



milestone is passing for me. A bitter-Asweet moment, with feelings of accomplishment, feelings of achievement and a little bit of "I wish we would have been able to finish that!".

As I prepare to turn over the leadership of the ISSA to the new president to be elected in a few weeks, I find myself thinking a lot about what has gone well while I was ISSA president, and what is yet to be completed. We have come a long way in the past four years as I have made the priorities of the ISSA my priorities. Especially for the last two years, I have invested everything I have into the responsibilities of ISSA leadership. Different types of riders

Recent Camoplast research helped identify distinct segments among snowmobilers. Generally, snowmobile club members who also belong to a snowmobile association rack up more-than-average trail miles and routinely rush out to buy the latest snowmobile, snowmobile parts or acces-

Club and association members place considerably more importance on their snowmobile. They devote a lot of time to prepping their machine, which is always immaculate, and are very passionate about the sport. Alternatively, the "easy rider" looks for comfort above all else. This rider

is over the average snowmobiler age and doesn't keep abreast of new products and technology. The "no frills independent" isn't the first to rush out and buy the latest snowmobile or snowmobile parts. For them, snowmobiling is just one of the many winter pastimes they enjoy.

Understanding these segments, it becomes clear that the participants in organized snowmobiling. club and association members, are those who best support snowmobile **OEMs** and aftermarket suppliers. This reinforces the mantra: No associations = no clubs: no

clubs = no trails: no trails = no snowmobilers, no snowmobilers = no manufacturers.

Working for the common good

ISSA membership has not changed significantly while I have been in office. This is one of those "I wish I could have done more" areas. Overall, the ISSA does represent the majority of Iowa snowmobilers. Research tells us, as supported by the aforementioned Camoplast research, that some folks simply will not become club members or association members. Some are not joiners, some are rebels, some are lazy and some are unaware. I am always amazed when I talk with snowmobilers that think paid Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR workers build and groom snowmobile trails. There are a lot of folks who just cannot comprehend that there are people who would do all that work and not get paid for doing it.

That kind of goodwill and generosity are just not part of their DNA. It is in the makeup of snowmobile club members, however. Luckily, at least so far, there are enough with the right attitude and social consciences to work for the common good, donating their time and talents to support a sport they love and a cause they believe in.

Strategic partnerships

Legislatively, we have held our own and maybe even gained a little over the past four years. We have added the trail pass (IDNR) User Permit) which has added needed funding to the program; we have made it reasonable Continued on page 12

CRESCO—You might hear people say how they like to ride snowmobiles. Well, meet three guys from Cresco who don't "like" to ride. Roy Praska, Terry Thorne and Wayne Vokaty "love" to ride.

They aren't three young whipper-snappers who don't have anything better to do than ride sleds. Roy is 45 and works at Donaldson Co. in Cresco. Terry, 55, has his own painting business, and Wayne, 58, is also employed at Donaldson in Cresco. Last fall, they all bought new 2014 Ski-doo MXZs. Roy and Wayne bought MXZ TNT 600 E-Tecs and Terry got an MXZ 600 Sport.

Between the three of them, they rode a total of 14,007 miles. Yes, over 14,000 miles in one season. That wasn't a typo. All had over 4,000 miles each. Roy had 5,220 miles, Terry had 4,550 and Wayne had 4,237. So you can see what I mean when I say they really love to ride. Roy took three trips last season to Spooner, Wis., and Terry went with him twice.

Roy and Terry also took a backpacking trip from Cresco to Cornucopia, Wis., and back. That trip alone was 950 miles without any support vehicle and no troubles.

Wayne and his wife Darla—who also rode 3,550 miles on her 2013 Ski-doo GSX 600 E-Tec—went on two trips. They went for three and a half days to the U.P. of Michigan and later three days to Baxter, Minn. They put a total of 1,300 miles on with those two trips. The rest of the miles that these guys put on were all riding around Cresco and the surrounding area.

Every club has its own rivalry about who makes the best sleds, but as far as these guys are concerned, they think all brands are good or they would be out of business. Nonetheless, these guys are quick to point out that they rode all those miles and none of them had to take their sleds in for any service work the whole season. Curt Flack Memorial Grass Drags Nov. 22 near Jefferson

Raccoon Valley Snow Chasers, Region 7

JEFFERSON—The Raccoon Valley Snow Chasers (RVSC) snowmobile club will host its sixth annual Curt Flack Memorial grass drag races on Saturday, Nov. 22. This year's race has been significantly expanded into an all-day event to also include ATV and motorcycle races. A popular band will perform under a big tent on the grounds Saturday evening following the races.

The events will take place at the Flack river farm, now called River Farm Recreation, five miles west of Jefferson—just south of Highway 30 and just west of county road P14. Signs will be posted on nearby roads leading to the event.

RVSC safety director Craig Flack said the usual snowmobile racing format will take place this year, including local celebrity Bill Labath calling the races. However, this year will see additional timed "horseshoe" racing for dirt-bike motorcycles and ATVs—also called four wheelers and side-by-sides.



Equipment update, operator reception, recertification planned for convention weekend

The groomer carousel continues to spin in Iowa as the ISSA and the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) reap the benefits of the new snowmobile user permit program and take advantage of existing federal fuel tax dollars.

More than 19,000 snowmobilers have purchased the required \$15 trail fee in each of the last two seasons, raising approximately \$285,000 in additional funding annually for the IDNR's snowmobile program coffers.

These funds are then paired up with matching grant money from the Recreational Trails Program to puchase equipment and update the state's aging groomer fleet. By this winter, nearly a third of snowmobile clubs in Iowa will benefit from this boon.

"We're trying to get a lot of needs taken care of in a short amount of time," ISSA President Jim Willey said in August. "We've been working on this for a long time, and this is what has been approved to happen. How fast it all takes place is the next question."

"We are trying to accomplish a lot and make a lot of people happy," added Past ISSA President Terry Durby, a member of the joint ISSA/IDNR Review and Selection Committee which pores over the trail grant applications each summer.



As approved by the committee on Aug. 23, 20 of the state's 64 clubs are slated for new or updated grooming equipment. Only five clubs which requested new iron were not approved, and the remaining 39 clubs did not ask for any changes. The expenditures are well in excess of \$1 million.

Scheduled to receive or already in possession of new groomers include the following clubs: Clay County Sno Broncs in Region 1, Kossuth County Drift Skippers in Region 2, Lakota Sno-Eagles and Hancock County Snowmobile Association in Region 3 and the Snowdrifters in Region 12.

The Driftrunners in Region 5 has also been approved to keep the Pisten Bully they had on loan last winter, and the match requests for new groomers for the Sno-Pak in Region 1 and the Worth County Fencestretchers in Region 4 have also been okayed.

Domino effect

As this new equipment finds their new homes, the clubs' existing groomers have been or will be relocated to other clubs in need around the state in need. For example, the Driftrunners' Prinoth is heading to fellow Region 5 club Trails Unlimited, and Trails Unlimited's 2007 Sur Trac is heading south to the Jasper County Ditch Bangers.

Jasper County in Region 8 is one of three clubs in Iowa to receive their first-ever grooming equipment this season. Another, according to the committee's spreadsheet, is the Snowmobilers of Jackson County in Region 9.

The third is the Southeast Iowa Ridgeblasters in Region 12, but their request is a bit unusual. This club will be outfitted with a sideby-side tracked utility vehicle with a smaller drag to accommodate their narrower trails.

Willey described this placement as "an experiment" that may end up being a model for other clubs in similar situations. The IDNR is currently soliciting bids from dealers for this new direction in grooming equipment.

"This club specifically asked for a smaller unit," Willey explained. "This will be the first type of groomer that is a tracked UTV in Iowa. If it works on smaller trails, it stands to be a much less costly system than what we have been doing."

To become eligible for a new groomer, a club must request it in writing on their trail grant application in May. While most of the decisions have created a domino effect throughout Iowa, not all of the awards involved major purchases. Several clubs are also getting new or different drags, and in marginal snow areas, clubs are asking for mowing equipment.

Groomer topics at convention

The groomer placement and selection criteria are historically hot topics at the state snowmobile convention each November. The five clubs which did not get what they wanted are sure to be heard from this fall, but plans are in place to satisfy their needs in 2015.

This year's open forum with the Review and Selection Committee at convention is planned for late Saturday morning, Nov. 22, at the Grand Harbor Resort in Dubuque. The adjacent Grand River Center will also have new groomers on display during the ISSA's Snow Show, and later that afternoon, a groomer reception is planned for all certified operators in the state.

Sunday morning will feature groomer operator training for both new and existing operators in need of recertification. As of last July, all club members operating state-owned groomers in Iowa need to carry a current card.

Since the requirement began in 2005, 1,100 volunteers have completed this training in Iowa, but only half were recertified by last summer's deadline. In fact, one club in Iowa does not have a member currently certified to operate its machine.

Recertification is now required every three years, and just because a member has operated a groomer for the past 30 years, Willey said, "doesn't mean that should be good enough.

Technology and techniques have changed, making this training mandatory.

"Bottom line is we want to make sure these volunteers have the opportunity to get recertified," he continued. "We don't want anybody out there without a current license so make plans to come to Dubuque convention weekend to get your training done."

Clubs are being cautioned to restrict non-certified club members from operating the six-figure machines. As they have in the past, IDNR conservation officers will be doing spot checks this winter to ensure operator compliance.

"Make sure everyone in your club knows that if they don't have a current operator certificate, they can get a ticket," Willey said. "Having an unlicensed groomer operator in your machine is just like smoking or drinking in it. Don't do it. It's all the same. The IDNR will pull it."

"The IDNR has stated to us that if a guy is not certified and is operating that groomer, then you are endangering that groomer to the club," ISSA Groomer Operator Training Coordinator Chris Willey further clarified.

"We've never had to pull a unit, and we never want to do it," Jim Willey said.

Operator cards

Chris Willey recommends each club keep a copy of their operators cards with their logbooks in the groomer. For those club members who have completed the training but do not have their current certificates, he hopes to have that mess straightened out by convention weekend.

"Last year, a large batch of cards for current operators was made and sent out. However, some cards didn't get to the correct clubs and/or operators," he said. "If your club has operators who have taken a class and not received an operator card, please let me know." Continued on page 11



Special Ride for Javin last March

SPENCER—As the leaves are falling and we all prepare for the approaching winter, I reflect back to this past winter and one of the last rides we put in the memory column. We just celebrated October as Spina Bifida Awareness Month so this story seems fitting.

This past March, one of our own from the Clay County Sno Broncs had an opportunity to do something fun with a youngster from Spencer. Mitchell Sebastian spends most of his winter racing cross-country with the Yamaha team on the Cor Powersports series, but on this given weekend, the racing season was over and there was just enough snow left in northwest Iowa to do something cool.

We loaded up the race sled and met up with a young man by the name of

Javin Williamson Smith and his family. Javin was found to have Spina Bifida during a routine ultrasound at 33 weeks. Many tests were done to see if there were any other problems associated with the condition.

On Sept. 9, 2009, Javin was born in Sioux Falls, S.D. Surgery followed to repair his spinal cord. Another surgery followed to install a shunt to remove excess fluid from his brain. The following weeks were met with ups and downs, including

infections and more surgeries. Javin was awarded the "Patient of the Month" in October of 2009, becoming the youngest patient to receive this award from the hospital.

After getting home and settling in, the work began. Physical therapy got started with the doctors still unsure if Javin would even be able to walk. He is a very determined little guy. At age 3,

Javin continued with physical and speech therapy. He also received his first set of leg braces and a walker.

Javin has just turned five. He wears his braces but does not need a walker anymore. He goes to school full time and does everything a five-year-old boy likes to do: He walks, runs and picks on his sister.

On our day this past March, Javin showed us how much he enjoys the great outdoors from the seat of a snowmobile. We rode the ditches on Highway 18 East between Spencer and Ruthven, and in the following

days, all he could talk about was how much fun he had riding.

Javin may have Spina Bifida, but it does not have him. His smile stretches a country mile, and we are already making plans for this year's ride. Thank you to his family for helping arrange the ride and thank you Mitchell Sebastian for making it extra special with a true "hotrod" race sled for Javin.

Here's to a great fall and hopes of a great winter from Javin and the Clay County Sno Brones to all of you fellow sledders.

to register vintage snowmobiles in Iowa; and we have made it possible for families to ride their sleds on state trails together, no matter how young some of those family members are.

We have strengthened the ISSA partnership with the DNR through ISSA acceptance of responsibilities and cooperation in administering programs, as evidenced by the groomer training and certification program administered by Chris Willey and the youth safety education program administered by Tyler Willey. It is not an accident that these important partnerships were entrusted to ISSA members who I have great confidence in, and possibly influence

Ensuring that the programs were successful was critical to the success of the programs and partnerships, and they were a lot of work. I admittedly leaned on my boys to make the commitments to invest their time in these partnerships which have strengthened the bonds of the DNR and ISSA, and I thank them for their willingness to accept these responsibilities. In like manner, I also thank each and every individual who stepped up when I asked, especially the committee chairpersons who are so vital to the success of the ISSA and the Iowa snowmobile program.

Not to be ignored are the professionals we work with in the IDNR. From Chuck Gipp and Brian Trautman, who handle the political issues with skill and expertise, to our own David Downing, Rhonda Fowler and the folks they work with at the Wallace building to make the snowmobile program machine run. David's legacy and commitment to Iowa snowmobilers is legendary. Rhonda is the glue that holds the program together, working to elevate the education programs and club support to produce a state program that we all can be proud of.



Giving credit when due

The ISSA region directors and assistants are the lifeblood of the ISSA. Charged with the responsibility to represent the clubs of their regions and to ensure communication between the ISSA and the clubs, they are critical to the mission and success of the ISSA. The ISSA officers like myself are elected by the board to serve for a time, but cannot accomplish anything without the hard work and support of the directors and assistants.

The ISSA past presidents are the most involved group of former leaders I have encountered in any organization I have been involved with. The experience and expertise these individuals bring to the organization are a valuable resource. I look forward to joining their ranks, not to be in charge, but to assist.

Mostly, however, credit must be given to the clubs. The mission of the ISSA is to support the clubs, to identify their needs and address them, because without the clubs, there is no program. In recent years, we have made great strides in equipping clubs, updating older equipment for the clubs with the most demanding needs and moving older equipment to areas where it will be useful.

This year three clubs will get their first grooming equipment in the areas of Jackson County, Jasper County and Henry County. We have improved the average age of the fleet dramatically, and we are grooming more miles of trail each winter than ever before, now offering 8,800 miles of snowmobiling opportunities. In a study of the past seven years of log sheets it shows that when a club receives a new groomer, their average grooming miles increase from 242 to 847 miles per year, a 350 percent increase.

Spending time with club members

One of the benefits of being ISSA president is the opportunity to spend time with clubs all over the state and to see how clubs in different areas do things. This was repeatedly demonstrated to First Lady Becky and me as we visited the Iowa snowmobile clubs from the east coast of Iowa at the Mississippi to the west coast on the Missouri.

Getting to know the clubs has demonstrated that there are many ways to do the same things, and while it would certainly not be my place to say any of the ways of accomplishing the challenge of building and maintaining a Continued on page 20

Grass drags



"River Farm Recreation is excited to again host this year's grass drags," said Flack. "We plan on having a big bonfire Saturday evening, along with a very popular rockabilly band called the Barrel House Rockets performing inside a big tent." (MNDNR).

As part of this working vacation, we were able to squeeze in some trail riding, and it didn't take long to realize we were in snowmobile country. Besides being the then-location of the ISHOF, the Grand Rapids area also featured several active snowmobile clubs—some with their own clubhouses—including the Itasca Driftskippers and the Swampsiders.

It was all very impressive to this ditchbanger from Iowa. Making the weekend especially memorable was my one and only meeting and interview with Edgar Hetteen, the Grandfather of Snowmobiling, at the ISHOF ceremony. Founder of both Polaris and Arctic Cat, Hetteen was a charter inductee of the ISHOF and lived in Grand Rapids up until his death in 2011.

Eight winters would pass before I allowed myself the opportunity to return to this area. I consistently resisted the temptation to go back by trying new areas to ride, including a backpack trip to Hayward, Wis., and three treks across the state of Iowa. The ample snowfall in Iowa between 2006 and 2011 also helped to keep me closer to home.

When that local stretch of above-average riding conditions ended abruptly during the 2011-12 season, the need to begin trailering to outside destinations resumed. First there was a trip to the Cable, Wis., area in March of 2012, and then I persuaded the other guys all of whom had a strong penchant for northern Wisconsin—to take my word for it and visit Grand Rapids in February of 2013.

Slippery Start to the Week

In two separate units, we arrived in Itasca County on Monday, Feb. 11. What should have taken roughly five hours to get there burned up three additional hours as a three-day storm system was making its way from Nebraska to northern Michigan. Slowing us

down to a crawl on I-35, freezing rain changed to blinding snow during the first half of the commute.

Once we reached the top side of the cities, visibility improved, and we were able to make up some ground. However, the extra trail time created by our early start that morning had been wasted on the slippery roads. We were still able to get some riding in that night but were limited to only 80 miles, with most of that time spent getting re-acclimated to the area.

While impeding our travel north the previous day, the storm system did blanket the region with a nice covering of snow, and we were able to get out early Tuesday morning and make some of the first tracks out on the trails. The beauty of mid-week riding is to avoid the trail pressure from the weekend, and on this day, we pretty much had the trails to ourselves.

From Grand Rapids, we ventured north on the well-known Taconite Trail, a 165-mile, multi-purpose path which starts in Grand Rapids and ends in Ely. The trail's name reflects the area's iron ore industry, and early on in the ride, you pass by remnants of its mining past. This is also where we picked up our first groomer sighting, always a good sign for the start of any trip.

Otherwise known as Corridor Trail 88, we followed the Taconite to the intersection with the Herb Brandstrom Trail (Corridor Trail 84). At this point, the Brandstrom Trail led us to the Scenic Pines Bar and Grill for our first gas stop and rest break. Along the way, we passed by the Swampsiders clubhouse on County Road 52 and stopped for a picture with its iconic sign and vintage sled perched atop.

Borrowing its name from some of the local soil conditions, the Swampsiders started in 1978 when a group of local residents felt the need to develop a local trail system. They incorporated some of the trap-line trails established by Brandstrom, one of the area's earliest settlers, and hence named the 47-mile stretch after him.

After lunch, we continued on Corridor 84 before eventually looping over west and south to the Suomi Trail. Here, the riding was slowed by the twisting and turning of these local, wooded trails, and we began to miss the interstate quality and gentle curves of the Taconite Trail.

Approaching 170 miles for the day, we eventually made it to the Clearwater Trail, and from there it was only a short jaunt back onto the Taconite. Before long, we were back in Grand Rapids for a late supper at the Timberlake Lodge. It was during dinner that my obsession with International Falls surfaced again, and I pushed for an overnight run in that direction for the next day.

Unusual Accommodations

The group conceded, and by 7 a.m. Wednesday morning, we were gassed up and back on the trail. The first leg of the journey started out pretty much the same way as the previous day. However, this time we continued north on the Brandstrom Trail through George Washington State Forest.

At Scenic State Park, the Brandstrom trail ended, and the

Bigfork Lions trail commenced, taking us to the Effie Connection on the Marcell trail system. Just as the Brandstrom Trail had done earlier in the day, all of these local trails combined to make up the northwest segment of Corridor 84, making it easy to stay on course.

After an extended dinner break and refueling in Bigfork, we were back in the saddle, heading north on the Effie trail in the early afternoon. By now, we were close to riding ourselves off the Itasca County snowmobile trail map and inching our way closer to Corridor 37, the railroad grade which would lead us right into International Falls.

Also called the Blue Ox Trail, this 107-mile corridor starts at Bemidji State Park on the south and ends at International Falls. Its name derives from the folklore legend of lumberjack Paul Bunyan and his blue ox, Babe. Bemidji is one of six cities in the U.S. which claim to be the birthplace of Paul Bunyan and even boasts a largerthan-life statue of the flannel-shirted man and his ox there.

Unfortunately, our merger with the Blue Ox trail would be significantly delayed as we were sidelined by a breakdown in the woods of the Pine Island State Forest. After trailside troubleshooting to get the sled operating better, it was determined the late model machine had dropped a cylinder, and we would have to limp it to the next town. By now, we had run out of daylight, and any chance of making it to International Falls this night was severely diminished.

We eventually made it to Corrirdor 37 and landed in Big Falls shortly thereafter, sharing our misfortune with anyone who would listen at the community-owned bar and grill. A few patrons offered to take the sled and its rider back to Grand Rapids for the night, while another suggested we stay with a local outfitter who rented rooms above his family's 1912 hardware store.

With International Falls another 90 minutes away and without any other hotel reservations in front of us, we decided we had better not push our luck and decided to stay in Big Falls for the evening, bedding down at Rivers North Outfitters. A bed-and-breakfast it was not, but the rooms did pass for clean and comfortable...and warm.

Looping back east

The next morning was Valentine's Day, and waking up to four other guys above a 100-year-old hardware store was far from romantic. There was no breakfast in bed, and if you wanted coffee, you got up and made it yourself. After a quick shower and some toast for breakfast, we were ready to improve on yesterday's mileage total of just 129.

Our first order of business for the day was to line up transportation to haul the disabled sled back to Grand Rapids. On the third attempt, we finally bribed a wrecker service to come up to Big





Falls and rescue man and machine. Upon his return, a spare sled awaited him at the hotel, and we agreed to rendezvous with him back at Scenic Pines later that evening.

Now down to four, our two-day backpack trip continued north on the Blue Ox trail toward International Falls. About three miles south of town, we hooked up with the Arrowhead Trail and headed east and eventually south toward Ash River. Living up to the area's nickname, the mercury read 10 below this morning, and it was a cold ride through the Koochiching State Forest.

Along the way, we encountered some MNDNR officers performing spot checks for proper trail permits, but they left us alone. We eventually reached the Bill Morgan Trail intersection and headed down to Elephant Continued on page 20

- 1. No snowmobile operation between the hours of 10 p.m. to 8 a.m. and the speed limit on city streets is 10 mph.
- 2. There is a new pedestrian bridge across the Cedar River. If there is obvious indication that snowmobiles have used that bridge, the city council intends to eliminate all snowmobile usage in the city.
- 3. Be sure to drive only on the street surface, not on sidewalks or the "parking" area between the street and sidewalks.

I realize that this is a bunch of regulations, but it is important, especially to the residents who ride from home to the trail system.

We are making plans to attend the ISSA Convention Nov. 21-23 at the Grand Harbor Resort and Waterpark in Dubuque. Be sure to stop by and check out our table at the Snowmobile Iowa club showcase at the convention.

Lake for lunch at Melgeorge's. We fueled up here as well and returned to the Arrowhead by early afternoon.

By our calculations, we had covered at least 100 miles on the Arrowhead to this point. We could have continued east on this Corridor 94 for another 35 miles toward Tower to pick up the Taconite for an elongated loop back to Grand Rapids, but we had a dinner date to keep and decided to drop down through Orr and Cook to save some time.

After following a Cook area trail out of town, we eventually picked up the Tim Corey Trail, the Bear Lake Trail and parts of the Taconite before reconnecting with the Herb Brandstrom trail at dusk. It wouldn't be long before we would be enjoying our prime rib dinner at Scenic Pines that night.

After dinner, we began visiting with some of the locals who had ridden their sleds in for the special occasion. One of them ended up being Elmer Cone and his family. Ironically enough, I had met Cone during my only other visit to the area in 2005. Instrumental in establishing many of the trails in the Grand Rapids area, Cone founded the ISHOF in 1984 and emceed the ceremony during Carmichael's induction.

The chance encounter with the local legend definitely made for a small world that evening, and I must admit it was fun listening to Cone—himself a 2007 Hall of Fame inductee—describe the area's trail system's evolution from narrow, brush-filled paths to doublewide snowmobile highways. It was also inspiring to see him ride his snowmobile up from nearby Bovey at his age, complete with his vintage gear and Hall of Fame jacket.

Not to keep his family waiting, we ended the conversation with a handshake, and despite their head start, it didn't take us long to catch up to them out on the trail. They graciously let us by, and we were back in the hotel in Grand Rapids by 9 p.m. Making up for the previous day's delay, we finished Day Four with 234 miles.

Arm-Twisting Pays Off

For three of us, Friday would be our last day to ride in the area. Having ventured north on the Taconite the previous four days, we were itching to try out some new territory so off to the west we went with Bemidji loosely nailed down as our turnaround point. After breakfast in Cohasset, we continued along the Bushwacker

great snowmobile club are wrong or even less effective, we have noticed some particularly good examples of clubs doing things

As most of the southern Iowa snowmobile clubs will admit, the further south you go in Iowa, the less confident they can be about having rideable snow from October to April. Southern Iowa clubs always maintain hope for that banner year, but realistically are happy with amounts of snow that make the northern tier of counties scoff at as a "dusting." Nonetheless, these clubs faithfully meet, plan and execute the business of snowmobiling, and I would go so far as suggest that it takes as much time to plan and map, negotiate with landowners, build, sign and maintain a southern Iowa trail as it does a northern Iowa trail, but with significantly less expectation for the number of days the trail will be rideable.

Those who maintain the vigil of trail building year in and year out, with as many bad snow years as good, (or even more bad than good) are a special breed of snowmobilers, and my hat comes off to you.

This does certainly not diminish the efforts of those northern Iowa areas that see more good snow years than bad, and we all Trail toward Lake Winnibigoshish and then followed the Winnie Trail south toward Federal Dam and Corridor 80.

By the time we finished eating and fueling, the clock read 3 p.m. so any thought of continuing on west to Bemidji disappeared. Instead, we turned back east on Corridor 80 and followed this railtrail to Hill City, located 18 miles south of Grand Rapids. Thanks to this quick ride, we made it to Hill City before nightfall and spent a longer than normal warm-up break there.

From Hill City, Corridor 41 led us back north past the Driftskippers clubhouse and the Wendigo Lodge before landing us on the hotel spur back into Grand Rapids. Mileage for this day exceeded 190 miles, so had we gone on to Bemidji, we would have approached 300 miles. Overall the five-day escapade ended with 803 miles on the odometer.

So impressed with the trail system that two guys stayed back and put on another 600 miles over the next three days before returning to Iowa. One even brought his wife back for a couple of days of uncongested riding. I guess my arm-twisting paid off.



know that when the snow is poor in Iowa City, Des Moines or Sioux City, there will be a lot more sleds on the trails at Waterloo, Okoboji and Decorah. The only advantage I can see for the southern Iowa clubs is that their sign posts do not have to be as tall.

I cannot end this message without giving credit to the one person that I absolutely could not have completed this challenge without—my First Lady of Iowa Snowmobiling for the past two years, my wife Becky. Becky has attended every meeting, driven when I could not; kept notes and promises I would have missed, and made the commitments and experience much more enjoyable. As my snowmobiling and life partner since 1977, I could not have done this without her. Thank you, Becky.

So there you have it, folks. I have enjoyed meeting you, working with you, fighting for you and, in some cases, fighting with you—all in the name of furthering snowmobiling in Iowa. I love Iowa, and I love Iowa snowmobiling. I will go other places to ride, further north, out west and out east, but most of my miles will be on these Iowa trails made possible by the pure passion of Iowastubborn snowmobilers who get itchy this time of year, wanting to see the crops get out and the trails go in. Looking forward to those first flakes giving way to swirling white, and the first miles of the season on a perfect white and blue day or a star studded moonlit night of white. This is Iowa snowmobiling. It is what we do.


