




Vice President's Message

Don't Be Afraid to Hand the Keys Over to the Next Generation

When I became a father in 2002, I knew the day would come that my daughter would ask me the question that every dad is scared to hear. "Dad, can I have the keys to your truck?" Now, my daughter, Isabelle, isn't quite old enough yet to take off with the truck down the road, but I have heard this question as she helps around the Willey Homestead and at her grandparent's place. It's a scary thought to think about one of the things most precious to you is now out of your control...not to mention your child is out there too.

As I have worked with snowmobile clubs across the state, I often hear about a similar situation happening. I get asked by newer members:

"How can we get the older guys in the club to let us run the groomer?"

"How can we get the older members to understand why we need to change the way we do fundraisers?"

"How do I keep this guy from running the groomer? He's going to tear it apart."

Usually, it comes down to both sides finding some common ground and understanding. I will be honest. I've been on both sides of these situations. Both sides have to be open-minded and work togeth-

er for the good of the club and the snowmobilers they serve.

When I first started being involved in my club, I wanted to jump right in. I had tons of ideas and changes to make, and my biggest concern was getting in that groomer. There was apprehension the older guys—some

who had run the groomer for years, some since it was new—to let this young throttle jockey kid take off unsupervised with their "baby."

Or to suggest a Poker Run as a fundraiser. I felt discouraged as I was a new member ready to make the club bigger,



better and help out. I was excited to get out there and these guys seemed like they didn't want me to. I kept at it, went out helped mark trails, rode with other operators and learned and gained knowledge on how the club did things.

At the same time, I demonstrated that I knew what I was doing, and they let me get out there on my own, eventually becoming vice president and grooming coordinator for the club. Over the years I have found myself going from a new member to one of the older members and becoming one of the apprehensive about a new member or operator and their ideas or ability.

It was on a cold January night talking with Todd Mangold—the guy that taught me a lot when I started grooming-as we made our way across a long field, grooming the trail. I was telling him my worries about the new groomer and operators running it. He said he felt the same way but also reminded me that when I started, there were those who felt the same way about me. It made me realize I needed to be a little more open minded.

We too often get set in our ways and don't look at doing something different until someone comes along and questions it or has a new idea. I want snowmobilers new and old to think about this as it comes up in your clubs. Look at all aspects of the club: trail signing, building new trail or changing trails, fundraisers, grant applications, officers, etc. Look at both sides and work together.

To the new members, you need to bring your ideas and enthusiasm to club meetings and events. But remember and respect that the older members in the club have been at this awhile and know what has to be done. Some things have to be done a certain way for a reason. Learn from them, help out and offer ideas as you think of them.

To the older members who have been in the club a while, be open to new ideas, listen to them and work with new members. Teach the newer members how and why things are done the way they are. Give them the knowledge to keep the club going and maybe even growing.

When both groups work together, the club grows and the sport becomes more enjoyable for everyone. So I guess I'm asking the guys and gals that have been doing this awhile to not be afraid to hand over the keys to the club or the groomer to the newer members and let them see what they can do. Be there to guide them when it's needed. Enjoy some free time to ride the trails.

It's the same way I need to be when April rolls around, and Izzy has that driver's permit in her hand and she asks me for the keys to my truck. I will let her take it out for a drive with me there to guide her but trusting that she knows what she's doing from what I've taught her.

Snow Show Cancelled at Last Minute due to Vendor Withdrawal

The second annual ISSA Snow Show planned for the last weekend in October at the Grand River Center in Dubuque was cancelled at the last minute due to unexpected vendor withdrawal and anticipated low attendance related to ongoing field work in Iowa.

"Many of our vendors were unable to make the show as it was being held a month earlier than last year," Snow Show Chair Andrea Willey explained in announcing the cancellation Oct. 22. "Between harvest still going strong, many deciding to cut back on attending shows such as this as well as the timing not working out, our vendor attendance was going to be down considerably."

Planned for Oct. 24-25, the ISSA had decided on a stand-alone show this year based off the success of last year's event, which was held a month later in conjunction with the ISSA's annual convention in Dubuque. Officials said the decision to cancel this year's event was "not easy," and the ISSA apologizes for any inconvenience this may have caused.

"It's unfortunate," ISSA Vice President

Chris Willey said. "We are definitely going to have to re-evaluate the timing of this event if we decide to do it again next year. Maybe a show doesn't work without having it the same weekend as convention. I'm sure last winter's poor snow season contributed to this as well."

"This past week alone, we have had four vendors back out of their commitments to attend, blaming family illnesses, lack of employees, etc. For whatever reason, it was not going to work for them anymore," Andrea Willey said. "After this, we decided to cancel the show. We did not want to risk upsetting those who have committed by not giving them the best possible outcome with a good show and would like to continue having a good relationship with them in the future."

Vendors who had registered for the event were contacted by show organizers with the bad news, and the ISSA was looking to negotiate a cancellation fee with the host facility, Chris Willey said.

The ISSA Board of Directors meeting slated for that same weekend was also cancelled due to the lack of a quorum.

Remember to Bring Club Challenge

While they were not able to secure any fuel tax reimbursement for snowmobilers

with the state's gas tax hike, they did successfully lobby for the passage of a bill which preserved snowmobile trail access near interstates and divided highways.

Sponsored by Sen. Dick Dearden (D-Des Moines) and signed by Gov. Terry Branstad in April, Senate File 218 restored the ability of snowmobiles to cross interstates and divided highways on bridges and overpasses.

"This was an important bill that clarifies that snowmobiles can operate on rightof-ways and use bridges to cross primary roads," Heller said in his weekly in-session update to the ISSA. "It also sends a message that snowmobiles have a right to operate on trails in Iowa."

The language clarification stems from a situation in Region 9, where a disgruntled homeowner challenged the legality of snowmobilers crossing primary highways. The new law became effective July 1.

Another bill of interest to ISSA members that gained some traction last session was a proposal to allow snowmobilers to purchase specialty license plates for their personal vehicles. Once passed, the bill (House File 617) would create special vehicle registration plates with ISSA decals.

According to Heller, the bill cleared the House but remains in committee in the Senate in Des Moines, thus making it eligible for consideration when the Legislature convenes this January.

"It was a long but productive session for ISSA members," Heller said, recapping the 2015 legislative calendar. "It has been our pleasure to represent you at the Capitol. It is important to note our bill on trail access was one of the very few bills coming out of the Natural Resources Committee to make it to the Governor this year."

The need for a full-time lobbyist for the ISSA dates back to May of 2002, when the Iowa Legislature de-appropriated nearly \$1 million in snowmobile registration fees. The funds were eventually reimbursed, thanks to the hard work of the lobbyists and the ISSA's Emergency Funding Committee which oversees them.

Heller and Feltner began representing the ISSA in November of 2003 for \$17,500 per year. Their current contract costs the association \$23,000 annually.

To help offset that expense, the ISSA relies on its Club Challenge fundraising program. Here, member-clubs are encouraged to donate to the effort, and as tallied below, more than \$6,500 was collected in 2015, down slightly from 2014's total of \$7,253.

The fundraising year renews each November at convention, and clubs are encouraged to bring their donations to Storm Lake later this month.

"I hope you will walk out of the room realizing you can do anything in life you set your mind to,'

she said in an interview posted on her website. "When you face your fears, you gain strength and courage. Don't let your past mistakes define your future. Nobody can go back and make a new beginning, but anyone can start today and make a new end."

Gaining her celebrity on television, Hoffman was the last remaining member of the Espada Tribe and the last woman standing on Season 21 of the CBS reality show Survivor Nicaragua. Through that experience in 2010, and others throughout her life, she was inspired to share her message of positivity, determination and confidence with business leaders, teachers and students.

ISSA President Merv Hoermann, who serves as chair of the 2015 ISSA Convention Planning Committee, first met Hoffman in June at a Western Iowa Tourism region meeting at LeMars. Hoermann represents the ISSA on that board and was impressed by Hoffman's message.

"At our conventions, we always seem to want to bring in someone related to snowmobiling to speak," Hoermann said. "This year, I thought we would shake things up a bit and invite someone with a different perspective, someone who can inspire and motivate us as an organization."

Most of Hoffman's experience stems from her appearance on Survivor. After sending in one application, one audition DVD and having one casting call, she made the show for Season 21. Little did she know, this was only the beginning of her journey. Hoffman feels that what she learned from being on the reality show, she has been able to apply to the real world of survival.

Bradfield Returns to Iowa

Hoffman won't be the only out-of-state convention guest returning to Iowa this month. Bill Bradfield of Cadillac, Mich., is also making the trip to Storm Lake to share his stories with MichCanSka Adventures, an extreme snowmobile club benefitting diabetes research. His seminar can be heard at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

Bradfield founded his organization in 2008 and first appeared in Iowa at the 2010 International Snowmobile Congress in Coralville to share the story of their inaugural snowmobile ride from Michigan to Alaska in February of 2010. Since then, club members have participated in trips across Ontario, around Lake Superior and to the Gaspe Peninsula in Quebec.

Their most recent adventure was last February's Worldwide Tour, which included snowmobile adventures across Scandinavia


and Russia. That trip began in Cadillac and participants spent three days in Michigan and another three in Ontario before nine members boarded a plane for Norway Feb. 14.

Over the next six days, club members were guided through Norway, Sweden and Finland on snowmobiles. The group was then escorted to the Russian border and began a four-day ride to the city of Murmansk. They then took a flight to St. Petersburg for the grand finale and banquet. Throughout the journey, riders were equipped with satellite tracking devices.

The 2015 ride was the club's most ambitious adventure since 2010, when the team crossed five states, five provinces and four time zones from Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., to Tot, Alaska. Averaging close to 200 miles a day, the group logged 4,000 miles in 25 days on their sleds.

That event was billed as the "Iditarod of Snowmobiling" and was responsible for giving the club its name as the convoy of snow machines crossed Mich(igan), Can(ada) and Ala(Ska). Featuring 54 participants, that event raised \$102,000 for diabetes research in America and Canada.

Bradfield is heavily involved with the Diabetes Research Institute. As a Vietnam Vet, Bradfield was diagnosed with Type 2 diabetes because of his exposure to Agent Orange during the war. He had participated in other fundraisers for diabetes research and felt a long-distance snowmobile ride could raise significant funds for the effort.

"We are firm believers that if you are going to do a really big snowmobile run, you should do it for a worthy cause because it really puts the snowmobile community in the public eye and makes that image shine," he explained at the 2010 ISC.

Bradfield said his organization's efforts "get us one step closer to finding a cure" for diabetes. He said his fellow club members are committed to reaching a goal of a "diabetes-free tomorrow." "The mission of our partnerships is to prevent and cure diabetes and to improve the lives of all people affected by the disease," he

Take Advantage of Training Opportunities

Another seminar planned for convention weekend not previously profiled in this magazine is the session on GPS mapping and tracking through smartphones. Hoermann said he met a service provider at Hay Days this year and thought their product would be of benefit to Iowa snowmobilers.


"How do we know where are out on the trail? What are you going to do if you get injured, especially in Iowa where we don't have real good ways of knowing where you are out on the trail," he said. "I think you should come to convention on see how GPS tracking can enhance your riding experience."

ISSA members are also encouraged to stay for the training seminars planned by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources Sunday morning. Those offerings include groomer operator certification and recertification as well as youth safety instructor training. Please email IDNR Snowmobile Education Coordinator Rhonda Fowler at Rhonda.Fowler@dnr.iowa.gov if you are planning to attend any one of these IDNR sessions.

Please note convention weekend is the first opportunity this season that volunteers can receive or renew their groomer cards. For more than 10 years now, club members who operate state-owned grooming equipment are required to complete operator training. Certificates are currently good for three years, and a proposal is on the table to stretch that requirement to five years.

"Hopefully those who are close by in Region 1 will be able to show up for this required training," Hoermann said.

Across Iowa, approximately 600 club members are certified to operate state-owned grooming equipment. That number is down about half since the IDNR began mandating recertification every three years. The ISSA and IDNR are aware some operators have





yet to receive their groomer cards from past training sessions and are working to rectify the situation.

"What we are going to have to do is reconcile the list of members who have been trained and re-issue cards as needed," explained ISSA Vice President and Operator Training Coordinator Chris Willey said. "We have an up-to-date list and need to go with it."

After convention, Willey said additional groomer operator training opportunities will be planned across the state. For those areas which have received tracked utility vehicles instead of traditional grooming equipment, special classes will be arranged for them as well.

"People are starting to think about getting certified again, so we will have more classes planned as the season gets closer, but for now, the best opportunity for recertifications will be convention weekend," Willey said.


In addition to the groomer training, Hoermann hopes ISSA members will take advantage of the youth instructor training at convention and thereby increase the number of traditional snowmobile safety courses offered across Iowa. While recognizing the convenience of the online courses, Hoermann feels club members will see and appreciate the value of hands-on training for the next generation of snowmobilers.

"There are a number of clubs who are not doing the youth safety training any more, and that's unfortunate," Hoermann said. "I would like to see us get back to that."

The ISSA convention is planned for Nov. 20-22 at King's Pointe Resort, Storm Lake, at 1520 East Lakeshore Drive. Rooms are available under the ISSA rate of \$109+ per night. To reserve a room, contact the hotel at (866) 552-5960. Convention registration costs \$65.



allowed us to leave our tow vehicle in their parking lot for our four-day tour of the U.P.

We arrived at The Timbers Resort just shy of nightfall on Sunday, March 1. For Gerdes, who had been cooped up in a pickup for the better part of 10 hours, there wasn't much on

the agenda that night except for a quick ride down the lake's west shore for a late dinner at Fish Tales Resort. Before returning to the cabin, we did take the time to fuel up our sleds in town and secure our Michigan trail

stickers for the following day's ride.

The next morning came early, and we were both restless at daybreak. I guess that's another sign of time catching up to you. It wasn't long before we were both checked out of the cabin and on our sleds for the first leg of the journey. Following breakfast and a quick stop by The Timbers Resort sign to document our departure, we hung a right on Trail 8 and motored towards Bruce Crossing.

For me, heading east out of Bergland was the farthest I had ever ventured into the U.P. I know it sounds strange, but every trip previously to the area had always started out on the Wisconsin side of the stateline, and Lake Gogebic or the Lake of the Clouds at Silver City had always served as the turnaround point. Now, those previous endpoints became our gateway to the rest of the Keweenaw Peninsula.

Mining Remnants

Like most of the trails in this neck of the woods, Trail 8 was a converted rail-trail and had been freshly groomed overnight. Traffic was light, and



north toward Rockland. By all accounts, the first hour of our trail ride was certainly satisfying my itch, but with an average snowfall of more than 200 inches each winter, I guess it should have.

At Rockland, we continued northeast on Trail 3 toward Mass City and picked up the Bill Nicholls Trail. Named after a Copper Range agent, this 41-mile multi-purpose trail had been abandoned by the Copper Range Railroad in 1972 and has served as a snowmobile trail since its acquisition by the state two years later. The scenery and landmarks along this ridge corridor were certainly impressive and noteworthy.

After crossing Highway 38, the trail famously spans the west and east branches of the Firesteel River on three successive steel trestle bridges. The height above the water reaches nearly 100 feet, and the view of the gorges below is simply breathtaking. During my time as editor of this magazine, I have received several photographs of this part of the trail, but nothing truly compares to witnessing it firsthand.

Once past the bridges, you begin to understand why this part of the U.P. is known as Copper Country, as remnants of the area's copper mining heritage crop up out of the landscape. Following lunch at the Mosquito Inn at Toivola-where a dry-erase board posted the total snowfall through Feb. 15 at 221.5 inches—we landed at Painesdale. Here, an abandoned mine shafthouse was hard to miss from the trail.

Further internet research revealed this towering structure produced copper up until 1967. According to the Copper Country Explorer website, the shafthouse, better known locally as Champion #4, was one of four such buildings still standing in the Keweenaw Peninsula. During the heyday of copper mining, several dozens of

Headstones to a Bygone Era

From Painesdale, we inched toward our final destination of the day at Houghton. Just outside of town, the trail drops down to the road level and passes by what I can only describe as 'Snowmobiling's Stonehenge', a line of massive cement uprights once employed to support the copper-laden railcars overhead. Rising up out of the snowbanks, the grey forms stand as headstones to a bygone industry and era.

A little farther down the trail, as civilization came back into view, more eye candy would greet us as we reached Lake Portage at Houghton. The ice remained thick enough for the two of us to cross the lake safely and even allowed for a photo opportunity in front of the Houghton-Hancock Lift Bridge, the world's heaviest and widest double-decked vertical-lift bridge.

Built in 1959 and featuring two decks for vehicular traffic, this bridge could be raised to allow ships underneath and lowered to allow trains to cross. Rail service ended in 1982, and each winter

after the lake freezes, the bridge is placed in the lowest position to allow the lower deck to be used by snowmobile traffic, although we didn't need this access this week.

Thanks to the nice, wide manicured trails of the first stretch of the day, we arrived in Houghton well ahead of schedule. After checking in to the hotel, we decided to suit up for a little more riding north of Houghton



toward Calumet to get our bearings for the next day, when we would visit the Clean Snowmobile Challenge at the Keweenaw Research Center (KRC) near the airport.

As day faded into night, we arrived back in Houghton for our pre-planned pizza party downtown with the rest of the ISSA members who had made it to the U.P. for the ISSA ride. While 20 guests initially signed up for the event, only 14 made the trek north. Despite the surprisingly low number of participants, Andreini and others were still pleased with the turnout, given the first time attempting such an out-of-state retreat.

"Even though we did not end up with as many as we thought we would have at the beginning, it was still a very enjoyable time," he said. "You need to start somewhere, and I think we can grow from here."

By design, daily rides over the next three days would be divided by skill level and destination interests. Tuesday morning, several groups dispersed from the hotel, some riding north from Hougton up to Copper Harbor and others riding south to Ontonagon, Silver City and Bergland. The only schedules to keep were breakfast in the morning at the hotel and dinner together at night downtown.

"Every evening, we ate together and shared our day's ride with one another," Andreini said. "Riding up in the U.P. is always good at that time of year. The trails were great, and it was like riding on

a level floor the entire time we were up there."

Appointment with Clean Snowmobile Challenge

While the rest of the group went their separate ways on Tuesday, Gerdes and I fulfilled a commitment to meet Hoermann at the opening ceremonies of the Clean Snowmobile Challenge. As profiled in the September issue of this magazine, a team from Iowa was competing in the event for the first time, and we felt it was important to be there to not only cover the event but to show our support for the students from Iowa State University.

After the media blitz and parade laps, we tagged along with the students as they participated in the endurance ride to Copper Harbor Tuesday afternoon. Escorted by volunteer members from the Michigan Snowmobile Association and knifing through a pretty heavy lake-effect snowfall, a record 11 teams completed the 45-mile ride to the northernmost tip of the peninsula.

As the contestants loaded up their sleds on trailers for their commute back south, Gerdes and I stayed in Copper Harbor for lunch and eventually meandered back to Houghton, spending some time at the Brockway Mountain overlook above Copper Harbor and Lake Superior as well as stopping off at Phoenix and Calumet along the way.

Like Andreini, Gerdes, who had ridden in the U.P. several times over the past 30 years, commented often how great the trails were this week. Groomer sightings were frequent throughout the trip, meeting them two to three times on the trail each day. The excellent trail conditions made for an enjoyable trip to the U.P. and easily justified our decision to take time off from work and leave behind the brown landscape back home.

"These are some of the best trails I've ever seen up here," Gerdes noted.

On Wednesday, most of the Iowa contingent attended the Clean Snowmobile Challenge. As we had the day before, Andreini and others visited with the team members from Iowa State and were impressed by what they learned at the event. The ISSA's

presence at the Challenge also created quite a buzz, according to Hoermann who has volunteered at the competition every year since 2004.

"That was the first time ever that a state organization had sledders attend the snowmobile challenge," Hoermann noted. "They really liked to see that and the ISU boys did as well. There was a lot of positive feedback from our appearance. You normally don't see that kind of turnout from one state coming in."

"We now understand why Merv goes up there every year and donates his time to that event," Andreini said.

"That's a great thing up there. What they do there is just fantastic. ISU had a good showing for the first year, and we definitely got acquainted with those guys."

As we had already spent time at the challenge, Gerdes and I escorted the group to the KRC and then turned around and began our trip back south to Bergland. A parent-teacher conference later in the week was preventing me from staying any longer in the U.P., and after an overnight stop in Mass City, we arrived back at The Timbers Resort mid-morning Thursday.

Positive Reports from Participants

Meanwhile, back at Houghton, the ISSA group decided to ride as one on Thursday. By not splitting up, Andreini said the riders were able to create a comradery with each other and spend more time together, which was one of the objectives of the retreat in the first place.

"We had a great time on Thursday," he said. "We know so many people by name, but we don't get to know them until you spend several days with each other. Those relationships started to form very effectively on that last day."

The positive interaction among the members fostered talk of another snowmobile retreat this season. As discussed at the ISSA Board of Directors meeting in May, several featured destinations exist to make it happen again, whether it's back to the U.P., north to Minnesota or out west to South Dakota and Wyoming.

"We have a lot of expertise in this room, people who have gone to other places who can organize these types of trips and take us to different locations," Immediate Past ISSA President Jim Willey said. "It's a great thing for the ISSA and for all Iowa riders get involved in this. We might get a lot of interest and certainly build a rapport with other states that we visit."

"We had a lot of good positive reports from the people who attended our trip last winter and who want to do it again this year," Andreini said. "I think everyone enjoyed themselves, and that was the secret for making this a success. We will wait and see what happens, and if the opportunity arises again, we will try it again. I think everybody had a good time, and that was pleasing to me, of course."

pair of bridge improvement projects Aon the multi-purpose Rolling Prairie Trail in Region 3 are nearing completion in Franklin County. Thanks to several grants, the bridge decks have been replaced and railings have been added to two bridge spans between Hampton and Hansell.

Work began in September with the project costing close to \$220,000. Funding came from a \$152,000 Transportation Alternatives Program grant from the North Iowa Area Council of Governments and another \$32,750 grant through the state's snowmobile trail grant program administered by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR). The balance of the cost was covered by Resource Enhancement and Protection (REAP)

funds.

Past ISSA President Gary McVicker, a member of the Iowa River Riders snowmobile club who applied for the IDNR grant, has been involved with the trail since the Franklin County Conservation



Board assumed ownership former rail bed from Union Pacific in 2009.

"As a club, we have now invested close to \$54,000 in time, labor and money on this trail,"

explained McVicker, a past conservation board member and current Franklin County supervisor. "In fact, we are the only user

group on this trail which has really stepped forward with any money and labor since the line fell under local control."

McVicker said the contributions from snowmobilers has "locked us into the trail permanently." For this project, the snowmobile grant money basically allowed the width of the bridge to increase from eight to 12 feet and therefore accommodate the size of the club's groomer.

Grading work continues on the trail to make the bridge approaches safer for both motorized and non-motorized users. The conservation board will be using a special tiller to work up the existing rock base and then smooth it out to match the height of the new bridge surface.

"We have a few more smaller areas that need some attention, but with this new wider surface, we are now able to groom most of this trail," McVicker reported.

The club's trail continues to county line where it turns north towards Aredale and



connects with neighboring club trails. As of this time, motorized vehicles are not allowed on the Buter County portion of the Rolling Prairie Trail.

In Franklin County, a nine-mile stretch of the Rolling Praire Trail is already completed from Coulter to Hampton. Now the eastern half of he trail is inching closer to reality.

"These new bridges are really going to set this new section apart," conservation director Jason Gooder said in an interview with local media.






