

n expected side-effect stemming from the recent shift in management of the state snowmobile program from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) to the ISSA has left the latter courting a new sponsor for federal grant funding to purchase new grooming equipment.

As a result of its limited role in the program, the IDNR will no longer submit grant applications to the federal Recreational Trails Program (RTP) on behalf of snowmobiling in Iowa. ISSA officials said they were aware of this potential setback when they began lobbying for control of the program last January.

"Since the IDNR is no longer the fiscal sponsor on this anymore, we had to find a new one," past ISSA president and state snowmobile program co-administrator Terry Durby told the ISSA Board of Directors in October. "Since we are a nonprofit, we do not qualify to apply directly for RTP funding. It is allowed federally but not in our state. We may need to look at changing that in the future."

In Iowa, RTP funds are approved and dispersed by the Iowa Department of Transportation (IDOT). According to its Office of Systems Planning, organizations such as the ISSA can only apply for a federal trail grant "if co-sponsored by a government agency."

In the absence of the IDNR, the ISSA began identifying potential grant partners earlier this year and ultimately landed on the North Central Iowa Port Authority, a consortium of four counties created in 2016 to leverage economic development opportunities in their region.

However, when the ISSA informed the IDOT of its plan to apply for RTP grants with the port authority this fall, the agency,

according to Durby, posed several followup questions which could not be answered in a timely manner.

With an Oct. 1 application deadline looming for the 2018 grant period, ISSA leaders had to draft Plan B and opted to submit RTP applications from the club and

county level. With two county supervisors sitting in past president seats on the board and both from Region 3, this option proved to be the path of least resistance.

Durby serves on the Board of Supervisors in Winnebago County, and Gary McVicker

is an elected official in Franklin County. Winnebago submitted a grant application on behalf of the North Iowa Sno-Jammers for \$198,000, and Franklin County submitted an application on behalf of the Iowa River Riders for \$200,000.

"To ensure we were going to be able to get our applications in on time and get our possible groomer funding, I went to my board of supervisors and also visited with Gary's board seeking their approval and cooperation," Durby said.

Significant Potential Windfall

If both requests are approved by the IDOT, the state snowmobile program could gain its biggest windfall ever during its 17year participation in the RTP. Historically, annual grant awards to the IDNR to purchase grooming equipment have hovered around the \$240,000 mark.

While providing a work-around for a long-term partner, teaming up at the county level created a short-term solution that

forced the ISSA to think outside the box, acknowledged Chris Willey, current ISSA president and snowmobile program coadministrator.

"All of our grant applications through the IDNR over the years have always been the same cookie-cutter approach," Willey said. "By working with these two counties and going after some of the diversified funding, we are trying a new angle at this."

"Our requests for 2018 are more than they have ever been before," Durby added. "Hopefully, we can pull some money out of the diversified portion that we haven't been able to get before."

Created in 1991 by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), RTP is financed by a small percentage of the federal fuel taxes paid by off-road user groups. Iowa's share of that pool comes to more than \$1 million annually with 2017's total ringing up at \$1.3 million.

FHWA guidelines require grant funding be spread across three trail-user groups: 30 percent motorized, 30 percent nonmotorized and 40 percent diversified. A state trails advisory committee grades the grant requests each year, and Past ISSA President Merv Hoermann represents snowmobiling interests on this volunteer

Winnebago's application fell into the motorized category, whereas the Franklin County request aligns with the diversified group as it pertains to grooming the multipurpose Rolling Prairie Trail from Coulter to Hansell along Highway 3.

Hoermann said he will lobby for both county applications when the advisory committee meets later this year to grade the requests. "It's good see that we are going after diversified funding, and we are stating that use on our application," he said.

Eventually Back to Plan A

RTP grants require a 20 percent match, so if awarded in 2018, the state snowmobile program will need to pony up 100 percent of the purchase price of new or updated groomers and then request 80 percent reimbursement through the federal grant

2017 stands as the final year the IDNR received a RTP grant on behalf of snowmobiling in Iowa. That \$240,000 has been earmarked to pay off groomer leases in Kossuth and Johnson counties. Once that reimbursement process is complete, the IDNR will be stepping down from its RTP grant obligations.

While potentially increasing groomer funding next year, both Durby and Willey admit the county approach is not a sustainable fix for the federal grant application process going forward. Eventually going back to Plan A for 2019, they said they will continue to work with the IDOT to recognize the port authority in the RTP process.

"The port authority is the appropriate mechanism and standard that we need to follow for future grant applications," Willey said. "They would be better than going to this county or that county for approval every year. In most cases, we have very good relationships with our county supervisors where we can do this, but there are places that we may not be able to do so."

Neither Durby nor Willey said they were concerned about working with the individual counties this time around because the equipment, if purchased through the grants, cannot be sold or reassigned later on down the road. Durby should know. He served as president of the American Council of Snowmobile Associations from 2011 to 2013 and, in that role, kept close tabs on the FWHA and RTP.

"The RTP agreement you sign with the FHWA has strict rules for where that piece of equipment can be used so it can't be used for anything but what was stated on that application," he said.

Notified Next Spring

RTP awards for 2018 will be announced next spring. If both applications are approved, new grooming equipment will land in those respective counties, and their current club units will be relocated to other areas of the state.

As a reminder, snowmobile clubs need to mark on their state trail grant applications if they are requesting a new groomer or not. The ISSA's Review and Selection Committee (RSC) determines groomer placement based on age, need and traffic. Newer units are typically placed above the Snow Belt (Highway 20) in Iowa, and older equipment is sent south of there.

Also for clarification, a 10 percent match from a club toward a groomer purchase is still recommended, but not required. Depending on the price tag, club payments in the past have ranged from \$10,000 to \$20,000. That match can be paid in a lump sum or spread out over five years, and that financial commitment survives the recent change in program management.

"We've had clubs ask if they need to continue to make payments because the ISSA is now in charge," Willey said. "They made a commitment to the program and not to the IDNR, so yes, payments still need to be made."

Besides lessening the financial burden on state snowmobile program coffers, the logic behind the cost-share option for clubs to secure new groomers is operators will be

less likely to abuse the equipment and to cause unnecessary maintenance issues and costly repairs. However, RSC members recognize this match may not be feasible for smaller clubs.

"It's a lot easier for some clubs to come up with 10 percent than it is others," Willey said. "We've always tried to decide our groomer placements on a need-basis versus what a club can afford. It's a moving target based on what a club is asking for. They may not get brand new equipment, but they will get an upgrade."

"Not all clubs have the same resources and have a lot of members who can do a lot of fundraising," added Past ISSA President Jim Willey. "That doesn't mean they don't deserve a new groomer. We look at the number of miles of trail groomed and the number of groomer operators they've trained. We take a lot into consideration. They may not have the cash, but they may do a really important job in the state and that has to be taken into consideration. That's part of the responsibility of the Review and Selection Committee."



The Iowa State Snowmobile Trail Grant Program recently acquired a Bobcat Toolcat equipped with a front-mounted flail mower. The unit is available to clubs to use to prepare their trails for the upcoming season.

hen the Iowa Department of Natural Resources transferred the state's groomer fleet to the ISSA in September, the volunteer organization inherited a Bobcat Toolcat equipped with a front-mounted flail mower as well.

Previously used by an individual club in southern Iowa, the unit is now being made available to ISSA clubs to mow their snowmobile trails in preparation of the upcoming season.

Past ISSA President Jim Willey is coordinating the effort. He would like to loan the unit out on a weekly basis, working to schedule its use with neighboring clubs to reduce down time and transportation costs. To reserve a time, please contact Willey at (563) 920-0911 or jim.willey@ camso.co.

"We want to keep it moving across the state one week at a time," he said. "Ideally, clubs can work out getting the mower to and from one another. We really need to keep it moving to get the most use out of it this fall."

The cab of the unit comes complete with heat and air conditioning, and only certified groomer operators will be allowed to use the mower. Clubs will need to track their time with the Bobcat in their groomer logs, and fuel expenses will need to come out of their groomer fuel grant reimbursement request.

"If anyone mows their trails before the snow flies, this unit will definitely come in handy," said Willey, who recently completed repairs and maintenance to the unit and gave it a trial run in Region 5. "It certainly can do the job."

This mower should not be confused with the ISSA's brush cutter, which is currently inactive awaiting a dedicated power unit. It is a mower only and is capable of tackling small saplings but cannot be raised for side trimming and trail clearing like the brush

Freestyle snowmobiler and snocross team owner Levi LaVallee of Longville, Minn., will headline the 2017 ISSA Annual Convention later this month in Cedar Rapids.

Slated to speak at the Saturday evening banquet, LaVallee will share his experiences in the national spotlight as well as his appreciation for organized snowmobiling, accord-

ing to ISSA officials who heard his presentation at the International Snowmobile Congress in New York in 2015.

Backed by Polaris and Red Bull, LaVallee, 34, rose to snowmobiling prominence through several televised stunts. In 2009, he became the first snowmobiler to complete a double backflip on a sled in competition, and in 2012, he bested his own world record from a year earlier by jumping his snowmobile 412 feet.

On the race track, LaVallee has earned medals in nearly every snowmobile discipline at the Winter X Games, including a Bronze earlier this year at Aspen. In snocross, he won the Pro Stock points championship in 2009 and was named a "fan favorite" on the ISOC circuit five times.

In 2013, ESPN recognized LaVallee as one of the 50 "most influential people in action sports," according to his website at www.teamlavallee.com. Earlier this year, his team competed at the inaugural Amsoil snocross race at Dubuque.

LaVallee will return to Iowa later this month as part of an entertainment lineup Saturday night at convention that also includes two comedians as well as the ISSA awards presentations.

Now entering its 44th year, the convention will be held at the Hilton Hotel Cedar Rapids Convention Complex in downtown Cedar Rapids Nov. 17-19. The agenda was lengthened by a day when the ISSA Board of Directors added its monthly meeting to the weekend on Sunday morning.

Tailored to Youth

Besides LaVallee, the Convention Planning Committee is also excited to host a Snow and Powersports Show on Saturday. Besides snowmobiles, gear and apparel, attendees will be able to see vendors from other lines of outdoor recreation on the showroom



"Many committee members are working hard on contacting vendors to have booths at our show," reported convention committee chair Jean McPherson. "We appreciate the opportunity to expand this to include other outdoor sports. We hope this will draw many outside folks to come in and see all that is offered for winter recreation."

Following the west-to-east rotation, this year's convention is being planned and hosted by clubs from Region 9. McPherson belongs to the Jones County Snow Chasers and her husband, Tim, presently serves as the Region 9 director for the ISSA.

"We are making great progress on planning the convention this year," the McPhersons said in their update to the ISSA Board of Directors in October. "We have

assembled a great team for the planning committee."

As detailed on the forms on page 11 of this month's issue, full registration runs \$75 with reduced rates available for single days. Convention attendees earn free admission to the snow show, which is open to the general public. Addmission for non-registered snowmobilers is only \$5, and kids 12 and under will be admitted free.

With a booth and promotional trailer at the show, the ISSA hopes to recruit new mem-

bers to the organization, and clubs are also invited to set displays for the annual Snowmobile Iowa showcase at convention.

"We encourage your club to bring your trail maps, photos and club information to share in your own booth for the Snowmobile Iowa display at the show," the McPhersons said. "There is no cost for the booth. However, if you need power for your booth, you will need to contact Double Tree to set that up."

Break-Out Sessions

The planning committee has also identified the seminars for Saturday afternoon. In addition to the trail grant forum profiled last month, topics for the break-out sessions will also include bridge building, signing and sled maintenance.

"We hope our seminars will really target the riders this year and will give some great opportunities for networking and guidance from our senior riders," organizers said.

As they are hoping to make this convention "a kid-friendly event," the planning committee has also reserved some time for the ISSA's youth program called Kids Intentionally Supporting Snowmobiling, or KISS. Youth Program Coordinator Isabelle Willey shares some of her insights on the program at right.

Sponsorship opportunities still exist to support this year's convention, and club members are encouraged to bring items for raffle drawings and the Silent Auction. Clubs should also bring their donations to the various charities and causes supported by the ISSA.

Convention Seminar to Drum **Up Support for Youth Program**

Tow much effort would you put in or how much time would Tyou give up to save something you love?



Students Head Back to the Drawing Board

fter a thermal event that ended with their vehicle in A flames, the Iowa State Clean Snowmobile Challenge team is heading back to the drawing board with big plans for next year's competition.


The Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) International association holds an annual competition each year that encourages college teams from around the world to redesign existing snowmobile technology to be more fuel efficient and quieter on the trails.

In previous years, park rangers from popular national parks have gone to the competitions to give talks to the competitors about the importance of advancing cleaner and quieter snowmobiles.

"We take a stock snowmobile and our goal is to make it more fuel-efficient and quieter, while also making it fun to ride," said Charlie Bootsmiller, project director for the SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge this year.

The SAE Clean Snowmobile Challenge is a competition that pits multiple colleges from around the world to modify and create a better snowmobile. The competition is primarily an engine competition, said the members of the team. However, that doesn't prevent them from modifying other things on the sled.

"You can touch literally anything you want on the entire snowmobile as long as it still meets the turn to page 19

Sporting an updated sled with a flashy graphics package and a team hauler to boot, engineering students from Iowa State University arrived in style last March at Houghton, Mich., ready to improve on their first two years' performance at the Clean Snowmobile Challenge (CSC).

Earning Rookie of the Year honors in 2015 and finishing a respectable sixth place in their class last season, the Cy-Clean team was poised to make some headlines at the March 6-11 event at the Keweenaw Research Center. Instead, their entry garnered some unwanted attention on just the second day of competition.

Entered once again into the internal combustion category, the Iowa team along with their competitors from other Snow Belt universities headed out on the endurance ride to Copper Harbor, but not too long after departing the campus of Michigan Tech University, their sled unexpectedly caught on fire and prematurely ended their week at the competition.

Describing the catastrophic failure as a "thermal event," the team and judges at the competition determined "material selection" was the root cause for the fire. Fortunately, each sled on the ride was required by rule to carry a fire extinguisher, and the blaze was contained rather quickly and no injuries were reported.

"From the first day, we put great effort into safety training in the use of extinguishers to control thermal events," explained Jay Meldrum, CSC coordinator at Michigan Tech. "One of the most important lessons we preach is that the turn to page 15

days of riding looming before us in the not-too-distant future, so before long, we were headed north with the Arctic Cat in the trailer and snow covered trails ahead of us. After crossing the bridge at Dubuque and an enjoyable drive through Wisconsin—albeit with seeing very little snow in most of one of the top snowmobiling states in the country—we were starting to realize that our Iowa trails were not the only ones suffering from a lack of snow last season.

After a quick wave to Jimmer Montgomery in Menomonee, and seeing Escanaba in da daylight (only a few of you will understand these references), we were soon at Christmas and the White Pine motel. The snow was deep and the people friendly. Jim came over to bring us our trail pass, and we had a good visit, catching up on events and family, and making plans for the ride the next morning.

from page 12 extinguisher on the back of your sled is to assist another competitor when they have a thermal event. That worked perfectly this year with another team coming to the rescue."

"After partaking in a root-cause analysis, our team along with the competition judges came up with the conclusion that the thermal event was caused by excessive heat for the area around the catalyst," explained Austin Dewberry, a project director for the ISU team. "As for anything much more in detail than that, everyone has their own slight variance of theories."

As detailed in the related story on page 12, the ISU team is planning to return to the competition in 2018 with their back-up sled from the first two years. Despite the setback, Meldrum, who serves as Keweenaw director, is encouraged to hear the team has rebounded, as one of the purposes of the CSC competition is to continually look for ways to improve snowmobile technology.

"I would prefer to highlight the positive aspects and learning achievements of the teams at CSC each year and not necessarily this mishap," he said. "Yes, the team from Iowa State pushed the envelope, and we like to see that. The positive outcome from this whole ordeal has been a rules modification to know all the material properties of additions to the sled in relation to the environment in which it will be placed."

Founded in 1999 at West Yellowstone,





the snowmobile challenge has spent the last 15 seasons at Michigan Tech in the Upper Peninsula. The contest, according to Meldrum, is designed to promote ingenuity and reduce the sport's environmental footprint. Past results from the competition can be seen in today's production sleds.

Tasked with designing and building cleaner, quieter snowmobiles, the students compete in three categories: internal combustion engines, diesel utility engines and zero emissions. The rules are strict, and during the week-long marathon, snowmobiles are judged on, among other measures, emissions, fuel economy, acceleration, cold-starting and endurance.

Teams are expected to arrive to the competition ready for the testing and riding. Their projects must pass inspection, after which the hoods are sealed to prevent further tinkering and tampering. According to Meldrum, the students need to show up at the competition ready to "compete with and not complete" their project.

Next year's event is scheduled for March 5-10.

Hello, everyone. I am back at my desk with pen in hand and not knowing just where to start.

I have gotten some trail work started. I went out and did the dirt work that needed taken care of. I think I pushed more trees out of the way than dirt. I had a lot of trees and parts of trees to push to the side. I had the chain saw along to cut some of the bigger ones. I could push most of them out of the way. There was one I couldn't get at an end, and I had to cut it to my size. I cut some small branches out of the way and then got the skid loader where I could take off the pressure that would pinch the saw blade. That makes it much easier work and not have to worry about a pinch and have to use a wedge to free the saw. I am experienced at doing that with a dumb move and getting caught.

The bridge I have on this trail had one corner sinking down from the dirt washing away. I had a strap that I got between the decking and around the two poles and lifted it up, and then we were able to get under and wedge two 6x6 blocks under the poles. When I let the pressure off, the bridge stayed where I had it, looking good. After that, I had to scrape up some dirt and build the shoulder of the bank out further. The dirt was very sandy and easy to get between the planks on the bridge. I should have it in good for a few years now. This has been sinking for quite a few years so it should be good now. My wife Chris was pretty handy at crawling under the bridge to place the blocks and used the maul to drive them in place tight. Now I need to mow the trail and mark it to be ready for snow.

Our club held our monthly meeting, Oct. 13. We discussed items for the ISSA Convention coming up later this month. The following morning, we met for breakfast and then worked on trails where a lot of manpower is needed. The Solon Legion appreciates us for breakfast on these Saturdays. There will be another work day this month.

Now is the time of year for our annual membership drive. If you want to sign up or renew your membership, you can go to the Snowdrifters website and get an application form. Last month, our local Arctic Cat dealer held his annual open house. A good time comes along with this. A lot of people you get to visit with that you don't see too often and always good food. from page 12 rules," said Austin Dewberry, project director for this year's team. "There's not many things that are against the rules, so anything you see on the snowmobile, or you can think of, you can do."

The team members also said that while you can modify most anything on the snowmobile, the majority of teams stay away from modifying the chassis due to the fact that the competition requires intricate geometrical analysis of a redesigned chassis for safety reasons.

Other things that most teams modify are centered around the engine, tracks, suspension, skis and everything else that goes onto the chassis, said Dan Zimmerman, engine team lead for the project this year.

For 2018, the team will be running a back-up snowmobile from a few years ago due to a "thermal event," as the team called it, that saw their primary snowmobile catch fire during the 2017 competition.

The snowmobile is powered by a 800cc, 140 horsepower two-stroke engine. A two-stroke engine is different from the engine you would find in your car due to the number of strokes it takes to turn the crankshaft in the engine. For example, most modern cars on the road feature a four-stroke engine.

The competition is primarily broken up into three classes, separated by type engine: internal combustion, diesel utility and zero emission. While the team said that the 2018 competition will not have a zero emission category, they will be competing in the internal combustion class.

"We had a few team members in the past who wanted to put a diesel motor in our chassis," said Zimmerman, "but we've decided against it each year due to resources and time." For this upcoming competition season, the team has a few goals it hopes to achieve in terms of vehicle modification.

"We for sure want to do a standalone ECU," said Dewberry.

An ECU, or engine control unit, is a device that controls how an internal combustion engine performs and allows for a user to tune specifically how that engine performs.

"For most any vehicle, they have aftermarket applications that are just plug and play, but for a two-stroke application, there's nothing like that that exists currently," Dewberry said.

"We're throwing a lot of ideas around," said Zimmerman. "We might put in a 600[cc] two-stroke engine so it lowers our horsepower. If we run the 800cc, we'll probably have to put a rev-limiter on it so we don't go over the horsepower limit for the competition."

The team will be traveling to Michigan's Upper Peninsula in March 2018 to Houghton, Mich., where they will be competing against other collegiate teams from around the world to develop and push the boundaries of the snowmobile industry.

Bootsmiller went on to talk about the club and how they encourage students from all backgrounds to consider joining.

"I joined my freshmen year without really knowing anything about snowmobiles," Bootsmiller said. "We have a slightly smaller learning curve than other SAE teams because we're not building a vehicle from the ground up and I think that makes us a little more approachable."


