling."

Scratching that itch


Aaron's itch to race continued to grow as he raced his friends for fun, and he graduated to grass drags. His first grass drag experience was with the SDSC at Expo Airfield in Ankeny. He was humbled in the beginning with some losses, but he took to the sport and started learning as much as he could about sled setup and modification as well as racing in general.

At the start of his racing career, he said he was too poor to pay someone to work on his sleds so he had to learn how to repair and modify them with the help of one of the guys who originally took him to the UP—Terrel Brock. His hard work and practice paid off as he began to get better and started winning.

After winning in the grass drag arena at the local level, Aaron set his sights in 2003 on a new challenge: transitioning to professional racing. To achieve that end, he improved his 2000 ZRT 800 to a 1000 in the hopes of being competitive. Then, he drove five hours to Princeton, Minn., raced once...and lost. Like before, this loss just fueled the drive to win, and he sought out the resources and knowledge to improve his racing skill set.

Through his search to get better at racing, Aaron came across Glen Hall in the racing results of Snow Week. Glen was winning a lot and was the person who handed Aaron his first professional loss. Aaron was able to befriend him, gaining a ton of racing knowledge and a mentor. He also bought his first race motor off of Glen—a 1000 triple improved.

As Aaron's racing career continued, so did the need to expand and improve. This required more help in the form of better racing equipment, a race crew, secondary



drivers, and of course, sponsors. The upgrade in equipment came in the form of a Firecat 700 Improver chassis, which was acquired from Mark Kulenkamp in 2007. Glen helped in the sponsorship department by making the introduction between Aaron and D&D Performance with Midstates Powersports showing support as a sponsor on the local front. The crew also came from more local sources. Randy Claude from Midstates Powersports acted as crew chief, helping to make as much speed as possible. Additional drivers, Todd Drake and Nick Leonard, joined Aaron behind the bars. Todd Bowman headed up the rest of the crew, which consisted of many people lending their time as they could to help the team succeed. Finally, all this could not work without Aaron's wife, Trish, and Todd's wife, Brook, who run the organization behind the scenes as the boys run around going crazy.

Moving up the ranks

With all of the infrastructure of a successful race team in place, Aaron moved up the ranks with a 2nd Place podium finish in 2008 on an improved Firecat 700. His first pro win came in 2009 at Hay Days on Todd Drake's Prostock SnoPro 800, and another win in 2010 in the Prostock class on a Prostock 700.

Aaron's racing career was off to a good start, but in the 2011-12 season, he had a spot of bad luck with a crash at a "Hill Drag" event where they raced up a ski slope. The team showed up with a 2011 Z1 Turbo improved to about 500 horsepower, which proved to have too much speed for the course. Aaron missed a turn at the top and ended up in the woods, slamming into several trees and getting carried out on a stretcher. Fortunately, Aaron was not badly injured and continued racing.

In 2012, the team acquired a Procross Chassis modified by Hypersports, which they covered in a black snake skin wrap and named it Black Mamba after the fastest snake in the world. Additionally, the team decided to change their name from Casler Racing to 515 Racing in an attempt to grow the team and add more drivers.

The Black Mamba carried Aaron to a 2014 Hay Days win in the Lakeracer/King of the Trail Turbo class, setting a world record time of 3.97 seconds to go 500 feet. During this world record run, Aaron experienced an average force of 2 Gs of acceleration over the entire run! The Black Mamba team continued on to win the Outlaw class in



2016 at Hay Days, after which, they changed over to a full Hypersports HRC race chassis and posted up Aaron's fastest time of 3.52 seconds in Seneca Falls, N.Y., in 2018. Aaron's fastest speed on record is 157.4 mph at the former Jack Race in Clear Lake.

Growing the sport

In regard to attracting spectators and participants to snowmobile racing, Aaron would love to see a reality snowmobile racing show like "Street Outlaws" on mainstream TV and to have snowmobile racing at a larger venue like the Iowa State Fairgrounds with funto-watch events like the hand-drop with six-wide drag races.

When asked about what snowmobilers can do to improve/preserve the sport, Aaron replies with some great reminders to get involved, go to meetings and help out with trail prep and club activities. He said we should also bring/invite new participants and new members on trips/to events/etc., even if they are stuck riding older sleds or are less experienced riders than the majority of your group. He said we should invite someone new on every trip, especially if you have the space. Most importantly, get your kids involved and start them riding and attending club events. His own children, Ellie and Cole, were racing at five years old.

Aaron and 515 Racing look forward to growing the sport of snowmobile racing and involve as many people as possible throughout the coming years.



Clean Snowmobile Challenge a Gametime Decision for ISU Team

The 2020 SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge (CSC) is scheduled for March 9-14 at the Keweenaw Research Center in Houghton, Mich. Whether a team from Iowa State University participates in its sixth consecutive competition remains tentative at best.

As of Feb. 6, Past Project Manager Ryan Greeley, a mechanical engineering senior at ISU, said the team was planning to "move forward" with another entry, "provided we are able to get our ECU tuned in time. If we are unable to get that done, a decision will be made in the days prior to leaving."

A funding scare earlier this year also "complicates" matters, Greeley confirmed. The ISU Clean Challenge Team is governed by the SAE Student Chapter at ISU. This body also oversees four other non-snowmobile teams and had purchased a "new trailer that it could not afford," Greeley explained.

Following an internal audit, the snowmobile team account was eventually "unfrozen," but now the team is required to maintain a "minimum balance," Greeley said. "At this point, it appears that we no longer have the funds to cover the remaining parts, materials and travel expenses needed to finish the snowmobile and get to Michigan."

Greeley said leadership within the CSC team at ISU continues to determine the "state of our funds" and the state of the sled's standalone ECU. "We do not want to compete without it working," Greeley said.

Meanwhile, the fundraising drive initiated by the Saylorville Dam Snowmobile Club in Region 7 last fall remains in effect. To date, only \$250 has been raised for the team through this challenge. The club has committed to match up \$500 in donations for the team at ISU.
